Plymouth Church Pews.

The recent annual sale of pews in
Plymouth Church is described in a New
York paper: The sale of Plymouth
Church pews has been for many years
an event of great interest in this part
of the country, and the prices realized have
often been enormously large. Since
Mr. Beecher's troubles began the re-
ceipts have gradually decreased, partly
because of the scandal, perhaps, but
largely because of the hard times. The
sale to-night was no exception. A de-
crease was expected, and it came. Mr.
Beecher made a few remarks before the
sale. The highest premium offered was
\$505, by H. W. Sage. The highest
premium last year was \$600, paid by H.
B. Claffin, who only bid \$300 to-night.
In 1875 Charles Dennis, who to-night
bid \$500 for second choice, paid the
highest premium, \$750. The amount
of premiums offered to-night is \$24,171,
which added to the pew rents aggregat-
ing \$12,758, makes a total of \$36,929,
\$10,593 less than last year's total of
\$47,522. In 1875 the premiums alone
amounted to \$58,320, making the total
of the revenues \$71,165. Mr. Claffin
obtained third choice to-night for \$300.
Nobody seemed to be surprised at the
comparatively small amount obtained
by the sale. "It's larger than I ex-
pected it to be this year," said one mem-
ber, and Mr. Beecher said, after the
sale, "If anybody's going to grumble,
it's not I." Mr. Beecher, by the way,
bought a pew himself for a premium of
two dollars. It was the last pew, and
nobody else bid for it. As the name of
of the buyer was announced a rumble of
applause was heard in the sanctuary.
The lowest premium paid was fifty cents.

FARM, GARDEN AND HOUSEHOLD.

Receipts.

CORN BREAD.—Take two and half
pints of corn meal, three eggs, well
beaten, one tablespoonful of melted
butter, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, and
one quart of sweet milk, mix thoroughly
and then add one pint of wheat flour, in
which one large tablespoonful of soda
and two of cream of tartar, with salt,
have been mixed. Bake in pans, and if
any thickness required.

FARMER'S FRUIT CAKE.—Soak two
cups of dried apples over night in luke-
warm water. In the morning drain the
apples and chop them fine. Simmer
them for two hours in two cups of molasses; when cool add a cup of brown
sugar, half a tablespoonful of cloves, one
of cinnamon, half a grated nutmeg and
a pinch of salt. Stir in a cup of butter,
two beaten eggs, half a cup of sour milk
and three cups of flour. Add a heaping
teaspoonful of soda, dissolved in two
tablespoonfuls of hot water, and last of
all put in a cupful or more of stoned
raisins dredged lightly with flour. Stir
well and bake immediately in pans with
buttered paper in the bottom of each.
This cake can be made in larger quan-
tity, and if well wrapped and put in a
close box or jar will keep fresh and good
for months.

POTATO SALAD.—This is an excellent
recipe: Take eight large Irish potatoes
when cold and slice them in a flat dish
with one or two onions and a sprinkling
of celery and salt; over each layer of
potato and onion pour the following
dressing: Beat two eggs with a table-
spoonful of sweet oil, add a small tea-
spoonful each of sugar, pepper, mustard
and salt; when well mixed pour on two
cupfuls of boiling vinegar; put back on
the fire and stir till it is as thick as
custard. Let it cool before putting it on
the potatoes; sprinkle with cayenne on
the top; make this in the dish in which
it is to come to the table, and, if possi-
ble, twenty-four hours before it is used.

WELSH RARE-BIT.—Two teaspoons
of grated or finely chopped cheese, one tea-
spoon of sweet cream, one and a half tea-
spoons of grated cracker or very stale
bread, three eggs lightly beaten; mix
crumbs, eggs and cream in a pan, then
stir in cheese. Add two "shakes" of
red pepper, one and a half tablespoonfuls
of mustard add a little salt. Put a lump
of butter, size of an egg, in the bake
dish; set in the oven until melted. Turn
in the ingredients and stir until all are
dissolved. Let it brown on the top, and
serve from the same dish for tea.

Roots for Cows.

