## TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION

## OF THE

## SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

## FIRST DAY.

The Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the 16th day of June, 1885.

Divine Service was held in the Cathedral and the Holy Communion was administered. The Lord Bishop officiated, assisted by the Very Rev. the Dean of Montreal, and the Ven. Archdeacons Lindsay and Lonsdell.

The Sermon was preached by the Rev. Rural Dean Naylor, Incumbent of Clarendon.

The Synod assembled in the Synod Hall at two o'clock, when the Session was opened with prayer by the Lord Bishop.

The rolls were called by the Secretaries.

It was decided that the Offertory at this morning's service should be devoted to the Mission Fund of this Diocese.

It was moved by the Rev. Canon NORMAN, seconded by Rev. Canon ROBINSON:

That the Rev. Canon Empson be re-elected Clerical Secretary.—*Carried.*

It was moved by Mr. MOORE, seconded by Mr. MACRAE, Q. C.:

That Dr. Alexander Johnson be re-elected Lay Secretary.—*Carried.*

It was moved by Mr. F. WOLFERSTAN THOMAS, seconded by Mr. C. GARTH :

That Mr. James Hutton be re-elected Treasurer of this Diocese.—*Carried.*

It was moved by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, seconded by Mr. GARTH :

That Messrs. G. W. Simpson and S. C. Fatt be elected Auditors.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named Dr. Davidson Church Advocate.

The BISHOP then appointed the several Standing Committees. (See pp. 158-60).

The BISHOP appointed half-past nine o'clock to-morrow for a meeting of Archdeacons and Rural Deans, in the Synod Office.

Rev. J. S. STONE moved, seconded by Rev. Canon NORMAN :

A suspension of the Rules of Order to permit the introduction of a resolution of kindly greeting with the Presbyterian Church; and a message of greeting to the Synod of the Diocese of Huron now in session.—*Carried.*

Rev. J. S. STONE then moved, seconded by Rev. Canon NORMAN :

That this Synod now assembled sends its kindly greetings to the Presbyterian General Assembly now in Session in this City; and that it commends their deliberations to the guidance and blessing of Almighty God.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named Rev. J. S. Stone, Rev. Canon Norman, Dr. Davidson and Mr. George Macrae as a Committee to carry this resolution into effect.

It was moved by Rev. Canon ANDERSON, seconded by Mr. C. GARTH :

That this Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, sends its loving greetings to the honored Bishop of the Diocese of Huron now in session, and prays God abundantly to bless their deliberations to His own glory, and to the extension of the Kingdom of His dear Son.—*Carried.*



The BISHOP named the same Committee, along with the Rev. Canon Anderson and Mr. Garth, to carry this resolution into effect.

An invitation was read by the Clerical Secretary from Sir William Dawson, Principal of McGill College, to members of the Synod to visit the Library and Museum of the University. A supply of Guide Books accompanied the invitation.

The LORD BISHOP, then delivered his charge to the Synod.

*Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:*

It is with much thankfulness that I meet you in Synod once more. The year which has passed away since our last gathering together in this place has been one not lacking in excitement and anxiety, both within and without the Church. That I meet you in time of peace when so lately the war news was the first question of interest in our daily life, is matter for grateful acknowledgment to Almighty God, who is the only Giver of all victory, for national satisfaction and for mutual congratulation. Still our anxieties are too real, as well as too recent, our foreign policy too uncertain, for unmixed complacency. It becomes us to rejoice with moderation, to cultivate sentiments of mercy and justice, and, above all, to institute inquiry into our own conduct as men and citizens, that we may see whether we have done our duty (especially as Churchmen) to advance the civilization and promote the growth in mental and spiritual acquirements of our fellow-subjects through the Dominion. Within our section of the Church we have not been without our troubles. The almost universal depression in business has not left us untouched, and our different Church funds have suffered in consequence. Just when the circumstances of our people (especially those in the poorer districts of our mission field both at home and abroad) required unusual sympathy and support, our ability to afford both has been below the average. Up the Gatineau, the Upper Ottawa and on the Rouge, where the settlers are English-speaking people, I have by no means been able to make the supply meet the demand. Younger members of our Church are growing up there in ignorance and carelessness, because we cannot afford to send them a settled pastorate. In the south and south-east parts of the diocese the French are crowding us out, and we are without means to hold French services, which in some places would keep within the fold of the Church many of our children now being educated in French schools. I hope you who are representatives of the Church will see it to be your duty to stimulate our self-sustaining congregations (as well as those partially dependent on the Mission Fund itself) to give very liberal support to that Mission Fund which is the backbone of our Church system, and without which we cannot maintain the position which is both our privilege and our duty,—a leading part and a large share in the Evangelization of Canada. There seems to me no better time than the present for speaking face to face about these personal duties.

They concern us all. They come home to all. Valuable as private opportunities are for the interchange of private opinions, the meeting of Synod is still more opportune for the discussion of all that touches the general advancement and extension of the Kingdom of God. I shall therefore introduce a few things which may seem to some of less moment, but which, in my judgment, lie at the base of Christianity itself. And, first, I must mention the surprise and grief I have felt in finding so many of our Church members neglecting to bring their children to baptism, nay, more, in some instances, while openly identified with our services and worship, they have never themselves been washed with the waters of baptism. This neglect does not arise from real or fancied principle or prejudice, but simple carelessness, and nothing more. There was at first neglect, and then the convenient season to repair the omission had never arrived. I know that some of the clergy are doing their best to remedy this heathenism, but I mention it because I wish to come to their assistance. The indolence or unbelief (whichever it may be) does not arise from clerical supineness; but there may be difficulties other than moral, and I think a fair discussion will be helpful to all. No question of disputed doctrine comes in here; if there did I should heed the rule and avoid the subject. Our members are baptized as a matter of positive duty, and the neglect of this sacrament is surely not only out of keeping with the decency and order inculcated by St. Paul, but also a great sin. It may not be impossible that the fear of intrusion on the one hand, and the idea of liberty on the other has in some instances brought about this and kindred anomalies. Still, reform is needed. And surely it becomes the disciple of Christ to obey this His parting command. And then, I must express the pain I have felt in observing that Christians have too little patience with one another. I feel it my duty, very gravely to exhort, especially all in authority in the Church, to promote the peace and loyalty of their own congregations. Is there not too much self-will and prejudice? Is there enough of effort to understand what those who differ from us intend by that difference? Are not hard words made to do duty for clear arguments? Might it not too often be said, in our local disputes (as was said by the Apostle of some of the early converts) "Having swerved, they have turned aside unto vain jangling, desiring to be teachers of the law, understanding neither what they say nor whereof they affirm? Now the end of the commandment is charity, out of a pure heart and of a good conscience and of faith unfeigned." (I Tim i. 5-7). Beloved, let every man amongst us, whatever be his calling in the Church, whether pastor, warden, vestryman or pewholder, consider that his very prominence in the congregation binds him to observe the law of love. Let the layman, as he acts in vestry, bear in mind the old and sick and their needs, the poor and the afflicted and their pressing wants, the young and ignorant and their necessities. Let the layman remember that a clergyman is often more to such as these than he is to the prosperous man in his vigor and social power. Let the layman visit the parish or mission as friend and consoler, before he deals in vestry with a pastor, then he will be in a position to act wisely and to avoid mistakes, which may cause him lifelong regret; and let the pastor be courteous and concili-

story with those of the flock who cannot appreciate the efforts made on their behalf, or who will not understand the course of action. Beloved, be slow to impute motives or imagine affronts. You of the Clergy are, or ought to be, more strong in spirit than those who have not been called to the Ministry; and it ought to be your first duty to show an example to the Church of those virtues—peace, courtesy, and good will, which are classed amongst the fruits of the spirit. There is verily a fault amongst us, that we hear so much about disorderly vestries, dissatisfied congregations and self-willed Clergymen (and even read about these things in the public prints). I must add that in many cases these troubles arise, in the first instance, from some small misunderstanding, which no one is patient enough, or clear-headed enough, or self-denying enough, to put right. Then (magnified by pride or suspicion, extended and distributed by gossip, and confirmed by obstinacy) the misunderstanding becomes a widespread and fatal quarrel. Of course men must differ in opinion; we are not alike in form or feature, we are not alike in mind, taste or habit, but we may and ought to be alike in the exercise of charity, forbearance and Christian courtesy. We ought to be alike in the happy possession of a power of forgiveness, of a noble unselfishness, of a conduct worthy our high calling in Christ Jesus, worthy of those in whom the Spirit of God is pleased to dwell. "Grieve not the Holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption."

You are fully aware that no body of people, as a body, rises mentally and morally above the level of the teacher. Well, many a man placed in the responsible position of pastor to a congregation, is so weighed down by a sense of his responsibility, that health and strength give way and he is ready to cry with the prophet: "Now let me die, for I am not better than my fathers." The reason is, the pastor's office is one requiring great experience and sympathy as well as grace, so much more than can possibly be acquired within college walls, or indeed learned at all before years have given patience and strength, that I have tried with more or less success to attach our students and college graduates to some of the older and larger missions, ordaining them to work under older and tried clergymen. It is true the clergy [old and young] like their independence, and do all they can to promote the establishment of isolated and separate missions, while the people on their part prefer the individual services of a clergyman. The motives of all are good. I do not object to the independence which comes of the one, nor the regular services and frequent visitations which result from the other. But I do desire for our young Clergymen lessons of obedience; I want them to learn to obey before they are called on to command. I want them to have some experience before they are required to assume responsibility. They are soldiers of the cross, and while they are brave, they must not be rash; while they are loyal and true they must not be headstrong. Our people ought to be served by men experienced in life, experienced in its demands, its failures, its successes. Men able to advise and guide; able to comfort and sustain; such men are not common, and if they were I have not means at command to induce them to give their services to this diocese.

We have good men amongst us, doing their work unto the Lord, some of them in the remote corners of our vineyard, where their usefulness is not so apparent to the Church as it would be in parts more thickly inhabited. And it is my constant regret that these pioneers in our missionary army do not receive remuneration in any way adequate to their services. Indeed I think it right to call your attention to the fact that whereas some bishops can offer their missionary clergy \$800 per annum, our Mission Board contents itself with \$600. This does not seem quite fair to our own men, and it is not surprising that resignations and removals to other dioceses are not uncommon. I sorely need help here. I should feel personally benefited by a very frank and deliberate discussion of this matter of Clergymen's stipends. Are we to rise or fall as a Church? Are we to induce our most capable young men to take orders [when so disposed] by assuring them of a maintenance? Or are we to comport ourselves so grudgingly that we belittle the office of the priest by the money value we put upon it? A hearty, earnest discussion might lead to more hopeful things, and if it did not result in larger collections it might at least direct a wiser expenditure. You know the proverb "Half a loaf is better than no bread"; but proverbs may deceive; half a loaf diet may end in atrophy. Which is worse? Atrophy or starvation? In the meantime I am doing what I can to get over difficult places with the help of the students of the Theological college. Where a missionary has left for another diocese, or age or sickness has for the time being rendered the pastor incapable, I have sent a student to fill the vacant place. They are young and inexperienced, and I use them in this way even more than is good for them or for us, but they are hopeful and energetic, have few needs; they make themselves useful, and are welcome. And I am very grateful for their assistance, for without it I should be compelled, for the time being, to close many a mission. And then it is right to remember, if only in recognition of the liberality of Church members of the generation now passing away, that we have made great progress within the last twenty-five years. We have now no assistance from the S. P. G., except in the way of pensions to a few of our oldest missionaries, whose time of active usefulness is nearly finished. But it is not enough to have attained to self-support, we must see that the missionary stipend is less meagre and insufficient, and we must provide more liberally for our working men. By liberal things alone can we hope to stand. You will observe that the Executive Committee have deemed it necessary to recommend reduction of the grants from the Mission Fund. You are not to understand by this that the Clergyman is to receive a smaller stipend, but that the Parish benefiting by his ministrations is to increase its subscriptions. I shall watch the consequences of this action with great care and anxiety, and I will, at least, whatever be the needs of the unoccupied places in the mission field, refuse to admit more missionaries to the diocese unless justice is done to those already serving. I think myself that it should be a recognized rule that some definite increase on the part of the Parish, and some equally definite decrease in the grant, should enter into

every agreement between the Executive Committee and the people of a Parish receiving assistance from the Mission Fund. There are, of course, exceptional circumstances, but those could easily receive exceptional treatment.

