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BY-LAWS:

PASSED AT THE NINTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY,
IN CHARLOTTETOWN, DECEMBER 28, 1852,
AND SINCE AMENDED.

1st. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, for the time being, if a member of the United Church of England and Ireland, shall be respectfully requested to be joint Patron of this Society, as now incorporated by Act of Colonial Parliament with the Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel and for promoting Christian knowledge.

2d. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society: and his approval shall be necessary for the confirmation, revocation, and alteration of any of the By-laws, and for making any addition to them.

3d. All members of the Church are invited to unite with this Society as Subscribers. Any sum, however small, paid in advance, shall qualify a person to be a member for a year; and Ten Pounds, at one payment, shall entitle one to be a member for life.

4th. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall take place in Charlottetown, on the first Wednesday in February, when a Report of the proceedings of the past year, and the Treasurer's Account, shall be presented, and all officers chosen. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time, when the President—or, in his absence, two or more Vice-Presidents—or the Executive Committee, shall consider it desirable.

5th. The Committee Meetings shall be held on the third Tuesday in April, July, and October; on the fourth Wednesday in January, and on the day previous to the Annual Meeting—(seven members to constitute a

quorum), and Special Meetings on such other days as the President, or one of the Vice-Presidents, and five members of the Committee may deem advisable; and all applications for Money Grants shall be in writing, and sent to the Secretary a month previous to the Committee Meeting to be held on the day previous to the Annual Meeting, at which all appropriations shall be made.

6th. The Quarterly Meeting, held in January shall be open to the attendance of two Committee members of each Country Association; at which Meeting all Resolutions will be framed, and all notices of motions, about to be brought forward at the General Meeting, sent in.

7th. All Meetings of the Society, or its Committees, shall be opened with the form of prayer at present used by the D. C. S. of Nova Scotia.

8th. There shall be two or more Vice-Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of the Island, for the time being, shall be the first; and the others, with such officers as may be required for the proper working of the Society, shall be nominated by the Executive Committee,—such nomination to be subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting.

9th. That where District Committees are formed in country parts of the Island, the Clergymen of those Districts be requested to furnish to the Secretary of this Society, one month previous to the Quarterly Meeting in January, all such matters as they may think advisable to be embodied in the Annual Report,—a draft of which shall be laid before the Committee for its approval.

10th. The Accounts of the Society shall be closed on the 1st of January, and be audited previous to the Annual Meeting.

11th. No change in the By-laws of this Society shall be proposed at a General Meeting unless the proposed alteration shall have been previously fully canvassed (at least) at two Quarterly Meetings of the Committee.

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12th. The principal objects which shall engage the attention of the Society shall be as follows :—

1. The employment of Missionary Clergymen in the Island.
2. Assistance to the Endowment of Parishes.
3. Assistance to the Erection or Enlargement of Churches or Chapels, or Parsonage-houses belonging to the United Church of England and Ireland.
4. Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.
5. Aid to the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, such aid being afforded by persons contributing to that especial object.

To these purposes generally the contributions will be applied ; while those who desire it may have their subscriptions appropriated to any one or more of these objects, as they think fit.

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Diocesan Church Society.

THE Twenty-eighth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in St. Paul's School-room, on Wednesday evening, 7th February, 1872. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in the Chair.

The meeting was opened by singing and prayer, when His Honor delivered a short address to the following effect:—

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—If there is one quality more than another which, under Responsible Government, a Governor ought to cultivate, and which, if he be a discreet man, he will cultivate, it is that of silence; and, therefore, it appears to me rather unreasonable that on rare occasions he should be expected to hold his own in the presence of many of those with whom public speaking is almost a profession. I hope that on this consideration you will kindly dispense with the address for which I find that my name has been put down on the programme of the evening's proceedings; and counting on your acquiescence, I will say little more than that it affords me much pleasure to address you, once more from this place, as Chairman of the annual meeting of the D.C.S.

In one way, it scarcely seems to me to be twelve months since last I addressed you; and yet in another, it does; for I know so much more of the place and people than I did a year ago, that I almost feel as though I had been acquainted and connected with the Colony for a very much longer period; and you will allow me to add, without flattery, that the more I know of it the better I like it.

