MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

FOURTH LONDON CONFERENCE

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN THE TOWN OF SARNIA, ONT.

THE Conference assembled in the Methodist Church, in the tewn of Sarnia, on Thursday, the second day of June, 1887, at 9 a.m.,—the Rev. W. R. PARKER, D.D., President, in the chair.

After singing the 753rd hymn, and reading portions of Scripture, the usual Conference prayer-meeting was held until 10 o'clock.

The District Secretaries presented the names of the laymen appointed delegates to this Conference.

The roll was called, and 105 ministers and 36 laymen answered to their names.

The following collection of statistics was presented by the Secretary-Treasurer, as gathered from the District Reports:—Ministers receiving under \$600 salary, 51; number of claimants of such ministers, 90; claimants, children of superannuated ministers, 19;—total, 109. Ratable members 23,469. To raise \$25 per claimant would require \$2,725, or a tax of 12 cents per member.

Your Committee would gladly recommend the adoption of the Children's Fund as modified at the last General Conference, and believe it would, if adopted, be helpful to brethren with families appointed to the weaker Circuits. But as the Superannuation Fund is now raised on the Circuits by an assessment, for which the Superintendents are held responsible, and believing that two funds made assessable would be objectionable, and militate one against the other, your Committee feels reluctantly compelled to recommend the discontinuance of the Children's Fund.

The Committee recommend that the balance in hand of \$19.34 be given to the Contingent Fund.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT.

Requested to be laid before the several Annual Conferences, and published for information in their Minutes.

Although this Fund has been in existence since the time of the for-6, for publica-mation of a General Conference in 1874, it has never had a written constitution.

The object of the Fund, as gathered from its history, and found in the Journals of the General Conferences and in the Discipline of the Church. d the Annual is to pay the travelling expenses of delegates to and from the General other amounts Conference, and of representatives to other churches and bodies who are g used. This appointed by the General Conference; to meet the salaries and expenses pertain unproof our General Superintendents, and of all General Conference committees we capital the that have no funds of their own; as also to pay the expenses of transfers account of the in certain specified cases.

The different departments of the Church, up till the meeting of the bentures, and last General Conference, paid one-half of the salaries and expenses of the owing are the General Superintendents, leaving only the other half to be paid by the Fund.

The income for this moiety was derived from collections taken up from year to year in the several Circuits and Missions in the entire Church, and yet that income has always been insufficient to meet the demands, and hence the Fund has always been in debt.

The present Treasurer was appointed at the last General Conference, and the whole amount necessary to meet all the above claims in full was thrown on the Fund, without aid from any department of the Church. Nearly all the collections for the year 1886 and 1887 had been paid to the former Treasurer, and yet at the close of the General Conference the Fund was in debt about \$5,000. The present indebtedness of the Fund is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with large quarterly payments and other

heavy special claims to be met as they arise.

The Finance Committee of the General Conference, seeing the very great responsibility involved and the large amounts to be raised, took the following action, viz. (Journal, p. 251): The estimated amount required during the quadrennium, less cash on hand, was \$30,000, or an average of \$7,500 per year. This amount was divided by them as follows: Toronto Conference, \$1,430; London, \$1,000; Niagara, \$1,000; Guelph, \$875; Bay of Quinte, \$875; Montreal, \$1,125; Nova Scotia, \$400; New Brunswick, etc., \$400; Newfoundland, \$125; and Manitoba, etc., \$310. These amounts will therefore be required annually, in the estimation of the Finance Committee, to meet the claims on the Fund. The amount paid by the several Annual Conferences last year up till the 1st of September was about \$5,200. Now the Discipline (see p. 50) directs the officers of the General Conference "to disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference expenses," etc. I understand from this clause that the Fund is not to go into debt beyond the quadrennium. As the matter is now carried on, the largest expenditure is incurred in the payment of General Conference expenses at the beginning of the quadrennium, thus involving heavy payments for interest. What is to be done? I suggest-

1st. That every Circuit and Mission should take up a large all-day Sabbath collection, and forward it immediately, through its proper officer,

to the Treasurer. This will reduce the interest account.

