

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

Crescent Street Church, Montreal

(FORMERLY FREE CHURCH, COTÉ STREET.)

- The Congregation owes its origin to the deep interest which some individuals had in the struggles of the Free Church party in Scotland, and who met together to advance Free Church principles. They were called the Free Church Committee. The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—January 10. First Meeting of Free Church Committee. Invitation sent to Rev. Dr. Cunningham, then in the United States, to come to Montreal.
 - " Arrival of Dr. Burns, of Paisley, the First Deputy from the Free Church.
 - "May.—A call for a Minister sent to the Free Church Colonial Committee, with promise of adequate support. A call sent to REV. W. C. BURNS at the same time to come out as an Evangelist.
 - "End of summer.—REV. MR. KING, of Glasgow, and REV. MR. MACNAUGHTAN, of Paisley, Deputies from the Free Church arrived. REV. W. C. BURNS, arrived about the same time and preached in St. Gabriel Street Church.
- 1845.—The Rev. J. Bonar, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street. Church till a temporary wooden church was erected on Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May inducted the first elders, viz: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
 - The Rev. W. Arnor, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
 - The Rev. A. N. Somerville, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
- " The Rev. W. C. Burns, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.
- 1846.—The Rev. G. Stevenson, of Pulteneytown, ministered from January to April.
 - " The REV. T. MACLAUGHLAN, of Stratherrick, ministered during May and June.
 - " The REV. J. MUNRO, of Rutherglen, ministered during July and August,
- " The REV. J. ALEXANDER, of Kirkcaldy, ministered from November to March, 1847.
- 1847.—The Rev. J. B. Duncan, then a Student, ministered during April and part of May.
 - "The Rev. J. MacGillivray, of Aberdeen, opened the Church in Coté Street, on Sabbath, the 16th of May, preaching morning and evening, while the Rev. Henry Wilkes preached in the afternoon.
 - " The REV. J. BUCHANAN, of Bothwell, ministered from May to October.
 - " The REV. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.—The Rev. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.
- 1849.—The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August.
 - " The Rev. J. C. Burns, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.
 - " -The REV. J. C. FAIRBAIRN, of Allanton, ministered from August to October, 1850.
 - -The REV. D. COUPER, of Burntisland, ministered from November to February, 1850.
- 1851.-The REV. D. FRASER, ordained Pastor, August 8th, 1851.
- 1859.—The REV. D. FRASER, translated to Inverness, Scotland, February 3rd, 1859.
 - " -The REV. B. F. GREIG, ministered four months from April, 1859.
- " -The REV. HUGH COBBAN, of Braemar, ministered from Sept , 1859, to Jan., 1860.

1860.—The REV. GEORGE LEWIS, ministered several months from May.

"The REV. WM. SCRIMGEOUR, ministered from Nov., till Jan., 1861.

1860. - Debt on Coté Street Church extinguished.

1861.—The REv. D. H. MACVICAR, inducted pastor, January 30th, 1861.

1868.—The REV. D. H. MACVICAR, translated to the Presbyterian College, Montreal, Sept. 10th, 1868.

1870.—The REV. R. F. BURNS, inducted pastor, May 4th, 1870.

1875.—The REV. R. F. BURNS, translated to Halifax, February 22nd, 1875.

1878.—Crescent Street Church was opened on Sabbath, March 10th, 1878.

The year 1899 will be ever memorable to me as a year of the greatest losses by death I have ever experienced in my ministry. There has been a great harvest among us of those whom we greatly loved and highly esteemed. Yet the consolation vouchsafed was very real. We have entered more deeply into the meaning and power of that great benediction, "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord," and we are better prepared to face the last enemy ourselves, if the Lord tarry. We have also a close personal interest in the war in South Africa, as some connected with us are there. So far, we are thankful to say their lives have been spared, though two have been reported wounded.

Among those whose loss we mourn is our faithful elder, Mr. John Stirling. The session put on record the following minute concerning his death: "For more than half a century the late Mr. John Stirling has been connected with this congregation, having joined the church in 1847, and during the whole of that period he has taken an active and helpful part in the work of the congregation.

For forty-seven years he has served as a deacon, and for thirty-three years as an elder, and during all that period has been most diligent in the performance of the duties of these offices. We thank God for the great gift which this faithful servant has been to this congregation, but we shall miss him greatly for his kindly spirit, his clear intellect, his wise counsel, his generous gifts and his good example, and we pray that the Father of Mercies and God of all Comfort may comfort the hearts of all dear to him."

Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR YEAR ENDING DEC. 31st, 1899.

The Court, in presenting its Annual Report, desires to congratulate the Congregation upon the results of the year now ended, and also express thankfulness to God for having put into the hearts of our people to fully maintain the several departments of the Congregational finance.

The total receipts from all sources amount to \$20,583.31,

as shown in the Treasurer's statements.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The receipts, ordinary and special, for the year, amount to \$11,806.95, of which \$8,473.15 was contributed by envelope, \$1,284.85 by open collection, and \$2,048.96 by special subscription, being an increase over former year of \$1,396.48.

In the amount of special subscriptions is included \$1,200.00, which deserves special mention, as such was subscribed in response to the appeal and efforts of our Pastor for the purpose of maintaining the salary of Dr. McClure, our Missionary in China, thereby enabling the Court to allocate to Home Missions a much larger contribution from the Weekly Offerings than heretofore.

The weekly average of envelope and open plate collections is \$184.50, and if special subscriptions are added, would make the weekly average \$223.00.

The annual collection on behalf of the Montreal General Hospital was taken on Thanksgiving day, amounting to \$129.18.

PEW RENTS.

The revenue from this source amounted to \$4,636.10 and, after allowing for the current expenses chargeable to this account, leaves a balance to be carried forward of \$254.18.

HEATING AND VENTILATION.

The promised subscriptions amount to \$5,036.50, upon which has been paid \$2,979.50. The Court will require about \$500.00 additional to cover the cost of the heating system and to extinguish the balances of the building accounts as set forth in the report of 1898. The Court wish to express their gratification for the generous response of the Congregation to its appeal for these necessary objects, and trust that further subscriptions will be forthcoming.

The new heating system has been installed, but having been in operation only for a short time, it has not been tested sufficiently to warrant the Court in expressing an opinion as to its efficiency.

CONCLUSION.

In closing our summary of the year's work, let us do so with gratitude to the Most High for His goodness to us as a Congregation, in enabling us to efficiently maintain His work amongst ourselves, and to aid materially in extending the Master's Kingdom in those directions in which our Church feels it is her commission to labour.

It will be gratifying to the friends who contribute to the choir and organist special account to read the following appreciation of our congregational singing from the pen of an eminent Scottish professor. His correspondence appeared in a Scottish paper and was copied by a Montreal paper.

After speaking of visiting St. James Cathedral on Dominion Square, he continues: "We did not take time to appreciate the sermon in the church, for the time for worship in the Presbyterian Church was at hand, and we hastened to be present. We heard an excellent sermon, well thought out, well delivered, earnest and practical. The singing was splendid, in fact we never heard any congregational singing to compare with it. The organist is a genius, and knows the place he ought to fill in the harmony of the whole. To simply sustain the singing, to suppress himself, and to use himself for the good of the large whole is to make a great demand on the moral qualities of an organist; but if he does not yield to the situation, if he asserts himself and drowns the congregational voice by the sound of the organ, he himself ought to be suppressed. But the singing, the playing and the whole service of praise was beautiful and edifying. Dr. A. B. Mackay, the pastor, hails originally from Montrose."



LIBRARY.

Through the kindness of Mr. McNab, who gave us two lectures with lantern views, the Teachers have been enabled to replenish the Library to the extent of 107 volumes. This enabled us to overhaul the entire Library and re-open it in December free of debt. The Teachers hope for further assistance in order that they may extend its usefulness. Meanwhile the Teachers desire to record their great obligation to Mr. McNab for this important service.

The following papers have been distributed to various classes during the year: The Children's Friend, Children's Record, Forward, Home Quarterly, Our Little Dots, and Berean Leaf Cards.

THANKSGIVING DAY.

As usual the scholars took great interest in responding to the request for the usual supply of books, toys, games and fruit to be distributed amongst the Hospitals.

PIC-NIC.

A Pic-nic of the scholars, teachers and friends of the School was held at Sherringham Park, and as we were favored with a fine day a great many attended and spent a very pleasant day, all expenses of the outing being met by donations from friends in the Congregation.

CHINESE DEPARTMENT.