You will, I am sure, regret to hear that very little has been done during the past year towards raising the Endowment Fund, to which I referred when last I had the pleasure of ad-

dressing you. I find that the Committee attribute the comparative want of success, in this important matter, to a want of unity in Church affairs. Whatever the cause may be, the result is to be deeply deplored, for if we do not prepare beforehand for the time when the home societies will no longer be able to come to our assistance, the effort, or the emergency, when that time comes, will be all the more difficult to be successfully encountered.

On the other hand, you will be pleased to hear that the Sunday Schools and Bible Classes, which are conducted by the clergy of the Church of England, in this Colony, have made satisfactory progress during the last twelve months. It cannot be out of place that at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society I should express my sense of the supreme importance, to the church community, of the character of the work done by schools and classes which supply to the members of the church population a description of teaching, which, for State reasons (reasons perfectly valid and sufficient, I am quite prepared to admit), is not supplied in the public schools; and that the Sunday Schools have maintained their average during the past year, must be to you, as it is to me, a matter for sincere congratulation.

I do not think that it is my province, as Chairman, to deliver any lengthened address, but rather to introduce to you those who are acquainted with the affairs of the Society; and, with your permission, I will now call upon the Secretary to read the report.

The Clerical Secretary then read the Report and financial statement for the past year. The statement showed an improvement on the Returns of former years, yet, looking at the future wants of the Church, the contributions are far below what they should be, and call for increased exertion on the part of all members of the Society.

The Chairman then called on the several gentlemen entrusted with the following resolutions, which were passed unanimously:

Moved by Judge Hensley, seconded by Rev. D. FitzGerald:

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That the Report now read be adopted and printed under the direction of the Committee; that the thanks of the meeting be granted to the collectors,—that the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee (see first page) for the present year, and that the Secretaries and Treasurer be reappointed.

Moved by L. P. W. DesBrisay, Esq., seconded by R. R. FitzGerald, Esq.:

That the Committee regrets so little has been contributed towards the Endowment Fund, and trusts that more active measures will be adopted this year; and would again express their gratitude for the long continued and efficient aid afforded to this Island by the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society.

Moved by Chas. Palmer, Esq., seconded by Rev. G. W. Hodgson:

That this meeting desires to acknowledge the many mercies vouchsafed to us by Almighty God during the past year, and trusts that our gratitude will be shown by increased support to this Society.

The Resolutions were ably and eloquently spoken to, and a more than ordinary animated discussion took place on some points contained in the Report, on which several gentlemen freely expressed their opinions.

The thanks of the meeting were then tendered to His Honor, by the Archdeacon, for his able conduct in the chair, after which the Archdeacon made a closing address, briefly touching on the several subjects adverted to during the evening, and dismissed the meeting with the benediction.

REPORT.

THE COMMITTEE appointed to prepare the Annual Report of the Society would recognize the goodness of Almighty God in the many mercies He has vouchsafed to our Church generally, and in the strength He has given to His Ministering Servants, in their important work.

The Reports received from the different Parishes bespeak a large amount of labour bestowed on them, and accompanied as that labour has been, with Prayer to the Giver of all Grace for His blessing, much fruit will arise, we trust, and glory of His name.

As each Clergyman has given an account of the work done in his Parish during the past year, the Committee are relieved from making any remarks on this particular point.

The Mission of Georgetown was vacated by Rev. Theo. Richey, in the summer. Since his resignation the Mission has been re-arranged, and the Rev. Mr. Scammell has been sent to take charge of Cherry Valley.

The visit of the Bishop to the Island, during the past summer, and a Confirmation held in this City, is fully mentioned in the Report.

One point to which the Committee would refer is, that the Lectionary recently adopted by the Province of Canterbury, and which has received the Royal Assent, has come into use in this Island since January 1st.

The Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, in his charge delivered in October last, speaks thus, in reference to the Lectionary:—"As one of the members, not only of the Ritual Commission, but of the smaller number who drew up the Existing Tables, I may be permitted to notice the extreme

care that was continued for again, and harmony for Lessons in the selection especially for

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care that was taken in the construction of them. Our labours continued for two years. We went over our work again and again, and spared neither time nor pains in bringing into harmony two important principles, 1st, the selection of Lessons in reference to their historical sequence, and 2ndly, the selection of such portions of Scripture as seemed most especially fitted for public reading.