2nd. Should there be any deficiency at the close of any year in the amount expected from any Conference, let prompt and energetic measures be adopted to meet such deficiency. It will be found easier to do this annually than to raise the whole amount at the end of the quadrennial term.

Our brethren throughout the entire Church will see that it will require united, vigorous and prompt action to save the Fund from financial embarrassment, and to enable it to pay in full the amounts needed successfully to carry on our work.

As usual the Sabbath-school work has been prosecuted with great zeal,

and success has crowned the labors of the earnest toilers.

The statistical reports give indications of substantial progress—an increase of 12 schools, 1,470 scholars, and 112 teachers members of our Church, is encouraging. But there is room for improvement, as we find that out of 381 preaching appointments, 79, or nearly one-fifth of the whole, have no schools, and we urge all Superintendents of Circuits to organize schools wherever possible.

While there has been a slight decrease in the number of conversions during the year, yet there is a larger number attending class than ever. A falling off of 311 in the number of those learning the Catechism should awaken every Sabbath-school superintendent and teacher to the importance of the children being more thoroughly impressed with the duty of be-

coming acquainted with this compendium of our faith.

In these times of agitation on the temperance question, while it is gratifying to find an increase of 79 in the number of those who have taken the total abstinence pledge, we would strongly urge all Sabbath-school workers to have the pledge more generally signed by the scholars.

In reference to literature, we find our own papers have a large circulation in our schools, amounting to 18,769 copies; but we deprecate the extensive use of foreign papers to the detriment of our better and more reliable publications, and would earnestly recommend our schools to patronize the high-class literature issued from our own Book Room. In order to provide for a felt want, we would recommend the publication of a smaller paper than any now issued, costing about six cents, for the infant

To ensure accurate returns, and thus render our statistical tables still more reliable, we recommend that great care be taken to have the schedules of the District Secretary and the District Representative harmonize, and that the Representative bring to the Conference all the Circuit schedules for reference.

Deeply anxious that our people should be more fully informed concerning our Sabbath-school work, we further recommend that the Sabbathschool Report be read in all our congregations in connection with the reading of the Pastoral Address, and also be published in the Banner to be read in all our Sabbath-schools.

The Committee would draw attention to the provision in the Discipline for the holding of District Sabbath-school Conventions, and recommend

that they be held in connection with every District.

Feeling that there is danger of losing sight of the true design of Sabbath-school instruction, and recognizing the great import of the spiritual bearing of the lessons taught, we recommend that the teachers be deeply in earnest in bringing the truth home to the hearts of the members of their respective classes, and seek by prayerful endeavor to lead the children to Christ.

Pomeroy, your Committee suggest: That while we ied towards re deprecate what is commonly called "wire-pulling" on the part of either official boards or pastors, nevertheless we do not feel ourselves justified in interfering with the privilege of petition from our Official Boards respecting ministers whom they prefer to have as pastors of their respec-tive churches, and whom they have good reasons to believe will prove efficient and successful. We would, however, recommend that the Stationing Committee shall pay no attention to any invitation to ministers that has not received the approval of a clear majority of the membership of the Official Board.

3. The memorial from the Aylmer District, relating to Bro. John Davy's appeal for aid was also carefully considered, and it was resolved to recommend the Conference to sanction his request, and allow him to issue a circular to the ministers, to present to the congregations, asking for assistance. We would also recommend that subscriptions thus obtained shall be sent to the Chairman of the Aylmer District, to be forwarded by him to Bro. Davy.

4. That as the members of the Chatham District, by a unanimous vote, have respectfully requested this Conference to petition the Ontario and Dominion Parliaments in favor of granting the electoral franchise to women, this Conference directs that such a petition be prepared, and signed on its behalf, by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to

the Clerk of each House named.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Report of the Committee appointed to consider the subject of Domestic Missions, especially in the cities and towns.

Your Committee reports:

1. That it has been and still may be found necessary, for many reasons, to maintain dependent churches in some of the towns and cities, said churches requiring assistance from the Missionary Fund in order to their perpetuation and to aid in the support of the ministers who are appointed to them.