Succulent food in the winter season
(together with warm stables and good
care) is one of the most necessary agencies
in keeping up a good flow of milk;
and in no way can this food be so suc-
cessfully and economically furnished as
by roots, fed raw—sliced or chopped.
Meal or shorts made into a thin mush
would furnish the moisture needed in
connection with the dry forage of winter,
and would no doubt give a richer milk
—but it would be more costly, and not
furnish so healthy a food as early cut
hay fed in connection with roots. More-
over, it is evident that cows will con-
tinue their milking qualities for a series
of years better with this food, than when
fed with the more stimulating corn meal.
Without doubt, some meal in connection
with the roots should be of advan-
tage, if the highest results were to be
reached, as the laxative nature of the
roots would counteract the heating ten-
dency of the meal, while the meal would
serve to keep the cow in good case.

Making Butter in Brazil.

There are four native modes of making
butter in the Empire of Brazil. The
first is by putting the milk in a common
bowl and beating it with a spoon, as you
would an egg. The second, by pouring
the milk into a bottle and shaking it till
the butter appears, when it is removed
by breaking off the top of the bottle.
The third, where the dairy is more ex-
tensive, is performed by filling a hide
with milk, which is lustily shaken by an
athletic native at each end until
butter is produced. The fourth, which
is considered to indicate vast progress
over any of the preceding methods, con-
sists in dragging the hide or leather
vessel, filled with milk, on the ground
after a galloping horse until it is sup-
posed the butter is formed. The milk
is never strained and the butter never
mashed.

Having rounded the northeast promontory of Hayti, they were suddenly struck by a northeasterly gale, and were compelled to put back and lie to under lee of St. Nicholas Mole. Here they were detained for ten more days in addition to the three they had lost in vain attempt to make headway. Ten other vessels lay with them. Twice they tried to weather the gale, and each time were driven back. On the 12th, Cap. Collins was taken with the fever, and after lingering for eight days, died. Soon after another seaman fell sick, and only one seaman, the mate, and the captain's wife, were left to be about. The woman was compelled to act as a seaman, and three nights at the wheel while the two men reeled the sails. On the 22d, a very heavy gale was blowing and the vessel was hoisted for Key West, 480 miles distant. The two men became thoroughly exhausted, and the woman was compelled to keep watch on deck several nights while the men slept. On the 26th, Key West was reached; the sick were put in the hospital, the owners were telegraphed, and the vessel arrived in New York last week. The lives of all on board were undoubtedly saved by the courage and endurance of this woman.

THE TREATY OF PARIS.—With respect to the proposed Conference on the Eastern Question, a telegram says that all the powers interested, except of course Russia, intend to insist on the Treaty of Paris being taken as the basis of negotiations. The substance of the treaty, which was ratified shortly after the Crimean War, is as follows:—First, that the *status quo* should be maintained in Asia, and that Russia should give back *Kars* to Persia; secondly, that Persia should restore that portion of Mesopotamia, which borders the mouth of the Danube, to Moldavia; third, the exclusive Protectorate over the Principalities should be taken away from the Czar, and be exercised only by Europe; fourth, the Black Sea should be neutralized and Russia and Turkey should be bound not to build or keep any maritime establishments there. The right is reserved only for Turkey and Russia to have a number of men-of-war there, viz.: six of 800 tons each and four of 200 tons each; and fifth, the independence and integrity of the Porte are secured by the six signatory powers, viz.: England, France, Prussia, Austria, Italy, and the United States. It is also agreed that all disputes arising between these Powers and the Porte should be submitted to the co-signatories. England and Austria are particularly bound by a separate treaty to support the clauses of the Paris Treaty. The Conference will assemble by authority of the provisions of the Paris Treaty, but it does not follow that the result of the deliberations will be to sustain the terms of the Treaty.

CANADIAN BARLEY.—The English malsters have discovered that the Canadian barley is well suited to the manufacture of light beers and ales which are growing in popularity in England, India and elsewhere. The native barley is admirably fitted for making the strong, heavy, English porters and ales, but the Canadian six-rowed species have been found to be superior to the other for producing the light beers. Hitherto the foreign barley used in England came from Hungary, Egypt and Denmark, but the American product now enters the market as a competitor, and is also likely to become popular in Holland and Germany. If the foreign demand for Canadian barley is well established, extensive malting houses will probably be built in the Province, and a winter demand be created, which will give the farmer more time in which to dispose of his crop.

