P. E. Islander Wanted On Charge of Attempted Murder

REV. SIMPSON'S REPLY

Clergyman Who Arraigned the Treating Clause in Prohibition Act Answers Premier's Reply--Death of L. L. Beer--Wanted Dogfish Reduction Plant.

TOKIO, Oct. 16--The peace treaty with Russia went into effect today. The text of the treaty was published this afternoon.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 16--The text of the treaty of peace concluded by Russia and Japan at Portsmouth, N. H. Sept. 5 and signed by Emperor Nicholas and the Emperor of Japan, October 14 is as follows:

The Emperor of Japan on one part and the Emperor of all the Russias on the other part animated by a desire to restore the blessing of peace to their countries have resolved to conclude a treaty of peace and have for this purpose named their plenipotentiaries, that is to say for his Majesty the Emperor of Japan, Baron Komura Jutaro, Jussai, Grand Cordon of the Imperial order of the Rising Sun in 1st class for foreign affairs, and His Excellency Takahira Kogoro, Imperial order of the Sacred Treasure, his minister to the United States; and for His Majesty, the Emperor of all the Russias, His Excellency Sergius Witte, his secretary of state and his minister to the United States, and His Excellency Baron Roman Rosen, master of the Imperial court of Russia, his minister and plenipotentiary to the United States, who after having exchanged their full powers which were found to be good and authentic have concluded the following articles:

Article 1--The Emperor of Japan on one part and the Emperor of all the Russias on the other part have agreed that from the day of the signing of the present treaty the prohibition of the importation of spirits of wine, of wine and of beer shall be lifted and that from the same day the importation of spirits of wine, of wine and of beer shall be permitted to the same extent as in the case of the other countries of the world.

It Was Officially Given Out In St. Petersburg and Tokio This Afternoon and Is Now In Full Operation--Marks Last Stage of Recent Devastating War.

The imperial government of Japan on their part undertake that the property rights of Russian subjects in territory above referred to shall be perfectly respected.

Article 10--Reserves to Russian subjects, inhabitants of the territory ceded to Japan, right to sell their real property and to carry out their business in the territory shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of the additional article II annexed to this treaty.

Article 11--Russia engages to arrange with Japan regarding Japanese subjects rights of fishing along the coast of the Russian possessions in the Japan, Okhotsk and Behring seas.

Article 12--The treaty of commerce and navigation between Japan and Russia having been annulled by the war the imperial governments of Japan and Russia engage to adopt as a basis for their commercial relations, pending the conclusion of a new treaty of commerce and navigation the basis of the treaty which was in force previous to the present war.

Article 13--So soon as possible after the present treaty comes into force all prisoners of war shall be reciprocally restored to their respective countries.

INDUSTRIAL GROWTH

We still hear an occasional lament that confederation ruined certain lines of business in St. John, and the boot and shoe factories are always cited in evidence. On another page of today's Times is told the story of a factory in Fredericton, employing 130 to 150 persons the year round, which is able to sell shoes in Montreal, and which disposes of the great bulk of its product in the west. This is a local factory, started with local capital. It met with difficulties at the outset, which may have rendered necessary for a time some demands upon its capital, but the company were confident of their ability to produce the goods and command success. They have done so, not by confining themselves to the local market, but by reaching out into that market which has been popularly supposed to be unavailable for the products of maritime province industry. The Times does not make this statement as an advertisement. There are other maritime province shoe factories which are doing a thriving business. It is worth while to call attention to the fact, and to suggest that there are other things to make as well as shoes. This province has a future as a centre of manufacturing enterprises. With capital, intelligence and enterprise much more can be accomplished than is now perhaps dreamed of. We must learn to forget some things and become aware of the importance of growing opportunities.

ONE ONTARIO VIEW

The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto News expresses the view that Ontario has lost much by the retirement of Sir William Mulock from the federal cabinet. It chooses Sir William as "the last of the old type of Ontario Liberal who sought really to impose his point of view on the general policy of the country." COMFORT FOR HOUSEHOLDERS

Not Expected That the Price of Coal Will be High This Winter.

The present price of coal and the probability of a higher rate, is a matter that is agitating the minds of many of St. John's citizens.

In conversation with one of the leading coal merchants this morning, he said he did not see any immediate cause for higher prices, but it was possible that there would be a raise in the rates.

At present the prices for soft coals are as follows: Reserve Sydney, \$9.50 per chaldron; Broad Cove, \$7.50; Old Mine Sydney and Pitou, \$7.50.

American hard coals are selling at about \$2.25 per ton delivered in bulk, and Scotch hard coal at \$4.50 to \$4.75 per ton delivered in bags.

It was pointed out that St. John is in a very good position to secure coal from the various sources of supply, being readily accessible from Nova Scotia mines, the American markets and also the Scotch coal regions.

The traffic in Scotch coal is increasing every year, and the various grades brought over from the old country are meeting with ready sale.