2. That, while this is the case, your Committee recommend the Conference to give such direction to the District Meetings that a due regard to economy in the expenditure of missionary money in towns and cities may be exercised, and the end kept in view of the reduction in number, and ultimate extinction, of the claims of those places on the Mission Fund.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

do hereby tender our sincere thanks to each of the speakers for his instructive, eloquent, and inspiring words.

This Conference reaffirms its rigid adherence to the principles and

practice of total abstinence and prohibition.

We regard the Scott Act as legislation in the direction of national prohibition, and eminently useful in itself, being in advance of any previous temperance legislation in this country, and are resolved to make the best possible use of its provisions within our power; and any attempt to weaken, mutilate, or repeal it, will be met by our prompt and strenuous condemnation.

We call attention to the necessity of all law-abiding citizens co-operating with all consistent efforts to enforce the Scott Act, by assisting those Government officials who are striving to do their duty, and reporting those who are guilty of neglect.

While holding to the principles of the Scott Act, we distinctly avow our ultimate object and aim to be the entire prohibition of the whole traffic, and we further express our belief that this country is sufficiently

enlightened to sustain and enforce such a measure.

We also recognize the fact that the supporters of the liquor traffic were never more active, determined and unscrupulous than they are at the present time. They are employing money with a lavish hand for the purpose of corrupting legislators, defeating legislation, and defending. their business. They excite mobs, break windows, mutilate and torture dumb brutes, employ dynamite, beat and baffle officials, and stealthily resort to arson, and even murder, to intimidate and defeat the efforts of those who are imperilling their lives in order to rescue the perishing victims of this traffic of death. The wholesale dealers, both in England and America, are extending their control over the retail trade, gilding saloons, and pressing the sale of their poisonous drinks, thus perpetuating and increasing the evils of their trade. Men of repute in literature and scholarship are perverting science and Scripture and prostituting their talents in the interests of this abomination that opposeth itself to everything that is good and pure; "but they shall proceed no further, for their folly shall be made manifest to all men."

The Governments of England and America legalize the traffic at home and abroad for revenue purposes, while the German Government is taking possession of large sections of the Dark Continent and forcing rum, free of duty, upon the savage tribes of Africa, in the interests of the liquor monopolists. While Mohammedanism, Brahminism, and some of the savage tribes of Africa, forbid the sale and use of intoxicants, Christian governments legalize and protect its use, and persist, against the clearest light of science, Scripture, and experience, in taxing vice and authorizing one of the most destructive frauds ever imposed upon any generation of men. The men of Africa and Arabia will rise in the judgment with this generation and condemn it for its wicked complicity in this liquor

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Conference Committee on Sabbath Observance beg leave to report as follows:—

That while we believe that amongst the general public open and flagrant violations of the law of the country concerning the observance of the Sabbath day are of comparatively rare occurrence, and are thankful therefor, it is a notorious fact, reported to us by the memorials of the District Meetings, confirmed by our own observation, and not attempted to be screened by the offenders themselves, that the various railway corporations of our country carry on, upon that day, enormous operations for which there can be no valid excuse:

That the discrimination of the Ontario law in favor of such corporations, which permits the carrying of Her Majesty's mails and the conveyance of passengers on the Lord's day, is taken advantage of to an extent scarcely contemplated by the Act; and not only so, but the partial freedom of their roads on that day, caused by the cessation of local passenger traffic, is made the occasion for the moving of extraordinary quantities of freight along their lines;

That the whole tendency of the abuse is towards increase, inasmuch as the extra facilities thus afforded for the rapid transportation of live stock, etc., create an inducement to dealers in these commodities to ship at such times as will secure their principal movement on that day:

That in the carrying on of such work large numbers of men are necessarily employed, who are thus deprived of the privileges of the Sabbath day:

That not only they, but the general public, particularly the youth of our land, become so familiarized with these constant desecrations of God's holy day as to gradually produce in their minds a disregard, if not a contempt, for all such sacred institutions; That i especially systematic demanded impossible that anyth handed pe and that fraught wi

youth of s of God's not a conThat it is the duty as well as the privilege of all Christian people, especially of the leaders of God's hosts, to solemnly protest against the systematic profanation of that which God hath specifically and emphatically demanded should be preserved holy to Himself; and that we believe it impossible—founding our belief upon the teachings of our blessed Bible—that anything like a permanent prosperity can ever accompany such high-handed peculation from the holy domain of Him who controlleth all things, and that the interposition of any force which will prevent it must be fraught with infinite advantage to the corporations themselves;

That we view with much satisfaction the action taken by the St. Thomas Ministerial Association in forwarding for circulation in every congregation in the Dominion forms of petition to be presented to the Dominion Legislature and the Dominion Senate, asking for such enactments as will meet the case. The following are the suggestions of the

circular accompanying these forms of petition, viz:—

(1) That ministers of all denominations should preach upon the subject. (2) That it should be brought forward, and resolutions passed in relation to it, at all Ministerial Associations and denominational Conferences, Conventions, Synods and Assemblies. (3) That petitions for the necessary Act of Parliament, to be passed by the Dominion Legislature, be prepared, circulated and signed throughout the entire Dominion. (4) That two petitions be prepared for each branch of the Legislature, one to be signed only by voters; and another to be signed only by adults of both sexes. (5) That in every case these petitions be intrusted to a competent and properly constituted committee in each locality. (6) That persons be employed to canvass for signatures to these petitions, every settlement and village, and every ward in each town and city. (7) That these petitions be presented to the Dominion Legislature by members of Parliament of both political parties.

And we your Committee recommend that the members of this Conference pledge themselves to extend their hearty sympathy and active cooperation to the carrying out of these suggestions. Thus shall we assist in wiping a blot from the character of our Dominion, and by our intolerance of such sin in our midst we will come nearer to the blessings which God, through Isaiah, promised when he said, "If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father, for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it."

REV. ROBERT FOWLER, M.D. 5

The Rev. Robert Fowler, M.D., was born in the city of Chester, England, in the year 1823. His father was the late Rev. Joseph Fowler, one of the most prominent ministers of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Born in the itinerancy, his early homes were in leading towns and cities, such as London, Leeds, Bristol, Birmingham, Hull, etc. At the age of fifteen he began in the last named place the study of medicine and surgery. After the lapse of five years he went up to London to complete his course, and in three years more graduated, first as an apothecary, and afterwards as a member of the Royal College of Surgeons. He finally settled in Leeds, where for six years he practised his chosen profession. For some time, however, he had felt strongly drawn toward the work of the Christian ministry, and at length, after considerable service in the Church as a lay worker, he decided to abandon his profession, with all its worldly advantages, and to devote himself fully to the work of Christ in the salvation of souls. He was at once accepted as a candidate for the Wesleyan ministry, but under the advice of some of the leading ministers he decided to begin his life-work in America. After a short stay in New York he came to Canada, where he received a hearty welcome and was induced to unite with the Canadian Conference. This was in the year 1853, and from that time for over thirty years he continued with untiring zeal to fill the toilsome but honorable position of a Methodist minister. During that period he labored on the following Circuits: Nelson, Oshawa, Markham, Toronto East, Hamilton, Consecon, Brantford, Yonge Street South, Keene, Frankford, Sidney, Colborne, Orillia, Fergus, Ingersoll, Clinton, Listowel and London West: Never of a very strong constitution, his health finally gave way while stationed at London West, and in the year 1884 he found it necessary to take a superannuated relation. He took up his abode in London, and became a regular attendant of the Queen's Avenue Church. His heart was still in his muchloved work, and he was for some months buoyed up with the hope that ere long he would be able to resume active service; but God had other designs for him. Through the waning of his strength he was at length confined to his room. His last sickness continued for about fifteen months, and was accompanied with much pain and physical prostration. In the earlier part of this sickness his spirits were much depressed: God was testing and purifying him as with refiner's fire; but finally he emerged from the gloom and the conflict into clear, unclouded sunlight. For months his room was like a Bethel; his spirit triumphed and exulted in the marvellous grace of God, and in the contemplation of the Divine perfections. To converse with him was a privilege and a benediction;