There was a motion by the Rev. H. W. Nye touching the Montreal Diocesan College left over from last Synod. The usefulness of that College in our missionary work you may easily infer from what I have already said. I hope that motion will receive from this Synod the attention it deserves, and have an early place in your deliberations. I am convinced that the capability of the College for good cannot be over-estimated, and I desire nothing better than that you should discuss its merits or faults (if there be any) to the fullest extent. I am quite sure that the more thoroughly the College is understood, the more satisfied you will be to identify it with the diocese. I frankly say for myself I do not see how I could carry on the work of the diocese without the aid of the College. But for the College I should be hopeless. The students and graduates, even with the drawbacks of youth and inexperience, are far more serviceable than untrained readers; besides, youth is a fault which time most surely mends, and these students, properly instructed in the doctrine and ritual of the Church, will be in the future the mainstay and strength of the diocese.

In the exercise of my prerogative, I have thought it right to divide the overgrown Deanery of Bedford. I believe this re-distribution of organized work will be agreeable to all our Clergy. The systematic periodic rural-decanal meetings have been found to answer well where the deanery is not too large. I ask for the new Rural Deans that recognition of their office and duties which their relation to the Bishop and his work demands. In a well-organized deanery, where the clergy are united by common interests, episcopal visitation is facilitated, while the binding together of neighboring missions and rectories in a closer bond must tend to the promotion of that strength of the diocese at large which consists in union. I deprecate the fostering of the spirit of congregationalism in the Church of England. It is foreign to her history, her doctrines and her ritual; ours is the common worship, the common prayer. The doors of our churches — of any and all of our church buildings — are open to all our members everywhere; the Holy Table is spread for all, for parishioner and stranger alike. When this wide charity shall be understood and (wherever the Church of England sets up her standard) practised, her members will increase and prosper. Just now there is too much of a different spirit. A congregation is too jealous of its rights and is afraid to share its privileges with sister congregations. I find, for example, that as soon as a congregation becomes self-supporting it hastens to cut itself off from outlying mission work; and the mission itself, unless it can have the whole services of a Clergyman, is apt to withhold a portion of his maintenance. If a better state of things is brought about, it will mainly be through the intervention of Rural Deans conversant with local details and acquainted with all the members of the Church, lay and clerical, in the deanery. One practise seems to be grow-

ing in the diocese which I may notice here: Clergymen have entered on negotiation for an exchange of missions without reference to the Bishop. This is wrong. It gives the Bishop no opportunity of controlling the admission to the diocese without placing him in a false position. If a Clergyman wishes to leave a church, he should ask his Bishop, and resign into his hands the care of souls. The Bishop receives from him, leaving the Bishop, in conjunction with the Synod, to fill the vacancy.

Since we last met we have lost the services of a valuable member of this body, the late Mr. Thomas Simpson. He was well known to most now present, and I am sure we shall miss his warm, earnest interest in all that appertained to Church work, both in this annual meeting of Synod and in the Executive Committee, of which he was for so many years an active and able member.

In response to the expressed wishes of some of our leading Clergy and laity, I have arranged to hold a Church Congress in this city on the 20th and two following days of October next. Prominent Church members, clerical and lay, from all parts of the Dominion, as well as from the United States and the Mother Church, have been invited to assist, and there is every hope that it will be an occasion of profit and blessing. The success of the Congress will, of course, mainly depend upon the welcome given to our visitors and the preparation made by ourselves to afford them such opportunities for speaking and hearing as shall justify the expenditure of money, time and trouble. I hope, therefore, this Synod will enter into the subject and identify itself, not as a body, but as individual members of the Church, with the undertaking, and enter into it with warmth and earnestness.

There are many things belonging to Church organization required for progress and stability not included in the business matters, which it is the chief concern of this Synod to conduct; yet, of course, it is to you we look in your private capacity to promote all our diocesan work, for who should be more interested in the spiritual welfare and progress of the Church than those who have the oversight of her temporal concerns? Churchmanship is a living, active state of being. It is not enough to receive her ordinances and acquiesce in her teaching; there must be the recognition of personal duties and responsibilities. I would, therefore, impress on my clerical brethren the necessity for providing interesting, responsible work for the newly-confirmed, that they may realize their membership and feel it to be a true good, both to themselves and those around them. There is ample scope for their energy, and many fields of spiritual labor where the harvest is wasting for want of laborers to gather it in. Our Sunday schools, for example, are by no means in a satisfactory condition. Everywhere I hear the complaint of want of efficient teachers. A Bible Class for the newly confirmed should be a part of every Church organization—a sort of normal class for the instruction and training of good teachers in distinctive Church doctrine, as well as in the principles and precepts of Holy Scripture. I must not detain you with details which belong more pro-

perly to clerical meetings and Church congresses, but, as I shall have no other opportunity just now to speak on the matter, and as I foresee that small and scattered congregations will be most anxious, while they are, from their circumstances, the least able to help themselves, I will suggest that much might be done by organized combination, and that classes, including the membership of a deanery, might have periodic times of meeting for the interchange of opinions, the exercise of model lessons, and many like advantages which will suggest themselves at once to those accustomed to consider and arrange such things.

In accordance with a resolution of this Synod at its last meeting, efforts are now being made to establish a "Girls' Friendly Society," with its central board in this city. I issued a circular last March, addressed to the Clergy of the diocese, commending it to their notice. You have in this society a great opportunity for moral and religious usefulness, of which I hope you will heartily avail yourselves.

In the course of the year I have visited 107 parishes, missions and mission stations, and administered the rite of confirmation in 81 churches. Of the 875 confirmed 355 were males and 520 females. I have admitted 7 persons to the office of deacon and promoted 5 to the priesthood. I have, besides, laid the foundation stones of two new churches, one at Thorne West and one at St. Lambert, and I have consecrated the new church at West Brome and the new burying-ground at Sorel. I will not detain you further from the work before you. I earnestly pray that God's blessing may rest upon your deliberations, and that His Holy Spirit will guide you into all truth and wisdom.

The Minutes of the Twenty-fifth Synod, as printed in the Journal of Synod, were considered as read, and were *confirmed*.

The Rev. Canon NORMAN read a Report of the Committee on Education, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The Rev. Canon NORMAN read a Report of Official Examiners of Church Schools, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The Rev. Canon NORMAN presented copies of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Report for 1884, and moved, seconded by Rev. J. KER:

That the report be received.—*Carried.*

The DEAN OF MONTREAL read a Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. Rural Dean LINDSAY read a Report of the Committee on Works of Mercy, embracing a Report from Rev. J. H. DIXON on Immigration, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The Rev. H. J. EVANS read a Report on the City Missionary's work, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The TREASURER stated that his Report is printed with the Report of the Executive Committee, and can be considered along with it.

The BISHOP named 2.30 for the consideration of this Report.

Rev. Canon MUSSEN read a Report of the Rural Deanery of Bedford.

Rev. Rural Dean LINDSAY read a Report of the Rural Deanery of Hochelaga.

Rev. Rural Dean FULTON read a Report of the Rural Deanery of Iberville.

Notices of motion were handed in by Archdeacon Evans, Canon Norman, Rural Dean Mussen, Mr. Hannaford, Rev. F. H. Clayton, Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay, Mr. J. M. Fisk.

The unfinished business was then taken up, and Dr. LEO H. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by MR. JAMES HUTTON:

"That inasmuch as the property, buildings and real estate held by the different Parishes and Missions in this Diocese partake of a diocesan, as well as a parochial character, it be enacted by this Synod,

"That no sale, disposal or exchange of any property held in any Parish or Mission for the purpose of Church work shall be made, nor shall any mortgage be granted thereon, without the consent of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which consent shall only be given after the Bishop shall have submitted the proposal to the Executive Committee of the Diocese, and to the legal adviser of the Synod;

"That no application shall be made to the Legislature of the Province of Quebec for authority to mortgage, sell, or in any way to interfere with or change the trust connected with the grant of any property held by any Parish or Mission within this Diocese for the purposes of the Church, otherwise than in the name of the Synod, and after due submission and consent thereby given."



It was moved in amendment by Rev. J. J. SCULLY, seconded by Mr. THOMAS WHITE :

That the word "enacted" in the first clause be removed, and the word "recommended" substituted therefor.

Amendment carried by a vote of 26 to 22.

The main motion as amended was then put and *Lost*.

By permission of the House notice was given of a motion by the Rev. J. H. DIXON.

The BISHOP then pronounced the Benediction and the Synod adjourned until 10 o'clock on Wednesday.

## SECOND DAY.

The Synod was opened with prayer by the BISHOP, after which the minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read by the Clerical Secretary, and were approved and signed by the Bishop.

The Rev. CLEMENT O. BROWN, of the Diocese of Quebec, was invited to take a seat in the House.

Mr. HUTTON having requested to be relieved from the duties of a Scrutineer of the vote for the Provincial Synod, the Bishop named Mr. Edgar Judge to act as Scrutineer in his place.

The Rev. Canon NORMAN moved, seconded by Rural Dean LINDSAY :

That the Rules of Order be suspended to enable him to move the following resolution.

Permission having been granted, he moved :

That the Rev. J. J. B. Allnatt, E. J. Hemming, Esq., D.C.L., and R. W. Henneker, Esq., D.C.L., a delegation from the Synod of Quebec, be permitted to address the Synod this afternoon, on the subject of securing a change in the School Law of this Province, so that religious instruction may be provided for the children in those schools which are under the control of the Protestant Committee of the Province of Quebec.—  
*Carried.*

The hour of five o'clock was named for the reception of the delegation.

The BISHOP named the following Special Committees : on Diocesan Temperance Society ; on Arrangements for Provincial Synod ; on Amendments in Temporalities and Synod Acts ; on Mission Sunday ; and on Official Examiners of Church Schools. (*See pp. 161-2*).

The Ven-Archdeacon EVANS read a Report of the Committee on Superannuation, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON read a Report of the Committee on the Library, and on Books and Tracts, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. Canon BELCHER read a Report of the Board of Domestic Missions, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Notices of motion were given by Rev. J. S. Stone, the very Rev. the Dean, Rev. Canon Anderson, the Hon. Judge Armstrong, Rural Dean Longhurst, Dr. Davidson.

The Rev. Rural Dean NYE moved, seconded by Mr. THOMAS WHITE, M.P. :

That whereas since our last meeting it has pleased Almighty God to remove from the sphere of his earthly labors Mr. Thomas Simpson, for many years an active and useful member of this Synod, we desire to place on record our high appreciation of our departed brother's character and work, and to convey to his family the assurance of our deep sympathy with them in their irreparable loss.—*Carried*.

The Rev. J. A. NEWNHAM moved the suspension of the Rules of Order to consider a motion of which notice has been given.—*Carried*.

He then moved, seconded by the Rev. J. H. DIXON :—

That we, the members of the Synod of Montreal, regard the excessive use of strong drink as one of the greatest hindrances to the growth of the Church of Christ, and would therefore welcome any measure which tends

to remove this evil. That we desire in this connection to express our gratitude to God for the rapid spread of temperance sentiment throughout the land, and especially for the legislation which has restricted the sale of intoxicating liquors. That we, having heard with deepest sorrow of the recent action of the Senate of Canada in amending the Canada Temperance Act in such a way as to destroy its usefulness, and to render inoperative the intention of those who, by a large majority, have succeeded in upwards of fifty counties in carrying the Act, hereby express the earnest hope that the House of Commons will preserve the prohibitory character of the Act by refusing concurrence in the amendment made by the Senate, excepting beer and light wines from its operation.