It may further be remarked that the work, when completed, was submitted to all the Bishops and Deans, and to the Professors of Divinity at our Universities, and every recommendation thus received was carefully considered at one of our sittings.

When every thing that could be urged had been fully and elaborately considered, the Report was at last published. Every thing that care, study, and reconsideration could do was certainly done in this important work."

The whole, or nearly so, of the Book of Revelation is to be read.

They would not close this Annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society without acknowledging the kind and generous aid afforded to this Island by the Ven. the S. P. G. and the C. C. & C. S.

The gradual withdrawal of all pecuniary aid from this Island has already begun, and its total cessation is simply a work of time; and then it will remain with ourselves alone, whether the Church of England shall still continue in its ministrations among the Country Parishes, or be a matter of the past.

The Resolution of the 15th August, 1869, to raise if possible an Endowment Fund, has not produced any results. A want of Union among ourselves may be adduced as a reason. But the time has come when the wants of the Church can no longer be exclusively supplied by drawing from sources which lie elsewhere. The supply must come from our own soil, and that freely, or all that has been sown may wither away and die. In fact, it is now distinctly expected from us that we should make some vigorous efforts for ourselves. Let us look then, with an unshrinking eye at our position, consider the responsibilities which devolve upon us, remembering how dear our Reformed Church ought to be to our hearts, and how imperative is her claim upon our allegiance and support.

We now present the Reports from the Parishes, but the Committee do not hold themselves responsible for the statements of the several writers.

SAINT PAUL'S.

Rev. D. FITZGERALD reports that the annexed return will show the number of Church services which have been held, religious ceremonies performed, and parochial and other visits paid during the past year.

Upwards of 90 Bibles, prayer books and other suitable reward books have been given to the most diligent and attentive of the Sunday School scholars.

The general church Library contains some 1640 volumes, containing useful, religious, and entertaining knowledge. The Vestry has been enlarged and improved, and two hot air Furnaces for the better heating of the Church have been erected at a cost of upwards of £100.

A Concert in aid of the poor, which realized £22 15s. 9d., and a Strawberry Festival in aid of the Furnaces, which made over £50, have been among the extra efforts put forth by the members of the Church during the past year.

The new and revised Table of Lessons, as prepared by a Royal Commission, appointed by the Crown, approved of by Archbishops and Bishops of the Church, a table which gives a greater variety of Lessons, and a more enlarged and general acquaintance with the Holy Scriptures, has been adopted at the commencement of the year, and carefully prepared sheets have been printed for the use of the members of the Church, as a very limited supply of prayer books, with the revised Table attached thereto, has as yet been imported to the Island.

A young man's Bible Class—under the guidance of our late valued Superintendent of the Sunday school—is held on the afternoon of Sunday, in the Vestry.

A Teachers' Bible Class, hitherto held on Wednesday evening, open to all, in connection with a general prayer meeting, is held on Friday evening in the School Room, in addition to the young women's Bible Class, held in the same building every Sunday afternoon. There is also a Ladies' Bible Class on Thursday afternoon, 3.30. The Sunday School has upon its roll 200 Scholars and 30 Teachers.

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The average attendance at the monthly celebration of the Lord's Supper has been 88, and on Easter Day there were 120 present to partake of that Sacred Ordinance.

The attendance on the accustomed services of the Church is generally good, and the Sacramental collections for the poor are in advance of those of last year.

Owing to the overcrowded and neglected state of the general Burial Ground, some steps have been taken to secure a suitable piece of land, which it is to be hoped will prove successful, and not only remove a reproach which in part reflects on ourselves, but remedy an evil long felt by the community.

SAINT PETER'S.

In this Church the services have been continued without interruption since my last report. The number of the services from Advent, 1870, to Advent, 1871, is as follows:—

Whole number of Services, 828—of these, 117 have been celebrations of the Holy Communion.

Baptisms, 20, (2 of these adult.)

Burials, 5.

Several events of interest have marked the past year. In November last we had a visit from the Bishop, who very kindly came at that unusual time to administer the rite of Confirmation to 18 Candidates who desired to avail themselves of that ordinance.