The work of our Chinese Sabbath School has been well sustained, with an increase of attendance and contributions for most of the year, though untoward circumstances have somewhat lessened the attendance during later Sabbaths.

There are, however, favoring features, especially appearing in connection with the Mission, 748 Lagauchetiere street, in which we share as in the general Chinese gatherings. One such meeting of teachers and friends in the interest of the work, and presided over by our Pastor, was recently held in the Lecture Hall.

One of our scholars, Lee Quong, has been received into the Mission C. E., which has a membership of 20, and an attendance often of 40, and even of 60. A number of these have been received into Knox Church during the year in connection with the Chinese service held there.

Moy Yeu, one of our most regular pupils, died in the General Hospital in August, and was buried from that Chapel. To Dr. Thomson, who visited him frequently, he professed his faith in Christ and his Saviour.

Miss Street, a faithful and devoted teacher, lost her life in the wreck of the Scotsman in September.

A number of our pupils have returned to China, several declaring themselves Christians. One, a particularly earnest Bible student and Christian, has recovered his health, and is witnessing for the Master amidst surrounding darkness in Hoypeng, China. Our teachers deserve much credit for faithful service during the year.

Another year has passed away and we present to you a report of the work done. And before doing so we desire to place on record our gratitude to God for His continued goodness to us, and for the prosperity that the school has enjoyed.

We again went to herringham Park for our annual picnic, which was held on June 27th and was highly successful, there being a large attendance of children, their parents and friends, and having fine weather a very pleasant day was spent by all.

Our Library, which contains many good and instructive books, continues to be well patronized by the scholars.

We continue the distribution of the following papers regularly: The Band of Hope Review, British Workman, British Workwoman, Children's Friend, Children's Record, besides numerous Tracts.

Prizes are given for the correct repetition of the Shorter Catechism and Golden Texts, and we would here urge upon more of the scholars to study and commit to memory these two branches of our work. Not only for the value of the prizes, but for the inestimable good for future life, of such a store of knowledge.

Prizes are also given to those who do missionary work, in bringing in new scholars.

The Lady Teachers have met every Tuesday since October 3rd as a Dorcas Society, and useful articles of clothing, shoes, etc., are distributed to such as require assistance.

The Band of Hope resumed its meetings on October 13th and are held every fortnight. A good programme and temperance address is given at each meeting. Quite a number have signed the pledge, and we hope much good will result therefrom. The meetings are not for the children only, but are open to all, and we here extend a hearty invitations to friends interested in the work to attend.

Mazareth Street Mission.

The work of this Mission was carried on during the past year with little change, except that the steady increase and progress which we have been privileged to report in former years has continued, and our meetings, especially during the first part of this winter, were the largest we have yet had, the average attendance at the Sabbath evening meetings being from 90-100. On two occasions we had over 100 present, and the order, the general attention, the interest manifested and the reverent air pervading all the meetings have been most pleasing and encouraging.

Last summer we were able through the kindness of some friends to make the hall look brighter by placing flowers on the pulpit and organ. The larger bunches were afterwards divided into smaller ones and distributed amongst the people and were much appreciated, especially in the homes where there was sickness.

During the past winter also, a choir composed of some of the girls attending the meetings was organized by Mrs. McGregor and Miss Traquair, which has certainly been a great help in the singing, as well as a means of interesting these young people.

The attendance at the prayer meeting has also been good, although the improvement has not been so marked as at the Sabbath evening service.

We have very gratefully to acknowledge the kindness of those friends in the Congregation, and the boys' Bible Class under Mr. Knox Henry, who supplied Christmas dinners for the poorer members of the Mission. We also acknowledge several parcels of cast-off clothing from various friends, and a parcel of new clothing for children sent by Mrs. Miller, all of which we sought to dispose of to the best advantage.

The Mission will now be carried on by Messrs. Turkington and McLeod, who began their work on the third Sunday of January last, and we would request that the friends who have encouraged and aided us in our work might transfer their good offices to our successors.

The first meeting of the season 1899-1900 was held Monday, October 31st, when appeals for help were made by various charitable organizations.

The sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25), one-half of the usual grant from the Deacons' Court, with 18 yards of flannel and a quantity of good, partly worn clothing, was sent to Nazareth Street Sabbath School Mission.