It was moved in amendment by Hon. Judge ARMSTRONG, seconded by Rev. F. H. CLAYTON:

That this Synod declines to pronounce any opinion upon the conduct of the Senate with reference to the amendments to the Scott Act, the question having become one of a political character.

At eleven o'clock the discussion was dropped, and the ballot was taken for the Executive Committee.

At half-past eleven o'clock the ballot was taken for the Delegates to the Provincial Synod.

At twelve o'clock the ballot was taken for the Diocesan Court, Rev. H. J. Evans' name being substituted for Rev. Joseph Merrick, not present.

The discussion was resumed on the amendment of Hon. Judge Armstrong.

By permission of the House the original motion was altered, so as to read thus:

That we, the members of the Synod of Montreal, regard the excessive use of strong drink as one of the greatest hindrances to the growth of the Church of Christ, and would therefore welcome any measure which tends to remove this evil. That we desire in this connection to express our gratitude to God for the rapid spread of temperance sentiment throughout the land, and especially for the legislation which has restricted the sale of intoxicating liquors, and that we hereby express the earnest hope that the House of Commons will preserve intact the character of the Canada Temperance Act, by refusing concurrence in the amendment made by the Senate, excepting beer and light wines from its operation.

The amendment was withdrawn, and the resolution was then put and *carried*.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod re-assembled at half-past two o'clock.

Dr. Henneker and Dr. Hemming, of the Diocese of Quebec, were invited to seats in the House.

Chancellor BETHUNE moved the adoption of the Report of the Executive Committee. (See Appendix pp. 190-232.)

The adoption of the first page was *carried*.

The Chancellor then moved the adoption of the Scale of Grants for 1885-86.

It was moved by Mr. HANNAFORD, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean NAYLOR :

That the Executive Committee be respectfully requested to reconsider its decision with regard to the reduction of the grants to the Missions of North Wakefield, Aylmer, and Onslow, the amounts proposed being altogether too small to meet the requirements of those Missions.—*Carried*.

It was moved by Rural Dean FULTON, and seconded by Rev. Canon BELCHER :

That the Executive Committee be respectfully requested to reconsider its decision with regard to the reduction of the grants to the Missions of Franklin and Edwardstown.

The discussion was adjourned at five o'clock in order to receive the Addresses of the delegation from the Synod of Quebec.

The Rev. Mr. Allnatt was invited to a seat in the House.

The following reply was received by telegram from the Bishop of Huron :

The Bishop of Huron and the Synod assembled acknowledge with grateful thanks the loving greetings of the Lord Bishop of Montreal and Synod in Session, reciprocating fraternal sympathy, and uniting in prayer to the Great Shepherd and Bishop of the Church that His presence may be with them and us in all our deliberations.

The Rev. J. S. STONE read the following resolution adopted by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada :

The General Assembly receives with much satisfaction the communication from the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, and reciprocates the spirit it breathes.

The Assembly feels that such fraternal greetings tend to exemplify our belief in the Communion of Saints, and to bring about the fulfilment of our Saviour's prayer "that they all may be one."

The Synod re-assembled at ten o'clock, on Thursday, 18th June, 1885.

The BISHOP opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved, and signed by the Bishop.

The BISHOP named the Archdeacons, Rural Deans and Canon Mussen as a Committee on Statistics; the Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay, Convener.

It was decided that this be a Standing Committee of Synod.

Canon MUSSEN withdrew a motion on this subject, of which he had given notice.

The Rev. Rural Dean Naylor read a Report of the Rural Deanery of Clarendon.

Rev. Rural Dean ROLLIT read a Report of the Rural Deanery of St. Andrews.

Notices of motion were given by Mr EDGAR JUDGE, Rev. J. H. DIXON, Rural Dean LONGHURST, Canon DUVERNET, Rev. Rural Dean MUSSEN, Canon DAVIDSON.

The consideration of Rural Dean Fulton's motion for re-consideration of the Grants to Franklin and Edwards-town, was resumed.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Canon DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON :

That the entire scale of Grants be respectfully referred to the attention of the Executive Committee, for that re-consideration which the interests of the Church in whole or in particular localities demand, guarding, as far as possible, the interests of the Clergy, and at the same time rousing to the utmost the energies of the Laity.

The original motion was withdrawn, and Canon DAVIDSON's amendment was put to the House and *carried*.

The Report of Committee on Endowments and Trusts was adopted.

The Report on the Widows and Orphans Fund was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. HUTTON, seconded by Mr. GARTH :

That a Canon be passed that in future every Clergyman upon being licensed to a charge in this Diocese must become a subscriber to the Widows and Orphans Fund ; and that the Committee on Canons be instructed to prepare such Canon—*Carried*.

The CHANCELLOR moved the adoption of the Treasurer's Report, seconded by Dr. DAVIDSON.—*Carried*.

It was moved by Mr. WALTER DRAKE, seconded by Mr. CHARLES GIBB :

That the Report of the Special Committee named to consider the question of Abbotsford and Rougemont be referred back to the Executive Committee, with power to act in the matter, and decide the question at issue.—*Carried*.

The CHANCELLOR moved, seconded by Dr. DAVIDSON :

That the report of the Executive Committee be adopted as a whole.—*Carried*.

On motion by Rev. Canon NORMAN, the Rules of Order were suspended to introduce a resolution on the subject of a change in the School Law, proposed by Delegates from the Synod of Quebec.

Rev. Canon NORMAN moved, seconded by Ven. Arch-deacon LINDSAY :

That a Committee be named to confer with the Committee of the

Dideese of Quebec, and, if necessary, with other religious bodies, with regard to the introduction of religious instruction into the Public Schools of this Province; and to report to this Synod at its next Session. Said Committee to consist of the Rev. Canon Mussen, Rev. Canon Davidson, Dr. L. H. Davidson, with the mover and seconder.—*Carried.*

Discussion was resumed upon the motion of Rev. F. H. CLAYTON on the duplicate Register of Baptisms, Deaths and Marriages. The motion was seconded by Rev. W. ROSS BROWN.

Moved, in amendment, by Rev. Canon DAVIDSON, seconded by Rural Dean LONGHURST :

That all the words in the original motion after, "that" be struck out, and the following inserted instead: this Synod, through the Clerical Secretary, desires to bring before the Government, for redress, the impositions of charges by the Registrars, upon the supplying to the Clergy registration books for the Records of Baptisms, Marriages, and Burials, which, in their opinions, ought to be provided at the public expense. It is also requested that the Books and Tracts Committee furnish a form to the Clergy, detailing the particulars required by the Civil Code for such enregistration.

The Rev. J. S. STONE moved, in amendment to the amendment, seconded by Rev. A. FRENCH :

That a Committee be appointed to consider the whole question of Registration, and to report to the next Synod.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named the following committee: Rev. J. S. Stone, Convener; Rev. A. French, Mr. Marling, Mr. Noyes, Mr. McCord, Rev. F. H. Clayton.

The Rev. Rural Dean NYE moved, seconded by the Very Rev. the DEAN OF MONTREAL :

That this Synod highly appreciates the excellent work that has been done by the Montreal Theological College, and requests the Governors and Corporation of that Institution to take into their consideration the propriety of bringing it into closer relations with the Diocesan Synod.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Canon DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. Canon ELLEGOOD :

That the question of University and Theological Education in this Province, in its relation to the Theological College in Montreal and the University at Lennoxville, be submitted to a Special Committee to report in what manner the agencies thus at work may be both concentrated and made still more effective.

The Synod re-assembled at half-past two o'clock.

It was moved by Rev. W. ROSS BROWN, seconded by Rev. F. H. CLAYTON :

That the apportionment of grants from the Mission Fund be made, not to the Mission or Parish, as is now the rule, but to the Clergyman, so that his time of service and position in the Ministry may be taken into account.

It was moved in amendment by Rev. Rural Dean ROLLIT, seconded by Rev. W. B. LONGHURST :

That in the apportionment of Grants from the Mission Fund length of service and position in the ministry shall be taken into account.

By consent of the mover, this amendment was substituted for the main motion and was *carried*.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. Canon EMPSON :

That Rule 27 of the Order of Proceedings of the Synod be amended (1) by the addition of the following words after the word "Synod" in the ninth line thereof:—"The Printed Journal of each Session having been compared with the written Minutes or Notes of Proceedings taken during the Session, and certified by the signature of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese (or of the Chairman or Presiding Officer in his absence), to a Statement attached to one or more copies of said Journal, mentioning the number of pages therein and the number of words corrected, and countersigned by the Secretaries of the said meeting, shall be held to be the true and authentic Record of the Proceedings of such Session; and two or more of such certified copies shall be kept on file by such Secretaries." And (2) by inserting before the word "copy" in the 10th line of said Rule 27, the word "certified."

It was decided to refer this motion to the Committee on Canons.

Rev. Rural Dean LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON, adoption of the Report on Works of Mercy.

Moved in amendment by Dr. DAVIDSON, seconded by the CHANCELLOR :

That the report of the Committee on Works of Mercy be adopted omitting the portion recommending a grant of \$100.—*Carried.*

Rural Dean LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON :

The adoption of the Report of the City Missionary.—*Carried.*

Archdeacon LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. Canon MUSSEN :

carried into effect, so soon as the Colonial Church and School Society assigns to the Synod the whole of the Church property at Sabrevois and elsewhere in this Diocese, except that in the city of Montreal; and on condition that at all meetings of the Committee of the Society the representation of the Synod be equal to that of the Committee; and that the Society otherwise fulfills the conditions in said report contained.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved in amendment, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON:

That the Report be not now adopted but be referred back to the Committee on French work for further consideration.—*Carried.*

Archdeacon EVANS moved, seconded by Mr. JAMES STEPHENSON:

The confirmation of the amendments to the Canon on Superannuation, adopted at last meeting of Synod (pp. 30 and 87, report of last Synod).—*Carried.*

Archdeacon EVANS moved, seconded by the CHANCELLOR:

That the whole Canon on Superannuation, as now amended, be referred to the Committee of Canons, with power to make such changes in the wording of the Canon as will reconcile its several provisions, and to report at next meeting of Synod.—*Carried.*

The Rev. F. H. CLAYTON moved, seconded by Rev. A. FRENCH:

That any motion to suspend the Order of Proceedings of this Synod shall not be sprung upon the House without some little notice or guarantee that it will not provoke discussion, or be offensive to members of this body, forcing them for decency sake to appear to concur in what is offensive or contrary to their principles.—*Lost.*

The Ven. Archdeacon LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. J. KER:

That all proposals to build churches or parsonages be submitted to the Executive Committee, which shall report to the Bishop as to the amount provided for building the same, as well as to their being adapted to the circumstances of the Parish or Mission in which they are proposed to be built; and that no building for Church purposes be commenced until such report has been submitted to the Bishop, and his sanction thereafter given in accordance with the Canon on the erection, conservation and disposal of churches, and that this provision be added to the said Canon.

At six o'clock the discussion was adjourned till eight o'clock.

## EVENING SESSION.

The Synod assembled at eight o'clock.

Discussion was resumed on the motion of Archdeacon LINDSAY.

It was moved in amendment by Rev. Canon ROBINSON, seconded by Mr. ALEX. GOWDEY :

That the words "Executive Committee" be struck out and the words "Rural Dean of the deanery in which the parish is situated," be substituted therefor.—*Lost*.

The main motion was then put and *Lost*.

In the absence of Mr. FISK, Mr. D. MOORE moved the following resolution :

That in the interest of the Mission Fund it is expedient in publishing returns of amounts collected in each mission or charge, where two or more are under one Incumbent, that each mission or charge contributing to the Fund, shall be credited respectively with the amount raised.—*Carried*.