Objections having been made by some of the citizens to a piece of land spoken of last year, being used as a burying ground, the Chaplain and Church Wardens agreed to sell it and purchase another. A larger lot than the first has been procured about a mile from town; it has been properly fenced, laid off, planted with ornamental trees—was consecrated by the Bishop at the time of his visit, and is now ready for use.

I am indeed thankful to be able to report that there is this ground where a burial can take place without the painful circumstances which have so often accompanied interments in the general grave yard, and where a reverent and christian care will, I trust, be taken of the bodies of the faithful departed.

While the Bishop was here the young men of our congregation presented him with an address, thanking him for his kindness in coming so frequently, and asking him to accept from them an Episcopal ring.

A mission conducted by members of the society of St. John the Evangelist, Oxford, was held for about a fortnight during the month of August last. I believe that much good resulted from it, and its effects will I trust be lasting.

But the most important events have been the procuring a site for, and building a school-house—the opening a day school for boys, and procuring the aid of another Clergyman, as master of the school, and assistant in the work of the Church. It is, indeed, a great satisfaction to have done this much in providing for the education of the young of our flock, and I trust that what we have done will be an incentive to further exertion. The school-house is attached to the Church, and of convenient size. There is a small chancel which may be opened whenever we wish to hold a service in the room. For Sunday School, Choir practices, and Bible classes, the room is most useful and convenient.

The List of contributions speaks for itself. The many various helpers of whom I have before spoken, still continue their labor of love, in which, during the past year, they have been joined by other volunteers.

MILTON AND RUSTICO.

The Archdeacon reports that the past year has been one of more than ordinary activity in my mission. The Churches at Milton and Rustico have been so much improved in their appearance and accommodation that we have now all the requirements of a well appointed church. The new open seats, with grained oak gothic panels, the walls covered with a granite paper, decorated with illuminated Scripture texts, and its neat chancel, give Milton Church quite a unique appearance. A cabinet Organ has so improved the congregational singing that all are delighted with the change. The Church at Rustico has been shingled and painted outside. The interior has also been painted, a Vestry built, and other alterations have been made to the manifest improvement of the Church. A new Organ has been imported from the proceeds of a Tea and Bazaar. The congregation has been larger than usual, owing in some measure to the services being held every Sunday, during the Summer and Autumn months, instead of once a fortnight as formerly. The contributions from the whole mission have exceeded any previous year. The communicants are steadily increasing. Our Sunday Schools, on the whole, are satisfactory, but I regret the closing of one for want of a suitable person to undertake the management. It is to the ladies of my congregation I am largely indebted for valuable help in this and every good work, without whose untiring energy and zeal much that has been accomplished would not have been done. To them my best thanks have been given. In the last Census Milton stands next to Alberton, which has

the largest increase of Church members in the Archdeaconry I would also hope that our Spiritual progress, which is of paramount importance, has corresponded with our temporal advancement, for which all the praise is due to God, without whose blessing our best directed efforts will be fruitless. I have been able to keep up the average number of three services on Sundays throughout the year, and I am thankful to add that the congregations have been large and attentive. At the commencement of the new year I received a most gratifying and cordial address from my parishioners at Milton, with a donation of £20 5s., in addition to their annual contribution to my Stipend—to use their own words, “as a small token of love and respect”—such an unexpected proof of good will and affection strengthen the bonds of mutual regard between a Pastor and his flock, whose interests are so closely blended together.

ST. ELEANOR'S.

The Rector states that while, through the blessing of God, he has been enabled to go through the same routine of Parochial work as in former years, there is nothing very striking to report. Besides a number of week day services and parochial visitings from house to house, he still keeps up three full Sunday services which have been very well attended.

Nearly 200 children have been in attendance at the Sunday School, most of whom have been carefully instructed in the catechism of the Church, and much has been done to interest them by providing for them a School Festival in the Summer, and recently a Christmas Tree and Tea, both of which were well attended, and seemed to afford much satisfaction to the children and their friends.

The Saint Eleanor's congregation has been much affected of late years by removals from the neighborhood. Some of these families have gone to Summerside, and it has become a matter of necessity that we should either build a new Church or enlarge the present one, in order to meet the wants of the parish.

