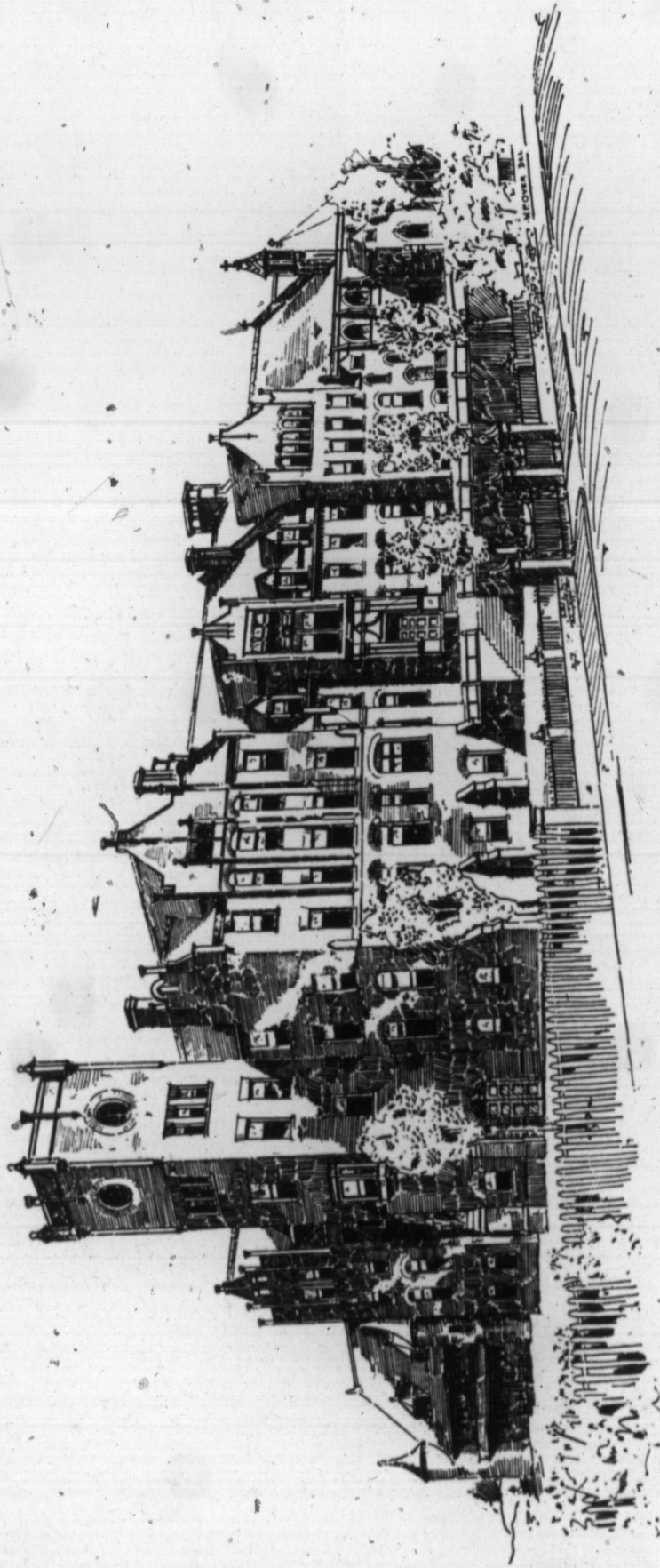

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## Trinity College School.

*"Beati mundo corde."*

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened on the first of May, 1865, under the Head-mastership of the late Rev. C. H. Badgley, M.A. During the summer of 1868 the School was removed to Port Hope. In January, 1872, the first portion of the new buildings was completed and occupied. The School premises now consist of over twenty acres of land, affording ample space for large Cricket, Tennis and Football grounds, situated on high land outside the town of Port Hope. The large and handsome building, including a beautiful Chapel, which presented a south front of about three hundred feet in length, and a west front of eighty feet, was completely destroyed by fire during the night of Saturday, February the 9th, 1895.