The Governor-General when in New York last week attended a brilliant reception given by Miss Wolfe at her stately mansion in Madison Avenue. The glory of the house is its admirable collection of pictures. In the front parlor stands a picture of the Holy Family, which was painted for the Empress of Russia, and for which Mr. John Wolfe gave \$20,000 in gold. Nearly 700 guests were present.

ANTHROPOLOGY.—Dr. E. Lambert, of Brussels, has made a careful study of the teeth in the various races of man, and has arrived at some interesting conclusions. He finds very distinct characteristics in the dentation of the white and black races, especially in the molar teeth, for while in the former race they decrease in size backward, the last or wisdom tooth being the smallest, it is the reverse with the black race, the last being the largest. Again, in the white race the molars have usually four cusps; in the black race the usual number is five.

He observes also in the black race a slight diastema not met with in the white, and with the former the inner tubercle of the premolar is less developed than the outer, as with the anthropoid apes.

The dentation of the yellow race is more closely allied to the white than to the black race.

The red or native American race was unexpectedly found to present very nearly the same dentary characteristics as are shown in the black race.

The annual report of the Commission of Agriculture and Arts for Ontario has been presented to the Legislature, and is an interesting document. It represents the Agricultural Associations throughout the Province as in a flourishing state, and though the township societies show a disposition to amalgamate, there is enough of new societies formed to keep up the number as before. The financial condition of the Association is sound. It received last year as an appropriation \$99,500. The last Provincial Exhibition is said to have been one of the most successful ever held; and altogether the report presents a good showing in both agriculture and horticulture.

Anthracite Coal at Lepreau.

It is probable that the people of this Province will very soon have anthracite coal in abundance, and at a low rate, as our friends the Messrs. Hanson of Lepreau have established the fact, that they have on their lands coal deposits. Several years ago lumps of a hard substance were found at the shore, which was supposed to be plumbago, and it was used for polishing the stove, but it peeled off when the iron became heated, and little notice was taken of it, until five years ago, when Mr. Hanson wishing to fertilize the clay soil of his land, dug sand at the shore and among it noticed black stuff having a shiny appearance. He had some of the lumps examined by experts, who pronounced it a kind of Anthracite Coal. Mr. Hanson afterward dug some pits and tried the black shingle stones which burned tolerably well, the search was continued, but owing to no proper shaft having been sunk the labor and expense seemed to be in vain. Still Mr. Hanson felt convinced that there was coal on his land.

Sometime afterwards, (two years ago,) a Mining engineer in Boston was sent a small specimen, which upon being tested turned out fifty per cent pure anthracite, a shaft was sunk in May 1875 on the shore, and a quantity of "crushed coal" brought up. Owing however to the timbering of the shaft not being sufficiently strong, the earth crashed in and filled up the shaft. No lives were lost.

Early in 1877 another shaft was sunk a few rods to the westward of first one, and at eighty feet down a seam of anthracite was struck, but of a soft description. At 110 feet, the coal was better, and at 120 feet the shaft was run into the seam, which is reported to be 20 feet 6 inches in breadth, 16 of which was hard coal.

Specimens of the coal, used by blacksmiths for welding produced a quicker heat than charcoal; its heating and clearing qualities, are said to be equal to Pennsylvania anthracite. A practical trial of it was made of it on the Steamer "New York" by the chief engineer, Mr. Taylor, and he reported that it took fire rapidly, was of a very free burning nature, and burnt like anthracite coal, and gave a great heat. He also tried some in an open grate, and believed "it burnt even better than in the furnace."

Specimens were also submitted to a leading Mining engineer and Professor, and all agreed upon its value as a combustible. A company has been formed for operating the coal mine termed the "New Brunswick Anthracite Coal Mining Company" (Limited) with its head office at St. John. Capital \$300,000, shares \$5.00 each. Incorporated under Act of the Province of New Brunswick, 1877. Charlotte County is rich in minerals, and it is probable will yet supply the Province with coal. We congratulate the Messrs. Hanson on their good fortune, and valuable discovery.