The Rector hopes that sufficient funds will be forthcoming to warrant the immediate commencement of this work.

He also mentions that there have been upwards of £100 raised in the mission for various Church purposes, besides what has been paid towards his salary.

NEW LONDON.

Rev. Mr. Cox reports that having received Priest's Orders in June last he has been enabled to perform his duties with greater satisfaction to himself, and he trusts with profit to his people. Holy Communion has been administered monthly, in both the churches, and communicants' meetings held once a month.

The ordinary duties of the Parish have been performed, together with much pastoral visiting—in a few instances weekly services were omitted in consequence of the weather. Confirmation classes are about to be formed, and he hopes that many will be brought unto the Fold of the Great Shepherd.

Some repairs have been made to St. Stephen's church, at Burlington—the gallery seated, the outside painted white, and some alterations made in the Pews, and it is hoped the interior of the Church will be painted and grained. A generous friend, in Charlottetown, has presented the congregation of St. Stephen's, with a superior Cabinet Organ, which, we trust, will add considerably to the Psalmody of our worship.

Tracts and Periodicals have been circulated during the Summer. The Sunday Schools were maintained in both churches; and at St. Stephen's much interest has been shown by the parents and wardens by their frequent presence and active aid.

The Missionary reports that he has frequently received tokens of kindness and good will from his Parishioners.

PORT HILL.

The Rev. E. Ball reports that through the past year public worship has been regularly held in each of the three districts in this mission, and with an increase of thirteen full services above the number for past year. A few more services have also been given at the School Room, in Northam, where the full attendance has been very encouraging.

The collections made by the Scholars of the two Sunday Schools for the S. P. G., the offertory and the subscriptions for Diocesan Church Society, all show an increase, compared with the sums taken last year for the same objects.

A fund has been raised for lighting the church at Port Hill, for the monthly evening service. The offertory at Lot 11 for the past two years has been set apart for providing some Eucharistic vessels ; this fund has been added too by the kind donations of some English friends, so that we are now enabled to purchase them. The sum of £37 3 was readily subscribed for a Cabinet Organ, which will now afford valuable assistance.

For the instrumental music hitherto given by a member of the choir at Port Hill, the thanks of the congregation are due. He trusts that God's Blessing has in unseen ways rested on his work.

CHERRY VALLEY.

The Rev. Edwin Scammel reports that he took charge of this mission in July last. A slight change has taken place in the division of labor between this mission and that of Georgetown. Mount Stewart has been taken from the latter and added to the former. Southport has been left to the care of the clergymen of St. Paul's.

That he now resides at Cherry Valley, as the central point of his mission. His appointments at the different churches he has been enabled to keep. The congregations generally have been pretty good.

The collection for Diocesan Church Society is a little short of that of the previous year, this may be accounted for by the general depression which has followed the early forming of the ice.

ALBERTON.

The Rev. Mr. Dyer reports that he has been enabled to labor through another year of the church's work, and to keep up the regular appointments in the ten several stations throughout his mission. As Alberton is becoming every year a place of more importance, Divine Service should be held there every Sunday—a matter he hopes to effect. The congregation of St. Peter's has been large. Holy Communion has been administered monthly, besides many private communions to the sick. The Sunday School—under Mrs. Dyer—has been largely attended. At Kildare Capes, and at Tignish, the usual services have been held. The Sunday School at the Capes, under the care of some of the members there, has been in operation, and has favorably progressed. The Sunday School at Tignish, conducted by Mr. Charles Reid, the District School Master, who is also licensed by the Bishop to perform Divine Service, and to visit places where he cannot attend, has been in operation. Mr. Reid has also conducted a small Sunday School at Lot 2, and visited the sick. He is a hard working young man and worthy of encouragement and support. One monthly service at Montrose has been encouragingly attended by all denominations. At Cascumpeque village the congregation has been unusually large; this is also a mixed assembly. In visiting Lots 7 and 8, he found a number of Church families whom he promised to visit. He hopes this new station will become an important one.

The Services and Prayer Meetings at Upper and Lower Kildare, Western Road, Lot 3, and the Western Road, Lots 5 and 6, have been generally well attended.