Rev. Canon NORMAN moved, seconded by Rev. J. S. STONE :

That the Synod of this Diocese now assembled, desire to express their deep and hearty thanks to the Revisers of the Old Testament Scriptures for the diligent labor and mature learning which, for the space of fourteen years, they have devoted to the completion of their important work. The whole Bible as revised is now within the reach of English-speaking Christians ; and, in the opinion of this Synod, will prove a most valuable assistance to the thoughtful student of Holy Scripture and to all who desire to possess a clear and accurate knowledge of the revealed Word of God. His Lordship the Bishop is herewith respectfully requested to transmit this Resolution to His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury.—*Carried*.

Dr. DAVIDSON, in the absence of Archdeacon EVANS, moved the adoption of the Report on Superannuation.—*Carried*.

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Archdeacon LINDSAY :

The adoption of the Report of the Committee on Books and Tracts.—*Carried*.

Rev. Rural Dean LINDSAY, in the absence of Rev. Canon BELCHER, moved the adoption of the Report of the Board of Domestic Missions.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. J. S. STONE, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON :

That that portion of the Lord Bishop's charge of 1884 suggesting the question of a biennial conference alternating with the Synod, be referred to a Committee to consider and report to the next Synod.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named Rev. J. S. Stone, Dr. Davidson, Rev. F. H. Clayton, Mr. E. P. Hannaford, and the Chancellor, as a Committee ; Mr. Stone, Convener.

Proposed by the Very Rev. the DEAN, seconded by Rev. Canon EMPSON :

That the thanks of this Synod be tendered to Sir Wm. Dawson, Principal of McGill College, for his kind letter of invitation to the members of the Synod to visit the Library and Museum of the University and for the valuable gift of Museum Catalogues placed at their disposal.—*Carried.*

In the absence of Rev. Canon ANDERSON, Rev. W. ROSS BROWN moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean LINDSAY.

That the Secretary of the Synod be authorized to subscribe for two copies of the Records of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, proposed to be published by the Rev. Prebendary Tucker, Secretary of the Society, one of such copies for the use of the Diocese, to be deposited in the Library of The Theological College, and the other copy in the Diocesan Library in the Synod Building.—*Carried.*

Rev. W. B. LONGHURST, seconded by Rev. J. KER :

That this Synod respectfully prays the Provincial Synod to compile an alternative Confirmation Service which may be used in cases where a part of the Candidates for that rite are drawn from outside the Communion of the Church.—*Lost.*

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Dr. BUTLER :

That a special Committee, consisting of the Chancellor, Judge Armstrong, George Macrae, Q.C., Hon. W. W. Lynch, Q.C., and the Mover and Seconder, be appointed for the purpose of examining all Acts of the heretofore Province of Canada, the Dominion of Canada, and the Province of Quebec, with reference to the Constitution and Incorporation of the Synod, and of the amalgamation therewith of the Church Society of the Diocese

of Montreal, and of reporting to this body at its next Session what are the powers and rights of this Synod under said Acts and at Common Law relatively to property held by the said Synod, or held in trust for the uses of the Church of England in this Diocese, or for any particular Parish or Mission, whether under the Temporalities Act or otherwise, and also as to the legislative powers of the said Synod under said Acts, and the means of rendering the same effective and binding upon the Parishes and Congregations of this Diocese.—*Carried.*

Dr. DAVIDSON was named Convener.

Rev. Rural Dean ROLLIT moved, seconded by Mr. H. D. MOORE:

That when any Parish or Mission in receipt of a grant from the Mission Fund exceeds the amount of its assessment for that fund, it shall be permitted, after paying to the Treasurer the full amount of its assessment, to devote the surplus to the formation or augmentation of a Parochial Endowment Fund.—*Withdrawn.*

Moved by Mr. EDGAR JUDGE, seconded by Rev. J. G. NORTON:

That a Committee be appointed to consider the Quebec system of dealing with the Missionary Parishes and to report at the next meeting of this Synod on the advisability of adopting that system in this Diocese.—*Carried.*

The BISHOP named the Mover and Seconder, Dr. Davidson, Mr. Marling and Archdeacon Lindsay; Mr. Judge, Convener.

Moved by Rev. JAS. H. DIXON, seconded by Rural Déan LONGHURST:

That while this Synod recognizes the true principle of each of our Missions being educated up to the point of self-support, it be hereby resolved that before reducing an existing grant, an Archdeacon or Rural Dean shall, at the request of the Executive Committee, visit the Parish or Mission, and at a Vestry Meeting called for the purpose fully discuss the feasibility of the reduction.

Resolved that this motion stand over as a notice for next Synod.

Moved by Canon DU VERNET, seconded by Archdeacon EVANS:

That this Synod has heard with much regret that the Rev. Robert Acton has been obliged to retire from the active work of the Ministry, and desires to express not only its deep sympathy with him in his present trial

Moved by Canon MUSSEN, seconded by Archdeacon LINDSAY :

That when Rural Deans are not elected to the Executive Committee they be invited to attend at the meetings of that body for consultation.—*Lost.*

Moved by Canon ROBINSON, seconded by Canon MUSSEN :

That the thanks of this Synod are due and are hereby tendered to the publishers of *The Gazette* and *Church Guardian* for their kindness in gratuitously furnishing members with copies of their papers during its present Session.—*Carried.*

Rev. W. ROSS BROWN moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean LINDSAY :

A vote of thanks to the Railroad and Steamboat Companies for the privileges of reduced fares to members of Synod.—*Carried.*

Dr. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by Rev. Canon ROBINSON :

That the warm thanks of the Synod are due and are hereby tendered to the Lord Bishop for the able, patient and impartial manner in which he presided over this Synod.—*Carried.*

THE BISHOP named Mr. G. F. C. Smith on the Committee on French Work instead of Dr. Johnson, resigned.

The minutes of the Third Day's proceedings were then read and confirmed; after which the Doxology was sung, the Benediction pronounced by the Bishop, and the Session ended.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee begs to make the following report of its proceedings during the year 1884-5 to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal at its twenty-sixth annual meeting in June, 1885.

## MEETINGS.

The regular quarterly meetings were held in August, November, February and May; an adjourned meeting was held on the 4th instant, and a special meeting was held on 19th June, 1884, immediately after the close of the Synod, when the sub-committees of this committee were named, viz.: on the Widows and Orphans Fund, on Endowments, on Investments, on the Synod House, and on Grants.

## GRANTS.

*Books and Tracts.*—\$150 were granted to the Committee on Books and Tracts, \$50.00 of which were for the purchase of Prayer Books and Hymn Books for the volunteers going to the North-West.

*Bristol.*—The sum of \$400 was placed at the disposal of the Bishop to provide for services in the mission of Bristol.

*Aylwin and North Wakefield.*—The grants to those two missions were on the recommendation of the Committee on Grants, increased to \$400 each with the understanding that if Messrs. Hamilton continue their donation, it shall be applied towards the increase.

*Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell.*—An annual allowance of \$120 was granted to the Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell, who, while retaining his position of Rector of St. Andrews, is relieved from the more active duties of his parish.

The Committee on Grants considered the resolution of Rural Dean Naylor, p. 34, Journal of last Synod, and reported that in view of the condition of the mission fund they could not recommend the grants for missionaries to be stationed at Squaw Lake, Alleyne and Desert, as suggested in the resolution.

The Report was adopted.

The Rev. Robert Acton has been obliged to retire from active work for the present, owing to the loss of his voice. His late mission, Portage du Fort, is still vacant.

The Executive Committee having been obliged to reduce the annual grants to many of the parishes or missions, in order to bring the expenditure within the anticipated revenue for the coming year, would strongly urge upon the several parishes or missions the duty and necessity of making good such reduction by special contributions to the income of the Clergyman.

It is felt that unless this is done there will be great danger of the Diocese losing some of its best and most active ministers.

N.B.—As regards the vacant Parishes and Missions, the necessary amounts will be voted from time to time, as application may be made by the Bishop.

#### ENDOWMENTS AND TRUSTS.

The following report for the year ending 31st December, 1884, was adopted:—

The Committee on Endowments, to whom the statement with regard to Parochial Endowments and Trusts, prepared by the Clerical Secretary, was referred, beg to state that they have checked over the statement in question with the returns from the different parishes, and find the same correct; and they recommend that such statement be adopted as the report of the Executive Committee on the subject of the Parochial Endowments and Trusts for the past year.

II. Trust Fund for school purposes. A bequest of the late John Wetherbee of \$340, now amounting to \$786.69, on deposit in E. T. Bank, bearing 3 per cent.

## ABBOTSFORD AND ROUGEMONT.\*

The following report was received, and, in accordance with its recommendation, was ordered to be printed and referred to the Synod.

*To the Executive Committee for the Diocese of Montreal.*

The special Committee named at the 25th session of the Synod of this Diocese "to consider the question of Abbotsford and Rougemont and to report to the Executive Committee," beg to report as follows:

From what took place at the meeting of the Synod in June last, your Committee understood that the purpose for which they were appointed was the examination into, and adjustment of certain differences which seemed to exist between the two sections of the Parish or Mission of Abbotsford and Rougemont, in reference to carrying on the work of the Church therein; assistance apparently being required in consequence of the inability of the Rev. Canon Robinson to fully discharge the duties connected with said Parish. In consequence of this, additional help had to be employed, and the Rev. Mr. Irwin was engaged and resided at Rougemont; and the feeling of the people of Rougemont, as explained in Synod, was to the effect that they had not received that assistance from the other section of the Parish towards the support of Mr. Irwin which they had a right to expect, and therefore they had made application to the Synod and to the Executive Committee for a grant, which had been refused.

Your Committee, understanding the foregoing to be the purpose for which they were appointed, visited Rougemont by appointment on the 16th day of July, 1894, and there met in the Church representatives from both sections of the Parish; Abbotsford being represented by the Rev. Canon Robinson and Messrs. Fiske and Craig, and Rougemont by a large number of the Congregation, including Church Wardens and Delegates, the Rev. Mr. Irwin being also present. Your Committee received explanations in regard to the position of the Parish and its capabilities from those present, and during the course of the same the Rev. Canon Robinson declared that he was unable to fulfil the duties of the Parish, and that assistance was required.

It also appeared that there was a total endowment fund in the Parish of \$7237.43, of which \$3,000 was applicable to Rougemont, the balance to Abbotsford. It also appeared that the Incumbent, under agreement with the parish, was to receive from Abbotsford a sum of \$140.00 from the interest upon its share of the endowment, the balance of the interest being added to the capital endowment fund year by year.

The difficulty which was presented for the consideration of your Committee was the method of raising a sufficient sum to maintain Mr. Irwin or other assistant Minister, who the people of Rougemont felt should reside there inasmuch as the Incumbent resided at Abbotsford.

\*This report was referred back to the Executive Committee, with power to decide the question at issue. (See Resolution, p. 181).

After a very full and friendly discussion the following proposal was unanimously assented to by those present, including the representatives from Abbotsford section: "That Rougemont pay a sum of \$400 per annum and Abbotsford \$200 per annum towards a salary of \$600 for an Assistant Minister, who shall reside at Rougemont, and shall be in special charge of that section of the Parish, and who shall be under the control of the Incumbent; and if the Assistant be required to come to Abbotsford in the absence of the Incumbent, or at his request, then the services shall be alternate, one Sunday in the morning and the next in the afternoon or evening, at each place; if not so required, there may be morning and evening services at Abbotsford and Rougemont respectively, according to the wishes of the Clergy."

Inasmuch as the representatives from Abbotsford, although assenting to the proposal for themselves, felt that they were hardly authorized to make a specific agreement to that effect without submitting it to the Vestry of the Church at that place, and inasmuch also as the meeting at Rougemont was not a regular Vestry meeting it was further agreed: "That this proposal shall be submitted to the Vestry of each Church, and, if adopted by them, form the agreement between the parties, and the same shall be forwarded to the Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay, Chairman of the Committee of Synod, to be reported to the Executive Committee."