Some special subscriptions, and the large donations of clothing received from friends, have enabled us to extend our work. Through the kindness of Mr. H. Watson, we were enabled to more than double the help given to the "Mackay Institute" in former years. The needs of Oron Moore, as well as those of his sister, were supplied both in the months of May and November. The hearts of the children, as well as that of their Superintendent, Mrs. Ashcroft, were made glad by complete and pretty outfits of clothing.

Besides helping individual cases connected with the Congregation, the work of Madame Coté, the French Bible Woman, and that of Miss McSween, the trained Nurse, employed by the Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society, was remembered. Parcels of flannel clothing were sent to them for distribution among the Society and the deserving poor.

Some assistance was given to the Presbyterian cause, which is still weak and struggling, at Montreal Annex.

Donations of clothing were also made to the French Protestant Mission at Namur, to the Jewish Mission in the city, under the care of Mr. and Mrs. McCarter; to the Labrador Mission, and to the Victorian Order of Nurses.

Much of this work could not have been undertaken were it not for the large parcels of clothing sent to us by Mr. D. Morrice, Mrs. Alves and Mrs. Redpath.

We are glad of this opportunity of again acknowledging these gifts with warm thanks. We have also to thank members of the Congregation for a quantity of worn clothing which has been helpful in the work.

The special subscriptions kindly collected by Miss Mooney for the "Industrial Rooms Bazaar Fund" amounted

to ninety (\$90) dollars.


Some members of the Society have assisted in the work of visiting the sick, and calling on new members of the Church.

The Monan Mission.

We reproduce above the picture of Dr. McClure's House, and hope in our next report to have a picture of our hospital and chapel. The best report we can give of his work is contained in the following letter. I have very heartily to thank those friends who so readily and generously responded to my appeal on behalf of our Honan Mission, and feel assured I can fully depend on their sympathy and support in continuing this work.

DEAR DR. MACKAY:

I trust you do not think that because I have not written I have forgotten all the folks at home. Although you and all my friends are often in my thoughts, yet I must confess my shortcomings in not writing oftener. Unlike the chief butler, "it is not this day only that I do remember my friends." I beg forgiveness again from you and all the Crescent street friends, and I hope I may turn over a new leaf in this respect.

Well, just a week ago to-day, we moved into the new dispensary, with hearts filled with thankfulness to the Giver of all good and the friends of Crescent Street Church. It was not, however, without a certain feeling of sadness that we turned our back on the old damp, musty, dingy place, which had been the scene of much of our work during all the years we have been in Chuwang. Now we have a board floor, nicely oiled too, in our dispensary and operating room. A special operating room, with large windows, is a new luxury in Honan.

The chapel adjoining is also an immense improvement on the old place; it is light and airy, with glass windows and blinds. A door opens from it through a partition wall into the dispensing room.

We will still have enough money on hand to build several wards, I think, although I have not yet footed up the total cost of chapel and dispensary. Our old contractor was around yesterday talking about wards—the buildings I always let out by contract. This man puts up two rooms that will accommodate about six men each for about \$10, bed, too, included. This last is a raised platform of brick.

It was exactly one year (June 6th) from the time we moved over to our new home till we moved into the new hospital.

I've reckoned the cost of the house so far at \$845, but there are yet water spouts to put up and servants' quarters, and there ought to be a cistern, so that with these the cost will be very nearly \$1,000.

Lately the patients have been somewhat fewer on account of wheat harvest, but a few severe cases have staid with us all along. Now that the wheat harvest is over they (patients) are beginning to increase.

I enclose a copy of the "Occasional," edited by Dr. P. C. Leslie, giving an account of the opening of the chapel in connection with the dispensary, and I can only add that the day was an enjoyable and profitable one for all, I think. Next morning the Chinese Christians attending the opening brought in the enclosed document, of which I will give you a free translation.

" Greetings to the Canadian Church:

"We need not indulge in empty phrases. Although we have never seen your faces we know the breadth of your love, for when Mr. McGillivray was in Canada on furlough he spoke of the Chuwang chapel and dispensary as being in a dilapidated state, and all the brethren contributed money to build a new one. These buildings are now complete, and we beg you not to be anxious about us any longer. We thank you, and hope that God will give you grace more abundant. Only we would that you would send more labourers to China. As Paul says: 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.' We extend to you our respectful salutations, wishing you peace.

"FROM THE CHUWANG CHURCH MEMBERS OF HONAN."