THE RAILWAY.—We are indebted to the St. John Globe, for the following decision with reference to the daily running of trains to Saint Andrews. Among other judgments delivered by the Supreme Court, on the 9th inst was—

Ex parte the Attorney General re the New Brunswick & Canada Railway Company—Rule absolute for mandamus to compel the Company to run daily trains to St. Andrews.

PUBLIC FEELING IN ENGLAND

must be stirred to its centre on the Eastern Question, in consequence of the perfidy and aggressive policy of Russia, and falsifying its declared intentions, the voice of the people is "for war." The trade and commerce are dear to its people, who feel that Russia has placed its hands upon interests which the British nation will maintain, and that the time has arrived when Britain will protect her rights at all hazards.

The London Times and Daily News are philo-Russian, and public indignation rose to such a pitch recently that both those papers were publicly burnt at the Stock Exchange and Lloyd's. This is significant, and indicates that the sentiment of the people is averse to Russia, whose peace proposals were used for the purpose of humiliating the Turks and acquiring more of their territory. It is believed that had the recent vote of £6,000,000 passed Parliament when first asked for without debate, it is not probable that this outburst of public feeling would have occurred, or that Russia, flushed with success, would have meditated her troops entering Constantinople.

The Dominion Parliament was opened on the 7th inst. The hon. Mr. Anglin, we were pleased to learn was re-elected Speaker, by 116 to 33.

Pope Pius IX. is no more; the venerable Pontiff, after a long illness, died on the afternoon of the 7th inst, in the 86th year of his age. To attempt giving a mere narrative of the principle events connected with his sovereignty would occupy many columns. He was of a noble Italian family named Mastai-Ferretti. He was elevated to the Pontifical chair in 1846. He was a liberal and kind man, but was compelled to flee from Rome in 1856, owing to the uprising of the conspirators, but afterwards returned in 1859, under the protection of France. In 1870 the French troops left Italy, when the Italian troops entered Rome, when his temporal sovereignty ended. During his reign, the dogma of the Immaculate Conception and the dogma of Infallibility of the Pope were defined, and England divided into Roman Catholic dioceses.

A boat containing five men was capsized near Head Harbor last Friday. James Calder, of Campbellello, was drowned; but the others succeeded in clinging to the boat until rescued.

Fredericton News.

The Literary and Debating Society of the University, are to have a *Concertation* in the college library on Thursday evening, for which a large number of invitations have been issued. It will no doubt be a successful and very enjoyable entertainment.

Prof. Bailey delivers the next lecture of the Citizens course this evening 12th. Subject—"A drop of water," with illustrations. The "cup" medal of the Fredericton Curling Club was competed for on Friday last, and was won by Mr. A. F. Street, with a fine score of 13 points, followed closely by several others.

A delegation from the Reform Club visited Grand Falls last week for the purpose of organizing a Club at that place, in which they were highly successful, over 300 persons singing the pledge.

Our street snow-plough has been made good use of lately, and its benefits are fully appreciated.

LOCAL MATTER.

The DOMINION MONTHLY for February, is a capital number and filled with interesting articles.

The Canadian School Journal No 7, is received, and contains several papers which are instructive for Teachers. It has a portrait of Rev. S. S. Nelles, D. D., L. L. D. President of Victoria University.

We have received a copy of the "Consolidated Statutes," which is neatly printed and substantially bound at the Royal Gazette Office, Fredericton.

Relief still continues to pour in to St. John, from various quarters.

We regret to notice the death of Henry Livingston, Esq. father of the Editor of the Moncton Times. Mr. Livingston filled several offices, among them Collector of Customs at Richibucto.

The Daily News has a very full report of the Lecture, delivered by Mr. George Steward, Jr., at the Institute St. John, on "Emersons, the Thinker," on Monday night last.

The state of trade in Britain is becoming more depressed, and as a consequence the public distress is widening. In several cases fresh notices are given for a reduction of both time and wages, and in others the mills are stopped altogether. The demand for relief is unprecedented in the country, and it is becoming a very serious question

whether the Government will not have to adopt some remedial measures. Why such a long continued and unexampled depression prevails is another important subject which must, ere long, undergo discussion.