In accordance with this resolution the proposal was submitted to a regularly-constituted Vestry at Rougemont and was by it unanimously adopted.

The proposal was also subsequently submitted to a meeting of the Vestry of the Church at Abbotsford, at which only two of the members of the Committee were able to be present, and in the course of the meeting a question was started by the Incumbent of the Parish as to whether the two sections, Abbotsford and Rougemont, really constituted one parish; and it was resolved by the Vestry to take the opinion of the Chancellor in regard to this question, and the meeting was adjourned.

Subsequently an opinion was received by the Incumbent from the Chancellor upon a statement of facts submitted to him, but which statement of facts was not submitted to your Committee and is not in their possession.

After several ineffectual attempts to fix a time when all could meet again at Abbotsford, a meeting was finally arranged for the 19th May inst., when there were present of your Committee Rural Dean Mussen and Mr. Davidson, Archdeacon Lindsay being unavoidably absent. At this meeting the Congregation was very fully represented and the Incumbent of the Parish was also present. The question of the status of the Parish was again raised and the opinion of the Chancellor was read. Your Committee, however, objected to the consideration of this question, inasmuch as, under the resolution of Synod appointing them, Abbotsford and Rougemont were recognized, as they had been recognized for years past, as but one Parish or Mission; and your Committee urged upon those present the consideration of the real matter at issue, namely, the best means of raising a sufficient sum to enable the Parish to retain the services of an

Assistant, there being apparently but one of two courses to be taken, either the resignation by the present Incumbent, who had admitted his inability to fulfil the full duties of the Parish of Abbotsford and Rougemont, admitting that both sections of the Parish could be worked by a younger and more active Incumbent, or the appointment of an Assistant during such time as he might require.

After a long discussion it appeared that the chief, if not the only, objection in the minds of those present to assenting to the proposal made at Rougemont, lay in the fact that on the occurrence of a vacancy in the Incumbency it was feared that the Incumbent would not continue to reside at Abbotsford, and that without a guarantee to that effect the Abbotsford people were unwilling to enter into any such arrangement; and advantage was taken of the Chancellor's opinion of the independent position of these two places to support this feeling.

It was, however, ultimately decided to adjourn the meeting until 25th May, 1885, in order to give opportunity for further consideration of the matter by the members of the congregation. And your Committee have since received through the Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay, its Chairman, the following resolution, as having been adopted by the Vestry of Abbotsford at the said adjourned meeting: "That inasmuch as the Chancellor of the Diocese has given his opinion that Abbotsford and Rougemont are not one Parish under the laws of the Synod, this Vestry does not feel called upon to pay an annual sum of \$200, as proposed at the conference held at Rougemont on 16th July, 1884."

In consequence of the decision embodied in the above resolution, the efforts of your Committee towards a settlement of the difficulties existing in this Parish have been rendered useless, and considerable expense has been incurred by each member of the Committee for no purpose, and it is to be regretted that this objection was not made at the several times that this matter has been brought up in Synod and in Executive Committee.

Your Committee of course assume that upon the statement of facts submitted to the Chancellor, his opinion would be well founded; but, as is well known, the value of any legal opinion depends not by any means wholly upon the Counsel whose opinion is sought, but very largely upon the manner in which the facts are marshalled and the fulness of the case submitted to Counsel; and from the result arrived at by the Chancellor, your Committee, in view of the explanations of the parties verbally given at the Rougemont meeting, and upon careful examination of the Records of the past, feel that the statement of facts submitted could not have been complete, else the opinion would have been different.

Although your Committee do not consider that the question whether these two places form one Parish or Mission or not, is before them for decision, and do not consider that it can validly be raised under the reference to them, yet your Committee have taken some trouble to examine the facts connected with, and the history of these two places, and they can



find nothing whatever to support the position assumed by the Abbotsford congregation.

An examination of the Reports and printed Acts, as well of the Church Society as of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, since the year 1842, (the year in which the Church Society of the old Diocese of Quebec was formed) presents the facts that in every report since that date and in the reports made by the Incumbent or Missionary himself year after year, these two places are treated as but one Parish or Mission, and your Committee cannot refrain from expressing astonishment that, apparently for the purpose of evading anticipated difficulty in the occurrence of a vacancy, or of escaping aid towards the maintenance of an Assistant to one who for a large number of years has worked the Parish alone, an attempt is made to ignore the history and position of over 40 years.

It was admitted at the Vestry meeting at Abbotsford, that neither section of the Parish could stand alone, but that both united in one Parish were capable of maintaining well a clergyman, and from the examination made and knowledge which your Committee have of this section of the country, they have no hesitation whatever in saying that the Parish, *constituted as it is*, is well able to sustain a clergyman, and that it would be an act of supreme folly to dis sever one place from the other.

Your Committee cannot further refrain from expressing their feeling that the Rougemont congregation and people have manifested a most laudable desire and willingness to do their utmost towards a solution of the difficulties presently existing in that Parish and to meet the extra expense necessary in consequence of the present condition of things.

In order that the Executive Committee may have before them in brief some of the facts as set forth in the reports above referred to showing these two places to have been included in, and to be in reality one Parish or Mission, your Committee beg to submit the following acts and references:

It would appear that the Church Society of the old Diocese of Quebec (prior to the division into that of Quebec and Montreal) was formed in the year 1842, and its first annual meeting appears to have been held on the 15th July, 1843. In the minutes of that meeting, however, no reference is made to the several parishes or missions then in existence. In the following year, 1844, however, your Committee find from its report that in the "Missisquoi District Association," a Parochial Association is mentioned as having been formed at Abbotsford, and this is the first reference that they find to this mission, although it would appear to have been in existence for some years prior to that date.

In the year 1845 the same title is used, Abbotsford showing a contribution of £4 in annual subscription and of £1 collected on Quinquagesima Sunday, but in this report appears a reference specially to Rougemont Mountain and to a new Church having been commenced there.

And it would seem that at that time Abbotsford and Rougemont were under one Incumbent or Missionary.

In the report of the Church Society of 1846 the title of the Parish Abbotsford and Rougemont, as ever since recognized, appears. And again, in the report apparently of the Minister in charge, the advancement of the new Church at Rougemont is referred to, and a special grant from the Church Society is mentioned as having been made; and on turning to the tabular statement the grant appears as having been paid to the Rev. Mr. Johnson, then at Abbotsford, and serving both places, and he so continued in charge until the appointment of the present Incumbent, the Rev. Canon Robinson.

Since 1846, as well prior to the formation of the Synodal system, as since, these two places have ever appeared as but *one Parish or Mission* under the name of "Abbotsford and Rougemont," and in several places there is recognition of Mr. Johnson as being the *one Incumbent or Missionary* in charge, and he continually reports in regard to Rougemont in the same respect as he does in regard to Abbotsford.

It is true that on one or two occasions other places were annexed to this Parish, for instance: West Farnham, Milton and St. Hyacinthe, but all of them manifestly only temporarily and until other provision could be made for their service, and on the formation of the Synodal system the same position was assumed, and continued and acted upon as well by the Synod as by the Incumbent and Parishioners, and there is no entry in any record of Synod that your Committee has been able to see, showing the severance of these two places.

In the Church Society lists of the Clergy of the Diocese of Montreal, after its separation from Quebec, appears the name "Rev. Fred. Robinson, M.A., Abbotsford and Rougemont," and in the lists of the parishes and missions after the formation of the Synod system the title uniformly is *Abbotsford and Rougemont*, as one Parish or Mission under one Incumbent, and so, too, do these places appear in the lists of subscribers to the mission and other funds.

Testimony to the same effect is afforded by the reports of the Incumbent as well to the Church Society, as to the Bishop or Rural Dean, after the formation of the Synod. The heading always is "Abbotsford and Rougemont," and the Incumbent writes of them as—*e.g.*: Report of 1858—"Rev. F. Robinson reports that a variety of circumstances have continued to make the past year an eventful one in the history of *his charge*." 1861—"Rev. F. Robinson reports that the people in *his charge* are becoming more alive to the true position of the Church, &c." 1862—"Rev. F. Robinson reports the financial returns of *his charge* (Abbotsford Rougemont). 1873—In the report of the Rural Dean, based upon reports from the parishes under the head, "Abbotsford and Rougemont," this Mission is "under the charge of the Rev. F. Robinson, residing at Abbotsford; it has "two Churches, &c."—(at Abbotsford and Rougemont).

It is also to be noted that no recognition of Rougemont as an independent Mission appears during the period that the present Incumbent served it,

prior to the resignation of the Rev. Mr. Johnson ; and the association of his name, with that of the latter, under the title Abbotsford and Rougemont goes to shew that his position was that in reality of Assistant.

Your Committee are also informed that but one Register of Acts of Civil Status had been kept for both places ; and this sustains the unity of the Mission or Parish.

Whilst it may or may not be true that no positive *acte* can be shown joining those two places into one Mission, it should be remembered that such fact bears little if any weight in determining the question, since in the earlier days of the history of this diocese such acts were not formal, nor were they enregistered ; and that when the present Canon as to metes and bounds was passed, special exception was made in regard to existing parishes or missions and that in reference to them no action could be taken until after special notice and until after the matter had been brought before the Vestry of such Parish or Mission. (4th Syn. 14.)

The foregoing examination shows, therefore, in your Committee's opinion, the following facts :

Firstly. That under the Church Society system, Abbotsford and Rougemont were recognized as but one Parish, and that since 1843.

Secondly. That these places entered the Synod system as one Parish under one Incumbent in 1859 or 1860 and have ever since so continued.

Thirdly. That this position has been recognized as well by the Parish itself and its Incumbent as by the Synod and the Rural Deanery.

Fourthly. That no Act exists, so far as your Committee is aware, showing any severance of this relation, or any action on the part of these two places for a separation since the passing of the Canon on organization of Parishes and Missions.

Fifthly. That the burden of proof would seem to be upon Abbotsford to show a separation rather than upon the Synod or Executive Committee to show the unity of the Parish.

Your Committee report the facts as hereinbefore set forth, but, as they have already stated, have, in consequence of the position assumed at Abbotsford, been unable to arrive at any satisfactory settlement of the difficulties existing in said Parish, and they are of opinion that the whole matter should be referred to the Synod.

## REPORT OF EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have but little to report this year, and need not trespass seriously on the time and attention of the Synod. They would first call attention to the Resolutions passed at the Synod last year (Journal, 25th Session, pp. 31 and 32). The first of these were as follows: "That the recommendation of the Committee on Education in reference to the recognition on the part of the Provincial Council of Public Instruction of the courses of teaching in our Higher Educational Institutions be particularly adopted by this Synod, and the Bishop be respectfully requested to make this recommendation immediately effective. Your Committee, in reply, would state that this Resolution alludes to a question that forms but one part of a subject of moment and magnitude, and that it has already occupied and is at present occupying the attention of the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction. They are not without hope that Higher Education, whether distinctly connected with the Church or not, will receive more recognition than heretofore, and that those who have profited by such opportunities will not labor under the disabilities which are now justly complained of." The second Resolution is to this effect: "That the Bishop be requested to nominate annually, as a Standing Committee, Official Examiners to inspect and review the Educational work of all Church Schools at such times, in their judgment, as will enable them, from personal knowledge, to report to the Synod at its Annual Session. The Bishop complied with this request, and the Subcommittee in question are prepared to report, which they will do separately from this general report. The Rev. Canon Henderson, Principal of the Theological College, before his departure was good enough to prepare a report for the information of the Education Committee, which they have incorporated with their own, and beg herewith to present."

The Rev. Arthur French, Head Master of the St. John's School, in St. Urban Street, read the following encouraging report : " I do not think we have ever had in the history of the School a more prosperous year. The progress has been decidedly satisfactory. The School has been greatly strengthened by the assistance of the Rev. F. G. Scott. Since Sept., 1884, there have been 49 boys in attendance. There are now 44 on the books. Several are at present away through illness (measles). This is the largest number that, as far as I know, we have had. There are eleven boarders. 41 receive religious instruction in the Holy Scriptures and the Prayer Book. 9 have been confirmed during the school year. Our boys are still too young to have presented themselves for the A. A. examination or Kingston; but we have one or two who will, later on, I feel sure, render a good account of themselves. We shall be very glad, indeed, to see any member of Examining Committee at any time, and would prefer that the visit be without notice."

