

Your Opportunity to Aid Presentation of Clear, Definite Case for Freight Rate Relief

THE engagement of Mr. F. C.
Cornell, of Montreal, to prepare the Maritime Province case in regard to freight rates marks an advance in the affairs of Eastern Canada. It is without doubt the most important undertaking that engaged the attention of the business men of this part of Canada for many years. Mr. Cornell's appointment is one of the results of the Maritime conference at Moncton, when the three provincial governments were invited to guarantee expenses in connection with the preparation of a memorial to the Railway Commission of Canada showing wherein the Maritime Provinces suffer from existing railway tariffs.

Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have joined hands in financing the undertaking suggests at once that the provincial gests at once that the provincial governments, as well as the people of the Maritime Provinces, are seized with the importance of insisting that justice be done to this part of Canada in so far as freight rates are concerned. It is noteworthy that Prince Edward Island, the smallest of the provinces, was the first to pledge its support. In the past spasmodic and detached efforts have been made to present the case of this section of the country, but for the first time there is absolute non-political co-operation and a determination to see that everything possible is done to place in the hands of the Railway Commissioners the information necessary to enable them to intelli-gently consider Maritime condi-

THE brief is being prepared, at the suggestion of the Privy Council that the Railway Commission fully investigate freight rates as applied to the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Cornell will have the assistance of other freight rate experts. It is necessary, however, to place at his disposal all information bearing on the difficulties under which all industries in the Maritime Provinces labor as a result of freight rate discrimination. In order that he and his associates may intelligently prepare their case, all manufacturers and other business interests in the Maritime Provinces should see to it that Mr.

complaints they have to make in

complaints they have to make in regard to existing freight rates.

The Maritime Provinces have their opportunity to state clearly and definitely in what directions they expect relief. IF THEIR CASE IS INSUFFICIENTLY CLEAR, THE FAULT WILL LIE AT THEIR OWN DOORS. Therefore it is essential, in the interests of the Maritime Provinces, that all classes of business endeavor to present their claims at an early date AND TO PRESENT THEM IN SUCH A MANNER AS TO LEAVE NO DOUBT AS TO WHAT IS MEANT AND WHAT IS DESIRED.

THE Boards of Trade in Saint John, Halifax, Moncton and

Charlottetown are taking a leading part in the movement and have invited other Boards of Trade to Join with them, and they are also urging individual members to lend every assistance to Mr. Cornell. It must be borne in mind that the result of his efforts will mean much or little to the Maritime Provinces. The freight rates which are about to be fixed in the Dominion cannot but have a bearing on business conditions in these parts for many years to come. We have been complaining of conditions and have now an oportunity to make ourselves heard. Consequently every business man, having the interests of the Maritime Provinces at heart, should not delay in conveying to Mr. Cornell his views of the

freight rate situation, together with constructive suggestions as to how, in his opinion, injustices may be removed.

So if there are manufacturers and business men in the Maritime Provinces who have in the past complained of handicaps through freight tariffs applying in this section, they should AT ONCE place in the hands of Mr. Cornell, or in the hands of the Boards of Trade, information which will be of assistance in stating the Maritimes' case.

Mr. Cornell has opened an office in Moncton, where he will be in a position to give his undivided attention to the matters referred to in this article, and he will be glad of any assistance that may be accorded him.