New Bridge at Calais.

At the meeting of the City Council, Monday evening, the sum of \$300 was voted for the purpose of meeting preliminary legislative expenses necessary to proceed charter for a bridge across the St. Croix to Calais. Hon. F. A. Pike was elected to represent the interests of the city at Ottawa when the question of granting a charter comes up. The gentlemen in St. Stephen who formerly pledged themselves to use their best efforts to procure a charter will send Mr. Oshorn, at their expense. Mr. Pike will pay his own expenses. Owing to congestion of opposing interests, those best qualified to judge state that there will now be no difficulty in procuring a charter at the approaching session of Parliament. Calais Times.

BUTTERMAKING IN BRAZIL. There are four native modes of making butter in the empire of Brazil. The first by putting the milk in a common bowl and beating it with a spoon, as you would an egg. The second by pouring the milk into a bottle, and shaking it till the butter appears, when it is removed by breaking off the top of the bottle. The third, where the dairy is more extensive, is performed by filling a hide with the milk, which is tightly shaken by an athletic native at each end until butter is produced. The fourth, which is considered of the preceding methods, consist in dragging the hide or leather vessel, filled with milk, on the ground after a galloping horse until it is supposed the butter is formed. The milk is never strained and the butter never washed.

Finally, as time went on, her heart already gone, his confidence followed, and he revealed his history, but said nothing about his love; he was too honorable. But the love of Carl was not unreturned, though the fair-haired heroine worked away until she had proved the truth of his story, and after that many a dangerous conversation was carried on "coachee" and the young lady in silk and seal-skin, who occupied the carriage. But recently came a letter from Germany. Exit a spinster aunt and enter Baron Carl Von Daren into a fortune of 300,000 thalers. And the end is to be a pretty quiet wedding and a tour to the old country, to live, as the fairy stories say, "happy ever afterward."

Anecdotes of an Artist.

A writer in the *Baltimore Bulletin* says: "The Swiss house of Courbet, the late deceased painter, was a cottage in such a tumble-down condition that it was hardly considered safe. Here he lived entirely alone, and his housekeeping was primitive enough. When his bed was made he made it himself just before getting into it. A friend relates that his bedroom was festooned with cobwebs and that one day he attempted to take some down with his umbrella, when Courbet, greatly excited, seizing his arm, exclaimed: "Mon cher ami, what are you doing? They catch the flies!"

It seems to me that the two words which best describe him are *naïveté* and *bonhomie*."

I was told by an old friend of his that he has never got over the sorrow caused him by the death of his wife and only son at the age of about twenty. He made many students about the cautious home his big wet canvases on his back, looking like a late sandwich man. He painted very rapidly, never using a brush, but laying on his colors thickly with a palette knife. When he told me this I suppose I looked surprised, for he very kindly volunteered to show me how he did it. It was wonderful to see what delicate effects a few touches he made in this way produced.

Beggary by Wholesale.

There is in New York a woman who, as she phrases it herself, "engineers beggars." This remarkable female hires a number of children, sometimes an additional number of men and women, selecting with an artist's eye all the most wretched specimens of humanity she can procure—the halt, the maimed, the lame and the blind; the dirty, the ragged, the sick and the sore. These wretches she stations singly or in squads, or distributes them around the hotels, churches, places of amusement and the like, and then takes her percentage or the greater part of the money they contribute to extract from the sympathies of the charitable. Of late years this woman's sphere of usefulness has been materially circumscribed by the police. Still she makes money even now, and in old times she was really "getting rich." Every night when there was a ball at the Academy of Music, or Irving Hall, or an opera, she would station her "wretched squad" along Fourteenth street and Irving place, and hiding herself in some convenient place, would grin as her purposeless hatless and shoeless beggars received whinnying the alms of the light-hearted, home-returning revelers. But, alas! for this clever "engineer of beggars." The flush times of masked balls are over, and she can but mumble and grumble as she thinks of the days, or rather the nights, of yore.—*New York Herald.*

An Arctic Scene.

