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DISASTROUS FOREST FIRE. THOUSANDS OF ACRES BURNED OVER NEAR HOLYWOOD.

Farmer's Fight the Fire all Day—Twenty Lives in Vicinity.

HOLYWOOD, April 21. A fire that destroyed a large amount of valuable woodland property started from some embers that were carried on the brush on the outskirts of this city at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The wind was blowing a furious gale at the time and fanned the embers into flames, which were communicated to the woods near by. Before any one reached the fire it was beyond control.

The high overhead wind carried it from tree to tree with great rapidity. The farmers turned out in great numbers, but were saved by the fire before they could do any good.

Thousands of acres of valuable timber land were burned over before the fire was finally got under control at midnight near the hollow boundary, four miles from where it started. It had laid waste a territory four miles long and from 100 to 400 yards wide. Luckily, there were but a few houses in its path, and only one was burned—that of a man named Squire.

Three other houses had narrow escapes, but were saved by the efforts of 30 to 40 men, who formed around them. The loss cannot be accurately estimated, but it will amount to many thousands. Among the heaviest losses are Royal, Hinton and Gayles in the parish, and Hadley, who had large quantities of wood destroyed. There were many narrow escapes from serious personal injury during the progress of the fire. A man was driving along in a forest road in a wagon with three children when the fire swept down upon him. He put the children under the wagon blanket, and they escaped unhurt, but he was badly burned. The fire was not extinguished until the wind had died out. It had done so far from a great deal of damage as to be from the fire done. There were reported and all the telegraph wires in this vicinity are down.
