

TWENTY HORSES HAVE ENTERED THE 2.30 LIST

The Halifax Recorder's annual resume of harness racing in the maritime provinces shows that 214 heats were trotted or paced during the season in 2.30 or better, and forty-eight of these were in 2.20 or faster. This is not as good a showing as last year, but most of the racing was not until late in the season, except in Cape Breton, where there were more meetings held within a radius of a few miles than in any other part of the provinces.

Twenty-one horses owned in the provinces entered the 2.30 list, and another owned in Maine entered the 2.20 list on a provincial track, and nineteen already in the list reduced records.

Frank Patch, driven by Frank Adams, made the fastest time by any horse owned in the maritime provinces this season, though not on a provincial track, his new record of 2.11½ having been made at Brockton, Mass. His stable mate, Dingola, also owned by J. B. Mitchell, Halifax, and driven by Fred Cameron, made the fastest mile on a provincial track, he having paced two successive heats at Fredericton in 2.18½.

The Fredericton track, as last year, thus has the fastest mile of the season to its credit. Dingola thus also equals the stallion record for the provinces, which is held by Frank Patch, so that Mr. Mitchell has in his stable the two fastest stallions in the provinces.

The fastest gelding in the provinces this year was the pacer Jas. K. Newbro, owned by Hamilton Kitchen, of Fredericton, and handled by Tommy Raymond. He paced both the first and third heats in the 2.19 class at Chatham, N. B., in 2.13 8-4, 21.13 3-4.

The fastest time by a mare on a maritime province track this season was 2.14, also at Chatham, by Jennie W., owned in Montreal.

This mare started in eight races this season, winning five, all of which were of extra heats, one at Halifax, lasting six heats, and another at Fredericton seven heats. Her total purse winnings for the year are \$1,072.50, the largest money winner of the season on provincial tracks.

The fastest new pacing performer of the year, owned in the provinces, was Bingen the Great, owned by W. H. Murchie, Milltown, N. B., which took a record of 2.15½ at Bangor, Me. This stallion had a previous trotting record of 2.19½, but this was his first year at pacing. The fastest new performer of the year on a provincial track was Lady Fondly, five-year-old pacing mare, owned by Hugh Love, St. Stephen, and driven by Johnson, took a record of 2.15 8-4, which is the fastest mile ever made in the provinces by a maritime province bred horse as a new 2.80 performer.



India also has banking problems peculiar to herself. The Indian public is slowly substituting for the time-honored custom of burying its gold, the more lucrative practice of making bank deposits, bearing interest. The government considers that this practice should not only continue unchecked, but should be encouraged by legislation, which will make the deposits as safe as possible.

For years the world's supply of silver has been appreciably lowered by the Indian habit of burying savings, but the abundance of the metal has rendered this practice comparatively harmless as far as the rest of the world is concerned.

Lately, however, with increased prosperity, the East Indians have begun to

FINAL ESTIMATES ON CANADA'S GRAIN CROP

Ottawa, Nov. 6—At the end of September, reports to the census and statistics bureau gave the total estimated wheat production of Carada for 1913 as 207,575,000 bushels, an increase of 8,838,000 bushels over the yield of 1912. The yield per acre was 21.15 bushels, as against 20.42 last year.

The total yields of oats was 391,418,000 bushels, an increase of 30,000,000 bushels, barley 44,348,000 bushels, an increase of 344,000 bushels; rye, 2,559,000 bushels; peas, 3,974,000; flax, 14,918,000; corn, 14,086,000 bushels.

For the three Northwest provinces the total yield of wheat is estimated at 189,116,000 bushels; oats, 139,595,000 lushels; barley, 27,904,000 bushels; rye, 686,000 bushels, and flax, 14,808,000 bushels. Ottawa, Nov. 6-At the end of Sep-