and some will never forget the loftiness and fervor of his spirit and utterances as he seemed, like John in Patmos, to look beyond the veil. In his note-book he has left brief references to some of these seasons of lofty communing. Among them are these: "Blessings boundless and inexpressible on the preceding night;" and again, "Dec. 11th, 1886. For one of the sweetest three hours from 5 to 8 a.m., that mortal ever spent outside of heaven." His faith in God was very strong, and his hope of heaven very bright. Truly that chamber of sickness was "privileged be-

vond the common walks of life."

A brief reference to his prominent characteristics is all that space will allow. Dr. Fowler was a man of strong individuality. He was intensely conscientious. His purpose was, as far as possible, to be right, and for this he was continually looking to heaven for help. When convinced that he was in the line of duty, neither threats nor persuasion could move him. He feared not man, but he feared God. He was a man of studious habits and extensive reading. Possessing a large and varied store of information, his conversation was always interesting and instructive. The study of the Bible was his delight, and the extensive annotations on the margins of the sacred Book show how devout was his spirit, and how close his study. His chief strength in the pulpit was in his clear and thoughtful exposition of the divine word. His theology was thoroughly Wesleyan, and he made much of the work of spreading scriptural holiness through the land. When invited to lecture before the Theological Union of his Conference, he selected for his theme the doctrine of perfect love. He was a firm believer in the efficacy of prayer, and had constantly before him an extensive list of persons and objects to be prayed for. He abounded in thanksgiving, and the most trifling things given him in the spirit of love became to him a bond of gratitude. His diary makes mention of visits, looks and words which had touched his heart. He thirsted for love, and valued far above earthly treasure the confidence and affection of his fellow-men, and of this no small share fell to his lot. He was of a broad, Catholic spirit, and showed a deep interest in the work of all Christian bodies. From childhood he had been humble, shrinking, selfdepreciating. His sense of sin was very strong, and he ever took a low and disparaging view of his work as a preacher. Among the entries in his diary is the following: "A prayer for faith that staggers not at the thought of Robert Fowler getting to be like Jesus, and be with Jesus in heaven." And yet faith triumphed over doubt and fear, and his last months were full of brightness. He truly rejoiced "in hope of the glory of God." So this man of strong individuality and saintly spirit went to his reward on Friday morning, March 4th, at the age of 64 years, leaving behind him the testimony of a well-spent life and an honorable career.

His remains were followed to the tomb by a large number of brethren in the ministry, and a very solemn and affecting service was held in con-

nection therewith. Of him we may now say:

"Servant of God, well done! Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won, And thou art crowned at last.

REV. G. N. A. F. T. DICKSON

Was born at "Templenew," near Ballyshannon, in the County of Donegal, Ireland, on the 21st October, 1825. His parents were members of the English Church, and he was educated with the purpose of entering its ministry.

In the year 1847 he came to St. John, N.B., where he shortly afterwards became head-master of the Madras Training School—a Government institution for the education of teachers. In the following year, under the ministry of the Rev. Ingham Sutliffe, a gracious revival of religion broke out in the Centenary Methodist Church. From a spirit of curiosity he was induced to attend some of the services, and through the faithful preaching of the Gospel his eyes were opened to the fact that he was yet in his sins. The struggle was long. His past life had been blameless in the eyes of men, and a life of outward morality was all he deemed necessary to secure the favor of God. But he now saw himself as worthy of eternal death.

To give his heart to the Lord and connect himself with the Methodist Church would involve the severance of the dearest human ties, and the renunciation of his worldly prospects—the Institute of which he was Principal being under the patronage of the English Church. But when he came to the point of "counting all things but loss for Christ," he entered into the full and blessed experience of pardon, and rejoiced in the clear light of the Gospel.

In 1851 he entered the ministry of the Methodist Church, and received his first appointment to Montreal, where he was ordained for special purposes during the same year. Subsequently he was married to Miss Fanny Baker, daughter of the Rev. John Baker, for many years missionary to Africa and the West Indies.