Though the fire, which was caused by the explosion of a coal-oil lamp in one of the Master's rooms, broke out shortly before midnight on a bitterly cold and stormy night, the boys were all got out in safety and speedily provided with comfortable quarters in the houses of friends in the town of Port Hope. Class-rooms in the Town Hall were kindly offered by the Mayor and Council, and schoolwork was resumed on the Tuesday morning. In the course of a few days, the St. Lawrence Hall, the largest hotel in the neighbourhood, was leased, together with a building nearly opposite, formerly occupied by the Bank of Toronto. The boys were gathered together from the houses of their hospitable entertainers, whose kindness can never be forgotten, and the work of the School was carried on without much inconvenience. The Churches of St. John and St. Mark were kindly placed at the disposal of the School by

their respective authorities and services for the boys were held at first in both, but subsequently for the sake of convenience in the latter alone. The disaster that befell the School was thus bravely met, discomforts and difficulties were cheerfully borne, and the conduct of the boys, under trying circumstances, was admirable throughout.

As soon as the weather permitted, in the middle of March, the work of clearing up the ruins was undertaken. In the meantime, plans for the new building were being prepared by Messrs. Darling, Sproatt and Pearson, Architects, Toronto, and on the 1st of May, the laying of the foundations was begun. The work of rebuilding is being rapidly carried on, and the new structure is to be ready for the reopening of the School in September.

The new building will be four storeys in height, with the Chapel and dining-hall at the east end; the south front will be about 300 feet in length, and the west over 100. An addition, about sixty by fifty feet, is being erected in the rear; this will contain the furnace and boilers, bath-rooms, lavatories, etc., and will be connected by passages with the first and second floors of the main building. The whole structure will be heated by steam throughout and ventilated in the most modern scientific manner. It will be almost fire-proof, the staircases being of stone and iron; the corridors floored with Deseronto terra-cotta covered with asphalt; the roofs of slate, and the whole divided by thick fire-walls into five portions, each with an independent staircase.

The new Port Hope Waterworks will furnish an abundant supply of pure water from Lake Ontario for all domestic and sanitary purposes and also for complete fire protection. Hydrants will be provided in every part of the building as well as outside. As the utmost pains have been taken with all the details of construction and arrangement, it is confidently expected that the new structure will not only be far superior to the old in comfort and convenience, but at least equal to any other building of the kind in the Dominion.

The Gymnasium, which was erected a few years ago from designs by the same architects, is a brick and stone building

about eighty feet by fifty and two storeys in height. The ground floor forms a play-room for use in bad weather, with Cricket, Football and Photographic rooms, etc., and a furnace for heating, while the upper floor, which forms a lofty and spacious apartment, is devoted to the Gymnasium, and is fitted up with all necessary apparatus.

This building faces the playground and makes a very striking addition to the group of school buildings, with its flanking round towers of massive stone (shingled wood-work above) at the north and south angles, and the long balcony, with overhanging roof, between them.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the session of 1871-72, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor, the Provost, and the Professors in Arts of the University of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may, from time to time, be appointed by the Governing Body.

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### Course of Instruction.

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The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Scripture History, Catechism, Natural Sciences, Bookkeeping, Drawing, Vocal Music and Military Drill.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examinations of the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, the Army, Navy, etc. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits. Instruction can also be obtained, if desired, in Shorthand writing.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School system. Out-of-school government is, accordingly, to some extent vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the senior boys by the Head Master.

### Fees.

The Fees for board and tuition are \$267 per annum, or \$89 per term for boarders, and \$67.50 per annum, or \$22.50 per term for day-boys, and are payable at the beginning of each term *in advance*; if, however, payment of the Fees, together with any school account of the previous term, is made during the first fortnight of term, a discount of ten per cent. off the Fees is allowed, thus *reducing the charges* to \$240 per annum, or \$80 per term, for boarders, and to \$60 per annum, or \$20 per term, for day-boys.

The Fees for any boy whose parents do not reside in the Dominion of Canada, or any other part of the British Empire, are \$334 per annum, or \$112 per term, subject, however, to a similar discount, as above, if paid within the first fortnight of term, which reduces them to \$300 per annum, or \$100 per term.

Each new boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance Fee of \$4, which is devoted to the maintenance and improvement of the Boys' Library and Reading-room, and a Fee of \$12 in lieu of bedding, etc., which are now supplied by the School instead of, as formerly, by the Pupils.

The above Fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, etc., and medical attendance.

A Half-term's notice must be given in writing before the removal of a Pupil. If such notice is not given, a Half-term's Fee will be collected.