The following is an extract from the diary of the professor of zoology who accompanied the Swedish polar expedition of 1876: The month of July opened with the fairest of weather, which we used advantageously in sailing north, passing the port of Karmakula, where we dredged for a short time, and made explorations, which have only a scientific interest. The 2d of July the Proven anchored about four o'clock in the morning, and a short distance from us we observed four magnificent reindeer browsing quietly on the shore. Accompanied by four of our brave men, I threw myself into a canoe and pulled for the shore. A heavy mist concealed our approach from the enemy, but, as at the beat of a drum, it suddenly disappeared, revealing one of the strangest spectacles that I had ever witnessed. Very near the Proven, where we had just left, and on both sides of it, two shining mountains rising abruptly from the sea were seen, the even projections of which were literally covered and hidden by myriads of birds. From their plumage, black as ebony on the back and white below; from their width from wing to wing when flying, and from their vertical position when in repose, we recognized the guillemot. They clung to the sides of these mountains, grave, impassive, pressed one against the other, each covering her egg. Countless numbers were whirling in lines across the sky, and seen from our little boat, they looked like immense pearls floating in space and gleaming in the rays of the sun, which they intercepted from us. I estimated that there must have been millions of birds congregated there, so sandwiched together that a hand could scarcely be inserted between them. Other guillemots were being rocked upon the cradle of the deep, rising and falling in unison with each dash of the billows, and occasionally dipping their beaks under water in search of food, while still others, inflamed with anger, were fighting with the greatest hostility, ordinarily terminated by the intervention of a peaceful neighbor, who would boldly force the belligerents to conclude a peace. The winged tribe united in forming a strange medley of sounds; we could almost believe that we heard the frantic barking of a pack of hounds or the deep mutterings of thunder reverberating from the mountains. Further on before us was a shoal of white dolphins, to the number of many hundreds, agitated by the waters with the violence of a tempest. We passed quietly among them, when they defied away without any appearance of fear. I sent a ball among them without effect, these mammals being, as is well known, invulnerable only on one place—the eye, which is remarkably small in proportion to the size of their bodies. The professor and a companion afterward succeeded in shooting two of the four reindeer.

The Overcrowded Cities.

An exchange says: A member of Congress lately asserted that there were four hundred thousand unemployed people in and about the city of New York, compelled to live by begging or plundering. The assertion was a gross exaggeration of a lamentable fact. Probably there is not one-fourth of that number. Nevertheless, it is true that not only New York, but all cities are overcrowded. The tendency is to crowd them still more. Thousands of young men in the country are looking forward to the time when they can go to some large city, and there find employment. They do not know that the chances for success in life are far greater in the country than in the city. One out of a hundred in a city may be able to lay up a little money, and one out of two thousand may live in comparatively comfortable circumstances; the rest, even if they get and keep constant employment, are drudges, who work hard, get poor pay, besides being condemned to unwholesome diet, and to breathe foul air. In the country very few men have an excuse for being wretchedly poor.

The nation would be richer, happier, better, if the excess of population in the cities would remove to fertile farms, and engage in tilling the soil. It is an occupation quite as honorable as selling dry goods, and far more profitable than the drudgery of confinement in city life that wears out the body before old age comes, and no adequate wages to sustain life in return.

A Music-Loving Spider.

This is from the Georgetown (Cal.) *Miner*: At the Catholic church, on a Sunday morning, before the service, an unassuming little spider can be seen curled up in his gauzy bow—probably wrapped up in his morning prayer. Let the lady organist but touch the keys, and with eager feet he will creep a couple of feet down the wall, and there his artistic soul will revel in the musical sounds produced by choir and instruments. When the service is over, the dying echoes lingering in his predatory ear, he retires, it is hoped, with regenerate heart. The fact that the lady organist had a faithful and cherished auditor of this kind three consecutive years, who would crawl on to the piano, shows that this is no isolated case. And whatever may be the opinion of the unfeeling world, to the choir of the church he is endeared by months of association and musical appreciation.

Receiving no answer he, after waiting a few minutes longer, started home on foot, leaving his fare in the box.