The Committee fully purpose, later on in the year, to avail themselves of this courteous invitation.

From the Rural Deanery of Clarendon we learn, through the Rev. W. H. Naylor, R. D., that there are two Church Schools, one at Danford Lake in the Mission of Aylwin, the other in the Mission of Thorne. The Committee hope to supply more details another year.

The Rural Deanery of St. Andrew's has no Church Schools other than Sunday Schools existing within its limits.

In the Rural Deanery of Bedford there are several Church Schools. The Ladies' College at Dunham is unhappily not in a flourishing financial state, though it is hoped that it will revive, and carry on prosperously the educational work for which it was intended. The Missisquoi High-School is closed, a separate Committee has been appointed to look into the condition of this particular school, and its connection with the Church. From them information may be looked for. The building is in a ruinous condition, and it is feared that it is lost to the Church.

The Rev. Canon Mussen, Rector of West Farnham, writes: "The Church School in my Parish is in active operation, and has been so during the year. It does not pay expenses, but we provide for the deficiency by a guarantee fund, which a few interested persons are willing to subscribe. We could not well do without the School, as we have nothing but a Common District School which is overcrowded, for the English population. I hope to be able to keep up our School, even at a loss in its management. And we have at present a most efficient lady teacher." Full information respecting this School and the School at St. Johns will be afforded by the Committee of Examiners. The Rectory School at Christietown, endowed by an annual revenue of \$200 from the Seignory, by the will of Major Christie, is kept constantly in operation in a School attached to the rear of the Church.

The Rev. F. H. Clayton says: "I regret to have to report that our School for girls, which was flourishing and doing a good work, has been closed for the last half of the year, as our teacher, Miss Kemp, went to New York, and, although I made every effort, I failed to find a person capable of filling her place; this has been a great loss and draw back, as the pupils were studying French, classics, and the higher branches of mathematics, etc., etc. We hope, however, D. V., to resume the School, as heretofore, next September."

The Rev. Canon Davidson has a private School at Frelighsburg, but the Committee have not solicited any information with regard to it.

The Church Academy at Knowlton is open. Your Committee were unable to visit it this year, but hope to do so before the next meeting of Synod. Mr. England reports: The students in attendance this year were 63 in number, an increase of about 10 per cent. over last year. The proportion of girls is 36 to 25 boys. The average age of the pupils is at present little under 15. In the first grade there are at present 47; in the 2nd, 5; in the 3rd, 4.

A Fund is accumulating at Granby for the endowment of a Church School.

Your Committee have not sought information from the newly constituted Deaneries, not being certain of their precise respective limits, and believing that any information they could supply has been practically furnished by returns from the older Deaneries.

## REPORT OF EXAMINERS AND INSPECTORS OF CHURCH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee regret that they have not been able to fulfil the duties assigned to them in a more efficient manner. Incessant demands on the time and thoughts of most of the members have been great obstacles in their way. They have also been naturally anxious to present to the Synod as recent a Report as could be given, and this, unfortunately, resulted in a postponement of the work to a period too near the meeting of the Synod to admit of its being properly carried out. Then, again, the amount of illness among the pupils of most schools during the past winter and spring has been exceptionally great. The progress, in consequence, materially suffered, and some teachers requested delay in the matter of inspection, in order that the Schools might recover their numbers and proficiency.

Your Committee, in the person of the Convener, have been only able to inspect two schools, one at St. Johns, and the other at Iberville. The former was originally a private school, connected with the Church of England. About thirty years back, the school being in debt, was assumed by the Parish, and after a time the debt was wiped off through the liberality of the parishioners. About eighteen or twenty years ago an amalgamation took place between the Dissentient School Board; and the School receives a Government Grant which the authorities of the Church may vary from year to year. The building in which the School is held belongs to the Church. It is now valued at \$5000. For the use of this building, a rent is paid to the amount of \$320 by the Trustees, which sum goes to meet the running expenses of the Church. The School is managed by the Dissentient School Board and the High School Board, the latter body consisting of the Rector and Church Wardens for the time being, while both Boards, in combination, appoint the teacher. Owing to the absence of any document bearing on the matter your Committee have been unable to ascertain the exact causes which brought about this amalgamation, but the general impression on the minds of those who are best qualified to judge is that it was the result of necessity. Without a combination of the Dissentient School and the Church of England School it is affirmed that both would have dwindled, and probably ere long one or both would have ceased to exist. The School itself is now maintained by fees (which range from one to six dollars per term) and by the aforesaid Government Grant. About eighty children have been in attendance during the year, and the education given is of a solid and satisfactory character, but the number at present, owing to recent epidemic, is less.

As this School is (to all intents and purposes) a High School, and as the connection of the Church with its management is more a matter of courtesy than a well-authenticated right, your Committee are of opinion that the School in question should cease to rank as in any sense one of the authorized Church Schools, known and admitted to be such and committed by the Synod of last year to the above Committee, to examine and report upon. Your Committee received much kindness and all necessary

information from the Rector of the Church and the Trustees of the School; the same may be said of their treatment at Iberville. The School at Iberville at the rear of the Church was also visited. This is partially endowed by an annual revenue of \$200 from the Seignory, by the will of the late Major Christie. In this case, also, owing to the smallness of the English population, and the consequent inability to maintain a good Dissident School as well as a good Church School, it was thought desirable some years ago to combine the two. This School, therefore, can no more strictly be entitled a Church School than the High School at St. Johns. In both Schools the Scriptures are taught on week days but not the Church Catechism, and it does not appear that such Schools can, with propriety, come under the visitation of the Examining Committee, and the Committee desire to express their dissatisfaction at the apparent failure of Church Schools and the abandonment of District Church teaching under any circumstances and for any cause whatever. They venture earnestly to draw attention to this fact, which is fraught with injury to the Church, and to urge that some remedy may be promptly agreed upon to meet this seemingly increasing evil. In this contingency it has been suggested that a central educational fund should be raised to assist the work of Church Schools in this Diocese, and that His Lordship the Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint a Committee to arrange details if the plan be approved by the Synod.

The number attending this School is about 25, and they have the benefit of an experienced and efficient teacher. It is of course much to be regretted that a School, once connected with our Church, should for any reason lose the standard of its religious teaching.

It is also a matter of regret that your Committee have such meagre results to shew on the occasion of the first Synod after their appointment. It is evident that they must commence their investigations earlier in the year, and this they fully intend to do for the future, if the Synod desire to retain them as a permanent Committee.

That your Committee have been greatly encouraged by the success of the Sunday School Association in the City of Montreal, and heartily recommend its development in the City, and at the same time would advise that Auxiliary Associations be formed in each Rural Deanery, and that as frequent communications as practicable be made between these Auxiliaries and the Parent Association in the city. Your Committee would also recommend that the Sunday School Association should at each Synod make a full report of the year's proceedings.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DEACONESSSES.

The Committee on Deaconesses regret that their work has not been more successful. They have thus far been unable to obtain the services of a trained Deaconess to lead the work in this diocese, so as to give opportunities to women wishing to devote their lives wholly in Church ministrations, either in teaching, visiting or nursing. They wrote to a Deaconess in England who had formerly lived in Montreal, she is the trainer of a class for Zenana work; she felt that she could not leave that work. They also corresponded with a lady who belongs to this Diocese, and who went last year to Bishop Littlejohn's Training School for Deaconesses at Brooklyn. She is willing to work in her own department of nursing but does not feel qualified to be a leader of the work.

The Committee are anxious to obtain the services of a trained Deaconess who could guide those who were desirous of wholly devoting their lives, either to the work of teaching, visiting or nursing.

#### REPORT OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL TO THE SYNOD.

The Synod at its last meeting having requested the formation of a Girls' Friendly Society, the Lord Bishop has organized it by appointing the President and Secretary and by its formal opening at the Synod Office on the 12th of May.

Circulars have been issued to all the Clergy of the Diocese stating the character of the work. The Society was established in England some years since, and all the Archbishops and Bishops are patrons of it.

All Societies adopting the three Central Rules are considered as affiliated to the parent organization, but carrying on their own peculiar work according to their circumstances. The organization is exceedingly simple and works upon parochial and diocesan lines.

Each Parish obtains as many Working and Honorary Associates as it can. Each Working Associate is requested to interest herself in three or four girls. The Parochial Secretary is first appointed by the Clergyman, and afterwards elected by the Associates or appointed by the Clergyman, as may be agreed upon. The Parochial Secretaries form the Central Council, the work of which is to circulate such of the literature of the Society as may be approved by the Bishop and suited to our wants, to recommend suitable boarding houses for girls who have come to the city for employment and have no homes, and to endeavor to follow them as they pass from place to place.

Not only does the Society seek for organization in each city Parish, which has nearly been accomplished, but it is most anxious that the same should be done in the country Parishes and Missions, adapting itself to the peculiar circumstances of each place; while it reaches the case of girls coming from the country to the city, it applies also to home work.

The Parochial Organization will gather all its members together from time to time as they see fit, and once a year we hope to have a meeting of all the members in the city.

Now that the Rural Deaneries are so small in size, it might be possible for the members to meet the Bishop once a year in his annual visitation.

By the agency of this Society we feel that very much good may be accomplished for its members. It needs Christian common sense in the intercourse between associates and members.

The Society wishes it to be understood, that its work interferes in no way with existing institutions, but, on the contrary, wherever it is possible, works in connection with them.

In conclusion, we would copy an extract from the Toronto G. F. S. report, which expresses a very important principle. It says: "We wish to refer to one point in connection with our work, that is the tendency we observe in a few branches to confine the membership to working girls only. This is apt to create a prejudice against the Society in the minds of many whose co-operation is essential to the success of our work in this country, and also leads many to imagine that the G. F. S. is a benefit society. The remarks of the lady who founded this Society in reference to the work in England are equally applicable to this country. 'If we want our Society,' she says, 'to be a real strong bond between the womanhood of England we must surely remember that our motto gives no hint of any class distinction whatever, and that no class can be without its own burdens or ought to be without the privilege offered it of bearing burdens for others.'"

## COMMITTEE ON LIBRARY BOOKS AND TRACTS.

Your Committee have kept before them the attainment of the object referred to in their previous report, namely, the establishing of a Depository in connection with the S. P. C. K. and for other publications of similar character. They regret, however, that they have not been able to make very much advance in this respect during the year past, further than to replenish largely the stock of tracts (3500 having been added to the stock during the year), and to keep on hand an assortment of prayer books of different sizes, styles, and price. They have not been able to make arrangements with the different publishers for sample copies of books suitable for Sabbath School work, but they hope that within a few months they will have upon their shelves a fair supply of sample copies of such Sunday School material.

They are, however, glad to say that the "Dawn of Day" still continues to circulate largely, and that nearly eight hundred copies have been taken for the past year.

They would strongly urge upon the Sunday Schools and Parochial organizations of the different Parishes and Missions of our Diocese the desirability of increasing the circulation of this extremely cheap and valuable paper.

Your Committee have purchased, during the year, from the S. P. C. K., 800 prayer books, besides supplying Messrs. Dawson Bros. with one consignment of the value of \$105.44.

In accordance with the vote of the Executive Committee a grant of two hundred prayer books and two hundred hymn books, for the use of the Prince of Wales Regiment, at the time of its being called out for active service, was made by the Book and Tract Committee. The hymn books they were obliged to purchase, inasmuch as they have not been able to make arrangements for keeping a supply upon their shelves.

Your Committee have also procured, during the past year, some valuable tracts upon the special religious difficulties and controversies of the time, connected with the "Evidence" Series of the S. P. C. K. These will be found valuable in connection with the work of the Clergy, although perhaps not so suitable for general circulation.