The following rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870 :—

“The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a fortnight after a boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the parent or guardian for the amount (with bank charges) at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonoured, the boy must be sent home by the Head Master.”

Books and stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

*Boys over twelve years of age* will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence, as shall perfectly satisfy the Head Master and the Governing Body. Boys are not received under ten years of age.

To secure admission, a deposit of \$10 must be made on application, which will be accounted for when the boy finally leaves the School.

Forms of application can be obtained from the Head Master.

### Exhibitions.

THE LATE VENERABLE JOHN WILSON, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough, bequeathed \$1,500 to the School for the purpose of founding two Exhibitions of the annual value of \$50 each, for the sons of the Clergy, in the province of Ontario. These Exhibitions are tenable from year to year during the whole period of the recipient's residence at the School; provided that his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The nomination to these Exhibitions rests in the hands of the Head Master, to whom a letter testimonial of previous good conduct must be presented by the applicant.

### Bursaries.

The Corporation of the School offers to the sons of the Clergy in the Dominion of Canada, TWENTY BURSARIES of the annual value of \$120 each, tenable from year to year during the whole period of a boy's residence at the School, so long as his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The son of any clergyman who is, or was at the time of his death, actually engaged in Parochial or Missionary work or in a Church School or College in the Dominion, shall be eligible for a Bursary. Written application must be made to the Head Master by the parent or guardian of the boy, certifying that, without the aid thus afforded, the educational advantages of the School cannot be obtained for him. *Ceteris paribus* preference will be given to the sons of the Clergy in the Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario, Niagara, Algoma and Huron.

### Scholarship.

A Scholarship of the annual value of \$60 has been founded in memory of the late REV. F. A. BETHUNE, M.A., who died on the 20th January, 1877, at Cannes, in France, and who had been for nine years a most efficient and zealous Assistant Master in the School.

The Scholarship (to be known as "THE REV. F. A. BETHUNE SCHOLARSHIP") will be awarded annually to the boy who obtains the highest number of marks for General Proficiency in the Fifth Form Examination in July, on condition that the holder continues for another year to pursue his studies in the Sixth Form of the School. The Scholarship will not be awarded unless at least two-thirds of the total number of marks be obtained.

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### Boarding.

Boarders are received into the School house, which is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by six Resident Masters, who direct the boys' evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by experienced Lady Matrons.

It is particularly requested that parents should send their boys to school with all their clothing, linen, and other requisites, carefully and *clearly marked with the name in full*.

It is desired that no eatables should be sent to the boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vacations at a charge of \$5 per week for board. No pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

Each boy will be supplied with twenty-five cents per week pocket-money, and from this will be deducted the cost of all unreported breakages and damages to furniture, etc.

No boy will be permitted to go away from the School during Term, except for some very important reason which meets with the approval of the Head Master.

### School Hours.

*Summer* : 9 to 12.30 ; 1.30 to 3.30. Morning Study, 6.45 to 7.45 ; Evening, 7.30 to 9.

*Winter* : 9 to 12.30 ; 4 to 6. Morning Study, 7.15 to 7.45 ; Evening, 7 to 9.

Wednesdays, Saturdays and Saints' Days, are half-holidays.

### The Chapel.

During Term, prayers are said in the Chapel on week-days at 8.45 in the morning, and immediately before study in the evening. On Sundays there are full services at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. The Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday morning at 7.30. The Lord Bishop of Toronto holds an Annual Confirmation in the Chapel on the Sunday before Easter.

### Terms.

The School Year is divided into three Terms:—

*Michaelmas Term*, 1895 : From September 19 to December 19.

*Lent Term*, 1896 : From January 9 to April 2.

*Trinity Term*, 1896 : From April 16 to July 2.

### Vacations.

Two weeks at Easter; two months at midsummer; three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the shorter holidays by the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways for one fare and a third.

### Examinations and Prizes.

Examinations are held at the end of Michaelmas and Trinity Terms; the latter is conducted by the Professors of Trinity College, and other gentlemen unconnected with the School. A General Proficiency Prize is given at Christmas and Midsummer to the head boy of each Form. A report of the progress and general conduct of each pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents or guardians at the end of each Half-term, and at the close of each Examination.