A little company of Christians, about ten miles from here, built a church nearly all themselves this year, for which we are very glad, as evidence of their sincerity and of their independence of the foreigners; we helped them to about the extent of \$2.00 in all, I think. It is a very humble place in appearance, it is true, but is valuable as a proof of their earnestness and as an example to others.

I enclose you a photo of our house, and one of our presbytery, in which all the members are present. Will send a picture of hospital and chapel as soon as I can get one; it is too hot weather to develop photos now.

Therm. was 100° in the shade at back of our house yesterday, with a

strong breeze, but not a cool Canadian breeze.

Thanks for copy of Annual Report. Please change my address in report from Chefoo to Honan; we are 500 miles or more from Chefoo. Thanks also for your New Year's sermon.

And many thanks also to the folks of Crescent Street, for their continued support in the way of salary, and do not forget my much-needed support by your prayers, too.

The following is the account of the opening of our Chapel by Dr. Leslie:

It is with great pleasure that we are permitted to record the opening of our new Chapel and Dispensary to the service of the Lord. This occurred yesterday, and the entire Sabbath was devoted to this purpose. The entire cost of the building has been met by the generosity of Crescent Street Chu. h, Montreal, and we believe is admirably adapted to the sacred purpose for which it has been erected. The building consists of a preaching hall 42 ft. x 19 ft., and a dispensary 24 ft. x 19 ft.; an operating room 14 ft. x 10 ft., and small store room. It is built of Chinese grey brick, roofed with tile, and plastered inside.

We were very pleased to have the presence of Mr. Goforth of Chang Te Fu with us on this occasion, and he conducted the opening service in the morning; in the afternoon Mr. MacKenzie conducted the service, which was

solemnized by the Commemoration of the Lord's Supper. The evening service was led by Dr. McClure, and quite a number of the native Christians spoke or led in prayer. Two men were added to Church membership by Baptism, and doubtless others would have been received but for the rain of the previous day preventing them coming in from the country. A cloud was cast over the proceedings of the day, as it was found necessary to discipline one of our Church members, a trusted woman who was suspended from Church privileges and Communion for one year. large number of Christians came in from the surrounding towns, and the best of good feeling prevailed throughout the day. A letter of thanks has been drawn up by the Chinese, thanking the good friends in Montreal for the helpful remembrance of the work and its great need. No one who has been acquainted with our old quarters will have any doubt as to the need of such a change. The fresh circulation of air and the bright light stands out in strong contrast to the old dingy, damp and dismal building which has been occupied for the past nine years of work among those people. For all of which we raise our voice and hearts in grateful praise to God.

The attendance at our meetings, which have been held the first Friday of the month, with the exception of the summer months, has been much the same as last year, the average attendance being 35.

The devotional exercises led by our President, Mrs. Mackay, have been most helpful. This year the portions of Scripture chosen have been those bearing on Christian work, showing how best it may stand the test of the Judgment Seat of Christ.

This is followed by praise and prayer. Our missionary knowledge has been gained from papers of world-wide missionary intelligence. These papers have been read by

the younger ladies of the congregation.

In the spring we had a visit from Miss McLean—a Missionary from Persia, a land about which we as an Auxiliary have hitherto heard little. Miss McLean's address was both interesting and instructive. She brought with her some of the garments worn by the natives, as well as many other curios, which were examined with great interest. Letters from Miss Dow, the Society's missionary in Honan, have been read from time to time, as also letters from Dr. McClure, informing us of the completion of the

Hospital and Chapel.

Throughout the year we have had full reports by our representatives of the work done at the monthly meetings of the Executive.

The Society hopes this year to send another missionary to India, and our thoughts and prayers have been specially turned in that direction. May the hope of the Society be

realized.

The Sewing class at Nazareth Street was most successfully carried on until April last year, when at the closing meeting the children had a most enjoyable afternoon, followed by refreshments provided by the teachers. The class has been again commenced and will be continued during the winter.

In accordance with the wish of the Society that each auxiliary should hold its own thank-offering meeting, ours was held in October, the collection on that occasion amount-

ing to \$93.30.

The Treasurer reports the amount collected for this year to be \$488.70, which, in addition to our thank-offering

collection, makes a total of \$582.

In closing we would give praise to God, who has brought us to the end of another year. With thankful hearts let us go forward, trusting in His strength to carry on the work.

For has He not said to us:

"Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."