Your Committee are pleased to note that, on the whole, the circulation of tracts has increased, but they are convinced that the best interests of the Church require that much greater attention should be given to this special portion of parish work, and that, in view of the efforts constantly made by other bodies, it is essential that the Clergy in Parishes and Missions of this Diocese should keep constantly on hand and use every opportunity of circulating tracts of a distinctively Church character, and such as can now be had in the Depository.

In accordance with the request of the Sunday School Committee your Committee have procured samples of the leaflets for Sunday School use, assued by Messrs. Egerton & Co. and E. P. Dutton & Co., New York; and by the Diocese of Toronto, and the *Evangelical Churchman*, which

samples can be seen in the office of the Executive Committee; and the Tract Committee will receive orders, accompanied by the amount necessary, and will forward same to any or either of these publishers. It seems extremely desirable that some leaflet following systematically the Church year, and explanatory of her teaching, should be introduced in the schools of this Diocese. During the past year a number of schools have procured, through your Committee, leaflets from Messrs. Egerton & Co.

Your Committee have also a large assortment of specimen tracts in connection with Temperance and Total Abstinence work, published by the Church of England Temperance Society, and they beg respectfully to call attention of members of the Synod to the same, and specially urge upon Church Temperance workers throughout the Diocese the desirability of availing themselves of these tracts. An assortment of "White Cross" Army tracts has been ordered, and will shortly be on hand.

A demand would seem to exist for a still simpler Sunday School paper than the "Dawn of Day," and your Committee are ready to order, when requested, either the "Young Christian Soldier," or the "Shepherd's Arms," or any other paper suitable for young children, inasmuch as no Diocesan paper exists. They would, however, express the hope that an effort may be made to supply the Diocese with a Sunday School paper at least for the younger children, published within its bounds.

#### THE LIBRARY.

Your Committee has nothing special to communicate in regard to this portion of the work; there have been but very few additions during the past year, and, they regret to say, but very little call for the books which already are upon its shelves; even those lately received, and having reference to the questions of the day, remain unused. They would be glad to chronicle much greater interest on the part of both Clergy and Laity of the Diocese.

Your Committee are thankful that, upon the whole, some advance has been made in the work of circulating true, sound Church literature, and in carrying into effect the establishing of that which they cannot but feel is one of the first essentials for the well-being of the Diocese, namely, a Depository not merely in name but in fact.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WORKS OF MERCY.

##### CITY MISSION.

The Women's Protective Immigration Society, through their connection with the different societies in England, and with our Church Emigration work in Liverpool, receive girls and women coming to this

country, and find situations for them, and report those which belong to the Church of England to the Girls' Friendly Society, who write to the Clergyman of the parish in which they are placed.

#### REFORMATORIES.

In consequence of the Government farming out the boys and girls who have committed offences to religious bodies, it leaves the Protestant part very little cared for. The Protestant girls are sent to the Roman Catholic institutions, because there is no Protestant institution to receive them. The boys are partly sent to the Sherbrooke Jail, without any training being provided for them there. Altogether, the Reformatory arrangements for Protestants is most unsatisfactory.

#### JAILS.

The Montreal Jails have the clerical care of the Rev. J. D. Borthwick. Continued, but so far ineffectual, efforts have been made to obtain more room for the Protestant Female Jail to make classification to be carried out, and separate dormitories. It needs also some space outside the walls of the prison for prisoners to go out and to carry in laundry work.

The jails in the country parts must depend upon the Clergymen of the Parish or Mission in which they are for visiting the prisoners belonging to our Church.

#### LUNATIC ASYLUM.

The Lunatic Asylum at Longue Pointe has been the subject of much consideration. There are about 100 Protestant patients at Longue Pointe, and, as far as the Committee can discover, there has never been a Protestant service within its walls all the fifteen years it has been in operation, nor has there been any Clergyman regularly to visit the institution. An effort was made last winter to start a Protestant Insane Hospital. There was shown so much reluctance on the part of Protestants to take part in it till it could be decided if the Government would not so arrange the present institution at Longue Pointe that it would be acceptable to Protestants. The Government at Quebec has passed a measure which will very much improve the medical care of the patients, and has placed the institution under a Medical Board.

The Government has also passed a measure to loan a sum of money for an Hospital for Protestant Insane, to be paid back in five yearly instalments by deducting that amount from the annual allowance made for patients. A movement has again started to obtain a Protestant Hospital. To be fairly started it should be quite free from debt. With great economy the Government allowance of \$100 each per annum and the private patients might be sufficient to meet its expenses.

#### CONVALESCENT WORK.

The Ladies' Benevolent Institution, a most important charity in this city, has opened a part of the Wheeler Wing for convalescent girls and

women from the General Hospital. Last year it received 36. This work needs to be carried out still further, and it is to be hoped that the Workman Wing of the House of Refuge at Longue Pointe may be used for that purpose. The Convalescent Home, opened at Murray Bay, by the energy of Miss Hervey, has done a good work and deserves support.

#### NURSING SCHOOL.

A movement is being made to obtain two objects in connection with nursing: One, that instruction in nursing should be brought, as far as possible, within the reach of all girls. The other is the regular training of nurses through the agency of the Hospital, who should receive certificates as to qualification.

#### COFFEE HOUSES.

The Coffee House movement was inaugurated by the Cathedral Band of Hope, and passed into the hands of a stock association, which has determined not to extend its work. The Coffee House supplies a need, and does much to lessen the evil of intemperance. The Committee hope that all Temperance Societies connected with our Church will interest themselves with the extension of this work of Coffee Houses.

#### REPORT OF IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN.\*

I beg to report that I visit the emigration office regularly, my aim being to do so on an average of four times weekly.

During the past year I spent less time in trying to visit the immigration sheds at the Tanneries and more time in the office in the City, in helping to obtain situations for the newcomers, although I did not at first intend to take this up as any part of my work.

I have received great kindness from the following newspapers, viz.: *Gazette, Witness, Star and Herald*, by their free insertion of notices for months together asking for employment. At first I had such advertisements inserted over my signature, but latterly I have asked that applications should be sent to 813 Craig street, and without my signature. My reason for the change was that my time was frightfully broken into at times by men who called at my house instead of at the office. I have also ceased distributing tracts with my house address printed on them, as I had done in the earlier months of my appointment.

When in the office I spend my time distributing tracts, giving advice to and writing letters for the emigrants to such as have applied for their services or to any who might be likely to help men toward employment. My work has difficulties—difficulties which make it trying—one is the want of thought on the part of those for whom we find situations: for instance, I invariably ask them to drop me a line as soon as they are employed, to let me know where they have gone to live, etc.; but the rule is that as long as they do not find employment they revisit you regularly, but

as soon as they are placed they are so glad to get work that they forget to let me know. Of course there are noble exceptions, and I have received some very gratifying letters and also personal expressions of thanks from some who have been helped along their way.

While on this head I might first urge on this Committee, the recommendation which I made some months ago—viz., that a sum of \$100.00 per annum be set apart by the Executive Committee with which to pay for a boy whose duty it would be to remain at the Emigration Office during office hours, watch the Church of England people, and keep for me a record of the homes of each person remaining in Montreal, and give a letter to those going to the country placing them under the pastoral care of the clergyman in whose Parish they are. I have spoken to Dr. Lesperance, and there is no doubt but that I can make such an arrangement as would secure the information above mentioned. For my own part it is a source of regret that I have not been able to obtain this information more fully—but I cannot—and yet I certainly cannot in the future give any more time to the work than I have in the past, as I find it has taken more of my time than I ever expected it should when I accepted the position from the Colonial and Continental Church Society.

I wish for the advice of the Committee, namely, what would they recommend as the best means of changing the mode of residents in the country as regards employing emigrants? For instance a great many applications come to me asking for the best class of farm laborers—or for boys—but the applicants ask that the persons applied for should be kept until my letter returns to them and they have time to get in to see the persons for themselves. You know that it is most important that the newcomers should be placed as soon as possible. Nearly 1800 members of the Church of England have passed through Montreal.

MY LORD,—I beg to submit the following statement of City Mission work for the year ending 31st May, 1885:

Divine service has been held three times each Sunday, as follows: At the Dissident School-room, 120 St. Lawrence Main street. St. Jean Baptiste Village, at 11. a. m.; the average attendance for the year being 42. At the Dissident School-room in Outremont, at 7 p. m., average 35. And at the Montreal General Hospital, at 4.30 p. m., average 17.

A Sunday School has been carried on in St. Jean Baptiste Village from 10 to 11 a.m. The average attendance, exclusive of teachers, being 29.

The School is under a very efficient staff of teachers, and is well supplied with Children's papers, Institute leaflets, etc. The advantage of holding the school at an hour which brings its exercises to a close when Divine Service begins is seen in the fact that the greater part of the children remain for Service, and by the aid of paged prayer-books are becoming familiar with the form for Morning Prayers: entering heartily into the services, both in singing and responding. The conviction is general that if a small Mission Church were built somewhere near the intersection of Rachel or St. Jean Baptiste street, with St. Denis, or in St. Lawrence Main street, not far from the place where service is now held, many more than the few families now connected with us would be drawn in. A movement toward the desired end was set on foot in the beginning of winter.

Your Lordship visited the village and examined several sites. The Rural Dean visited many families with me in St. Jean Baptiste and Cote St. Louis, and the conclusion was come to that in the event of a Mission Church being built, there would be fully forty families from whom a congregation could be drawn. At a meeting of a Committee which had been named by your Lordship it was moved by Rev. Mr. Norton, within the limits of whose Parish the site must of necessity be chosen, and seconded by the Rural Dean, and carried: "That it is expedient to erect a Mission Church at or near the intersection of St. Jean Baptiste and St Denis streets." At a subsequent meeting of the city Clergy it was decided, owing to stagnation of business in the city, a circumstance making the raising of funds difficult, diversity of opinion with regard to the proper location, and other causes, for the present not to take further action in the matter.

The attendance at the Evening Services in Outremont, though fairly good, has not quite come up to my expectations. The Mission feels, to a certain extent, the drawbacks incident to a country Mission, the same results follow from a rainy Sunday or an over-depth of snow; nevertheless the Mission is an important one, and must not be relinquished.

Attendance at Divine Service at the General Hospital has been fluctuating, owing to the fact that the number of convalescent patients is variable; still the Services are always hearty. Your City Missionary has visited the Montreal General and other Hospitals; the House of Refuge, and other kindred institutions. By far the most important part of his work being the ministration to the sick at the General Hospital. The number of individual pastoral visits in this Institution alone being 1480.

In the various branches of the Mission there have been nine baptisms, four marriages, thirty-one burials; and the Holy Communion has been administered eleven times.

While acknowledging that every measure of success is owing to the merciful kindness of an over-ruling Providence, I take this opportunity of thanking the Clergy and all those who, by their means and efforts, have manifested their interest in the work. Too much praise cannot be given



to the St. George's Y. M. C. A. for their Hospital work on Sundays and for their substantial support of the cause, to the ladies of the Cathedral and other congregations who have taken part with them in leading the responses, to the lady-organists in St. Jean Baptiste Village and Outremont, and to the gentleman organist at the Hospital, also to the ladies and gentlemen who subscribed for the purchase of an instrument for the St. Jean Baptiste Village Mission Service.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your Committee beg to report as follows :

The Capital Fund having reached \$20,000, the income arising therefrom is now available for purposes of superannuation according to the terms of the Canon, and will afford a retiring allowance for at least these cases.

There are now 16 Clergy who, having fully complied with the requirements of the Canon, are entitled to rank upon the Fund.

There are also 29 of the Clergy who have partially met the requirements, but who have failed to make the necessary collections, or, being in arrears, have failed to make payments on account thereof.

There are 42 of the Clergy who are as yet not subscribers.

