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



HE Canadians required more men to guard them, did less work, and trouble than any other prisoners," said Lieut. J. Beverley Robinson, R.A.F., two and a hair years a prisoner of war, escaping on his second attempt, being the only Canadian of-

If you are inclined to make light of imprisonment, then try to think what it means to live for months or years in the unsultary, pestilential camps in Germany where every nomible effort was made to heap multi and indescribable cruelty upon the men. Think what it means to work twelve or fourteen hours a day in the salt mines, to be tied up to posts in sero weather, to be hang up by the wists, or eran only to wash your clothing in fee-cole water.

I have seen even German and Cross worker; spit in bowls of some which they brought into the trails, then throw it into the faces of allied officers. have seen wounded soldiers dragged to the doors of the cars and there spat upon and jeered by the people."






