



COAL AND TIN IN P. E. ISLAND

Dr. Ells, Dominion Geologist, Tells of Result of Visit to the Island. Dr. Ells, of Ottawa, dominion geologist,

who is here making a geological map, has returned from Prince Edward Island where he spent a few days looking into the possibility of developing the coal industry in the island province. He says a company has been formed to open up the industry. The dominion government has agreed to subsidize the operations to certain extent and the provincial government now have under consideration the giving of assistance. Dr. Ella was down on Friday to look over the matter for the dominion government. He advised the P. E. Island government to purchase a drill

E. Island government to purchase a unit and to loan it to any company desiring its use, the company to pay the boring expenses, assisted by the dominion government subsidy.

The island government has not yet decided upon its course and until it does so no action can be taken. Dr. Ells expects were in a day or so from them. so no action can be taken. Dr. Ells expects word in a day or so from them.

The plan is to bore in different parts of the island, the holes going down some 2,000 or 2,500 feet, if necessary. Each boring will take some time and the outlook for striking coal is considered as very bright. 