During his ministerial labors he was stationed in Montreal, Kingston. Hamilton, Niagara, Oshawa, St. John's, St. Thomas, Sarnia, London, and other places, in all of which his labors were highly appreciated, and crowned with marked success.

For many years he had been suffering from chronic bronchitis, which resulted in a hemorrhage of the lungs while stationed in Exeter, and as a result of which he was compelled to abandon the work he so dearly loved, and in which he had been so eminently successful. At the Conference of 1886 he was granted a superannuated relation, when, with his family, he returned to London to reside.

During his last illness, which extended over a year, he was graciously sustained and comforted by the Divine presence. Never demonstrative in the expression of his spiritual enjoyments, there was, nevertheless, the steady, constant repose of a soul resting in the love of God. Bro. Dickson was a man of extensive culture, seeking to keep himself abreast with all the important questions of the age. His Christian life was singularly blameless and exemplary. He was a man of intense spirituality. Communion with God in private devotion was a marked peculiarity of his religious life.

His preaching was a straightforward presentation of the great truths of the Gospel, uniformly earnest and practical, always aiming to leave

such impressions on the mind of saint and sinner as would lead them to a better and more Christly life. In this work his labors were abundantly owned of God, and many will be the stars in the crown of his rejoicing. To know Bro. Dickson was to love him, and he was a brother beloved by all who enjoyed the pleasure of his acquaintance. Throughout the whole of his Christian life Christ was a precious reality to him, and never more so than when the "weary wheels of life" were about to stand still.

To the Rev. Dr. Ryckman and his pastor he said, on leaving him to attend the Annual Conference at Sarnia, "Tell my brethren and friends at Sarnia I am dying in the faith which I preached unto them." His final moments were full of heavenly peace. The last words he was heard to utter were, "The Lord is very near." On the 2nd day of June, in the 62nd year of his age, just as the clock was striking the hour of nine—the very hour when his brethren in the ministry were gathered for their Conference prayer-meeting—without a struggle or a sigh, the pure and gentle spirit of Bro. Dickson passed upward to join the general assembly and the Church of the first-born. He was not, for God took him.

REV. ROMULUS B. COOK

Was born in Oneida Co., N.Y., October 6, 1811. He was converted to God when but nine years of age, under the labors of a Baptist missionary. He united with the Methodist Church in the United States, and was soon licensed as a local preacher.

In the year 1835 he came to Canada, and labored as a local preacher until 1847, when he was called into the active work by the Rev. Wm. Ryerson, and sent to Adelaide Mission, which he travelled two years. Then he removed to Michigan, in which State he resided five years. He returned to Canada and took work in the late M. E. Church, on the following Circuits and Missions: Howard, Thamesville, Walsingham, Canboro', Smithville, Whitby, Mariposa, Oakland, Goderich, Hartford, Vienna, Welland, Rainham, Beverley, Barton, Malahide, and Walsingham and Vienna.

A few years ago he was superannuated, but he still cherished a deep interest in the Church of his choice and affection, and preached almost every Sabbath up to the time of his last illness.

On the 20th of November, 1835, he was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Backhouse, who, "in age and feebleness extreme," survives him. He left two sons, both practising medicine in the United States, and one daughter, wife of the Rev. W. H. Locke, of Dakota.

Father Cook died October 24th, 1886, after a painful affliction of six weeks, borne with the most exemplary Christian patience and resignation. "During his sickness," writes his pastor, "the burden of his mind was shown in the intense anxiety he had for the welfare of the Church. Nearly the last words he uttered were those of a message he sent with me to the friends where I was holding special meetings: 'Tell the brethren,' said he, 'that nothing short of Holy Ghost power will bring men to Christ,' and to the unconverted he sent as his last request, 'for them to meet him in heaven.'"

That the Chairmen of Districts, after consultation with Delegates, meet before the close of this Conference and determine the amount which it shall be the endeavor of the respective Districts to raise pursuant to the above resolution; and that each Chairman, at such time and place as he may deem expedient, shall, in consultation with representatives from the Circuits, subdivide the amount allotted to his District, according to the financial strength of the several Circuits.