Your Committee had earnestly hoped that the facilities offered by the amendment to the Canon passed at last Session of Synod would have led the Clergy generally to qualify to rank upon the Fund. They would strongly urge the Clergy to do so during the current year, and would respectfully remind them that the language of the Canon plainly makes this a duty incumbent upon them.

Attached to this Report is a full list showing which of the Clergy are qualified, which partially, and which are not connected in any way with the Fund as subscribers, also showing the amount of arrears, if any, due by each. The whole respectfully submitted.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRENCH WORK.

Your Committee on French Work desire to report as follows :

A Sub-Committee, composed of the Very Rev. the Dean, Archdeacon Evans, and Dr. Davidson were appointed to confer with the Committee of the Colonial Church and School Society, and made the following Report :

1. That the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal assume the responsibility and management of Missionary work amongst the French within the bounds of the Diocese as part and parcel of its Missionary work, upon condition that the Colonial Church and School Society withdraw wholly from the field; with the exception of carrying on the services in the College Chapel, known as l'Eglise du Redempteur."

2. That the Colonial Church and School Society agree to carry on, at its own expense, all the French Educational work, receiving into Sabrevois Schools, as far as its rules and income will allow, all French Canadian children recommended by the Missionaries of the Synod of Montreal, also to give such education to young men anxious to enter the Ministry as will prepare them for the Collegiate course, and to report annually to the Synod as to the state of its work, etc.

3. That in order to give the Synod a voice in the management of Sabrevois Schools, the Synod be entitled to elect 5 Clerical and 5 Lay members on the Board of the Colonial Church and School Society who shall have and exercise all the privileges of the said Board.

4. The present rules and regulations in regard to Educational work, and the management of the Schools shall be subject to amendment and alteration as may be decided upon by the Board as constituted under this agreement.

The above is suggested by the Sub-Committee as a basis of negotiation.

#### RURAL DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

MY LORD,—The twenty-third Annual Meeting of the Deanery of Bedford was held in the Church School, Farnham, on Tuesday, June 2nd. There were present 26 Clerical and Lay representatives.

The number of the Parishes in the Deanery has been reduced to 27, by the uniting of Upton with St. Hyacinthe, and of Brome Corner with Knowlton.

The Rev. S. C. Thicke has resigned the Rectory of Knowlton, and has been succeeded by Rev. J. J. Scully.

#### CHURCHES.

The church at West Brome is now complete, and being wholly out of debt was consecrated at the recent visitation of the Bishop.

The Stewart Memorial Church, at Frelighsburg, was opened for Divine Worship on the 2nd October last, with appropriate services. We cannot speak too highly of the piety and energy of the Rector and Congregation of this Parish, who have, at such sacrifice, raised so suitable a memorial to the memory of Bishop Stewart, once the Missionary of the Church in this locality, and the founder of a number of the existing Parishes of the Townships. It may be remarked that only a small financial liability delays the consecration of this sacred edifice.

The church at West Shefford is steadily progressing towards completion, and is one of the finest of the country churches of the Diocese. Very considerable repairs and improvements, involving large expenditure, are reported as having been effected on the churches at Cowansville, Granby, Adamsville, Christerville, St. Thomas, South Stukely, Upton and Farnham.

## PARSONAGES.

Repairs are reported on the Parsonages at South Stukely and Adamsville.

The new Parsonage at Rougemont is being completed, as far as funds in hand will permit.

## CHURCH SCHOOLS.

Church Schools have been in operation during the year in the Parishes of Bolton, Christieville, Knowlton and West Farnham.

The Missisquoi High School property at Sweetsburg, is unoccupied, and is rapidly falling into ruin. The Deanery would urge that immediate steps be taken to utilize this institution and to remove the disgrace attending the existing state of the buildings.

With reference to Dunham Ladies' College, the Deanery would reiterate its recommendation, contained in its report of 1882, viz. : that the Institution should not continue a burden upon the limited resources of the Deanery, but be made a Diocesan institution, under the control of the Synod.

## MISSION FUND.

The usual Missionary Meetings have been held in all the Parishes of the Deanery, with generally favorable results. The amount raised for this Fund more than equals the amount expected from the Deanery.

## CLERICAL STIPENDS.

We are glad to be able to state that there is a general tendency in this matter in the right direction. We would draw attention, however, to the fact that in Boscobel, Glen Sutton, Iron Hill, Milton and Sabreveis, the stipends reported are under \$600.

## GRANTS.

No change has been made in the amounts of grants recommended, except that if Rougemont be declared a separate Parish a grant of \$100 be assigned it.

The amounts expected from each Parish for the Mission Fund remain the same as last year.

## DIVISION OF THE DEANERY.

In accordance with the resolution passed at our last Annual Meeting the Bishop is dividing the Deanery into three Deaneries, Bedford, Brome and Shefford. We meet, therefore, for the last time as one Deanery. We cannot, therefore, conclude this report without a thankful recognition of the Divine favor which has, we feel assured, rested upon us during the twenty-three years of our organization, and enabled our Parishes generally to attain to an advanced degree of progress and improvement. ## RURAL DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

MY LORD,—The Annual Meeting of the Deanery of St. Andrews was held in St. Matthew's Church, Grenville, on the 15th inst., when five of the nine parishes in the Deanery were represented.

At 11 a.m. there was a celebration of the Holy Communion, and a sermon by the Rev. H. Hackenley of Buckingham.

At 2 p.m. the Rural-Deanal Chapter assembled for business, when the reports from the several Parishes were considered and discussed. Three Parishes were reported as having raised the exact amount of their assessment in aid of the Mission Fund, three as having failed to do so, while two, Buckingham and Mille Isles, have exceeded the amount required, the former by a considerable sum.; the total deficiency for the Deanery being \$8.16.

In view of the recent reductions in the grants from the Mission Fund, it was not thought advisable to propose an increase in the rates of assessment.

Upon the subject of promoting the formation of local endowments a general feeling seemed to prevail that it would greatly tend to promote that desirable object if the Parishes were permitted to devote to such purpose any sums they might raise for the Mission Fund in excess of their assessment.

It was unanimously resolved that, in view of the urgent necessity for placing a resident Missionary at Arundel, for work in that and surrounding settlements, the Executive Committee be respectfully requested to place such a grant at the Bishop's disposal as his Lordship may think necessary for the purpose.

Owing to enfeebled health the Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell feels need of assistance, and arrangements are being made by which he may be relieved from the more active duties of his charge. A resolution of sympathy with him on account of his long and severe illness was unanimously passed by the meeting.

The mission of Lachute, vacant by the resignation of the Rev. R. W. Brown, M.A., is supplied, *pro tem.*, by Mr. Sanders of the Theological College.

#### RURAL DEANERY OF CLARENDON.

MY LORD,—I desire to submit the following report of the Rural Deanery of Clarendon:

The third Annual Meeting was held at Shawville, the third day of June.

After the celebration of Holy Communion in St. Paul's Church, the members of the Deanery assembled at the parsonage at 10 o'clock for the transaction of business. 5 Clergymen and 7 Laymen were present.

The Rev. H. Plaisted, Missionary at River Desert, reported having visited during the past winter 6 shanties in the Gatineau district. The men, about 200 in number, were pretty evenly divided between French and English speaking. Services were held in both languages, and literature distributed. No collections of money were made. These shanties received no Protestant ministrations during the winter except those of the Church of England. The requirements in the line of literature are pictorial and large print papers. The large print texts and outline pictures of the S. P. C. K. would be particularly useful.

Reports were received from the following Parishes and Missions:—Thorne, River Desert, Hull, Portage du Fort, Onslow, Aylmer, Bristol, Clarendon, Chelsea and Eardley.

The following facts are worthy of notice:

1. There is an increase in the number of Church families of 2 in the parish of Portage du Fort; 2 in Aylmer; 9 in Hull; 20 in Onslow; 16 in Thorne; 5 in Eardly.

The River Desert Mission organized during the past year reports 19 Church families.

The total increase, so far as can be estimated, is 51.

2. There is an increase of actual communicants in Hull of 31; Bristol 11; Clarendon 38; Thorne 5; River Desert 4. Total, so far as reported, 89.

3. The following Parishes report an increase of Sunday School scholars:—Hull 9; Clarendon 32; Portage du Fort 2; River Desert 8; Onslow 31; Thorne 25. Total 97.

#### MISSION FUND.

The assessments remain as last year. Bristol, Hull, Onslow and Portage du Fort have contributed more than their assessment.

It was decided by the Deanery that the Annual Missionary meetings should begin as soon as possible after the middle of September, and that printed notices, similar to those in use in the Deanery of St. Andrew's, should be prepared.

## CHURCH BUILDINGS.

There has been considerable progress in this direction.

THORNE.—The parsonage has been greatly improved, and the walls of a new church are completed, and will probably soon be roofed.

AYLWIN.—A new church has been completed and opened for Divine Service at Wright.

PORTAGE DU FORT.—A new stone foundation has been built under St. James Church, Bryson.

ONslow.—The Church of St. John the Evangelist, Quio, is ready for consecration.

EARDLEY.—St. Luke's Church has been repaired and enlarged.

## CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Rev. A. J. Greer has opened what promises to become an important station in the upper part of the Township of Lichfield.

The Rev. H. Plaisted has been working for about eleven months at River Desert and in adjacent parts. He finds a Protestant population of over 300, but they are very much scattered.

The settlers along the Pickannock River and at Squaw Lake, in the township of Pontefract, were visited by your humble servant in the month of September, and Pontefract again in November.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Deanery.

1. That the Deanery respectfully urges upon the attention of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese the necessity of an early appointment of a Clergyman for the Mission of Chelsea, and recommends to the Executive Committee of the Diocese that the grant from the Mission Fund be increased to \$400.

2. The Deanery respectfully urges that its recommendation of last year asking for the organization of a new Mission, consisting of the Townships of Alleyn and Cawood, and the upper part of Low, be acted upon at as early a date as possible; that a Clergyman be appointed, and that the Executive Committee be requested to make an appropriation.

3. The Deanery urges the need of an Assistant in the Mission of Thorne, the health of the incumbent being in danger of breaking down under his present arduous duties, and the Executive Committee is also requested to make an appropriation for such Assistant. I may add that the present Mission of Thorne, both in population and territory, is fully equal to two large Missions, and that any reason which exists for making an appropriation from the Mission Fund to any Mission in the Diocese, may be urged in favor of the additional grant asked for in this case.

bility of ascertaining the number of members of the Church of England in those portions of the Counties of Pontiac and Ottawa in which we have no organized Missions, and the advisability of appointing Missionaries. It is also convinced that there should be a regularly organized effort to send a Missionary or Missionaries into the Lumber camps on the Coulonge, Black and Desmoine Rivers. The Districts referred to in this resolution are two: First, the country along the north shore of the Ottawa River west of the present Missions of Portage du Fort and Thorne. Second, the Townships of Templeton, Wakefield and Denholm, on the east side of the Gatineau River.

There have been some changes in the working force of the Deanery during the year. We have sustained a severe loss in the resignation, by the Rev. R. Acton, owing to ill-health, of his Parish of Portage du Fort.

The Rev. W. P. Chambers has also been obliged to leave his Parish for a time.

The Rev. R. L. MacFarlane has removed to the Parish of Lachine.

The Rev. Walter Windsor, formerly of Lachine, has been appointed to the Mission of Eardley.

The Rev. Geo. Johnson has been appointed to assist in the work in Clarendon and Bristol.

The Parish of Portage du Fort is still vacant.

The following is the resolution adopted by the Deanery Meeting relative to the Revs. R. Acton and W. P. Chambers:

That this Deanery desires to express its earnest sympathy with the Rev. R. Acton and the Rev. W. P. Chambers in their affliction, brought on by devotion to the Church's work in this District, and earnestly prays that the Divine Master may speedily restore them to health and usefulness.

The Parish of Portage du Fort has set the noble example of paying the Rev. R. Acton the full year's stipend, although he was obliged to resign his work in January.
