

In the making of axes, scythes, chisels, cutlery, saws, stc. grindstones play an important part. Around the plant of Henry Disston & Sons, Philadelphia, is built a wall, over a mile long, made entirely of the worn out centres or "butts" of grindstones.

One thing has changed in evening hair styles. Clusters of little shortcurls are now placed atop an otherwise simple coifffure, toward the back. This builds the hair up high and gives needed elaboration. 