4th. That we appeal to every Circuit and Mission within the bounds of the Conference, and venture to express the hope that it will do its utmost to collect, at the earliest possible date, the amount—great or small—which may be allotted to it by the brethren at their District Conventions.

Resolved,—That as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature is found in the ballot box, we declare our purpose by the pulpit, by the press, and by every legitimate means, to inculcate the responsibility of all Christian men and good citizens to subordinate political party alliances to the great work of securing the abolition of the liquor traffic.

Resolved,—That while we recognize in the Senate some noble representative men, who have stood faithful to their responsibilities, and have sought to advance prohibitory reform, we affirm our utter want of confidence in the majority of the members of that body on this question, and lament the deliberate action of the Government in filling the vacancies which occur by men who are, with but few exceptions, the declared and determined opponents of the temperance reform.

Resolved,—That we declare our desire to co-operate with the various Conferences of the Methodist Church, and with all Christian Churches of the Dominion, as well as all the temperance organizations, in a combined effort to marshal public sentiment, which shall demand of the Parliament of this Dominion prohibitory legislation, which shall abolish the greatest of evils under which the people of this Dominion mourn.

By daily study of the Word, by never-ceasing prayer, by faithful use, of all the means, and by complete dedication of yourselves to Christ, we beseech you to press forward to those higher joys and richer experiences of Christian life that are before you. Let your life show forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light.

We commend to you, brethren, the various enterprises of the Church. Let none of her interests suffer. See that ye abound to every good work.

The commission is still with us: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." The success that crowns our missionary efforts has scarcely known a parallel in the history of modern missions. With success come greater opportunities and responsibilities. The fields on every side are white to the harvest, and scores of our young men, called of God, are ready to enter the fields and gather fruit unto eternal life. We call your attention to our Church periodicals. You cannot secure a cheaper and better supply of literature than they afford. They should make their regular visits to all your homes that they may crowd out the trash with which our land is flooded and by which so many of our youth are destroyed. Our publications cannot fail to do a work for which you

will be thankful through the coming years.

Our Sunday-schools were never more prosperous than now. They are continually increasing in numbers and efficiency. Every year brings hundreds of devoted teachers to swell the noble band of workers, and thousands of scholars each year are added to the multitudes already under our care. With devout gratitude we record the fact that 946 children have been converted among us since the Conference of 1886, and that 4,228 are meeting in class. Our schools are our hope. Full schools mean full churches and strong and well-developed Christians to do the work of God.

The cause of temperance never had a stronger claim upon us than at present. We must have all our children taught the nature of alcohol and the evils which accompany and follow its use. We trust you will encourage the schools in the quarterly temperance meetings recommended in our Discipline, and as the late General Conference set aside the last Sabbath of September as Temperance Sunday, we urge our people to make it a red-letter day among the children. Let the pledge be circulated and signed and all our young people pledged to life-long fidelity to God and to the right. We must hold with a firm grasp the temperance legislation we have secured, and avail ourselves of its provisions for curtailing the traffic in all that can intoxicate. But let us not be satisfied with present attainments. Packing our legislative halls in the interests of temperance, we must secure a law that shall forever place a ban upon the whole of the accursed traffic.

We need scarcely remind you that in these days, when the foundations of our social fabric are threatened by communistic doctrines, when the world trembles, and the air is filled with rumors of war between capital and labor, we have increased obligations to society and the State. Christianity recognizes the rights of private property and the divine origin and sanction of human government, enjoining loyalty and patriotism with a cheerful support of the powers that be.

A word with regard to the Lord's day. You are not ignorant, brethren, of the tendency of the times to deprive us of the benefits of the Christian Sabbath. Already hundreds of our people are shut off from its privileges and their rights by unguarded capitalists and corporations, who care more for gain than godliness. Let us do our utmost to bring back to these, our brethren, the quiet and blessings of God's holy day.

Concerning all the great moral questions of the present we must give no uncertain sound. We live in stirring times. God permits us to live that we may speed the right and bring to naught the wrong. The time is short.
