Prof. Theodore H. Rand, D. C. L., of Acadia College, Wolfville, formerly Chief Superintendent of Education for New Brunswick, has been appointed to a chair in the Baptist College, Toronto.

The Panama canal is not half built; yet the estimated total cost has been largely exceeded in the carrying on of the work so far completed. The canal will cost between five and six hundred million dollars.

U. S. Consul Murray has had eight applications for the position of U. S. Vice-Consul at Moncton, but he has declined the responsibility of making the appointment, and has forwarded the applications to head quarters at Washington.

At a convention of the Liberal party held at St. John on Friday, Mr. George McLeod was unanimously chosen as the candidate of the party for the seat in the Commons left vacant by the death of Hon. J. Burpee. Mr. McLeod, who is Sir Leonard Tilley's opponent in 1885, has accepted the nomination.

The Hon. John Costigan, Minister of Inland Revenue, was entertained at a dinner last Thursday in Ottawa by his friends and admirers of all creeds and nationalities, at the close of which the deeds of his house and lot on Cooper street in that city were presented to him. Mr. Costigan replied in suitable terms.

The Canadian Gazette understands that the War office have agreed to grant a pension of £50 a year to the widow of the late Colonel Kennedy, who recently died in London on his way home from Egypt, where he contracted small-pox. An allowance of £12 per annum has also been granted to each of deceased officers' children.

The white races now number four hundred and twenty millions, or one-third of the entire population of the world. Two hundred years ago they formed about one-tenth of the population then existing. White men now occupy the whole of Europe, except the corner on which Constantinople stands; they possess and dominate over nearly all of South America; they have taken possession of Australia and New Zealand and most of the larger islands of the Pacific; they have lately acquired a large portion of Africa; they claim the whole of Northern Asia, and they dominate India, Indo-China and the delta of the Nile.

In the death of Dr. E. A. Vail, M. L. C., which occurred at Sussex last Friday, Kings County has lost a prominent and highly respected citizen. The deceased first entered political life in 1857, when he was elected to the Assembly, and with the exception of a short term, when he was defeated on the Confederation question, he continued to occupy a seat in the Legislature up to the time of his death. He was twice elected speaker of the Assembly, was taken into the cabinet when the present Government was formed, and received a seat in the Legislative Council last winter. Dr. Vail's many excellent qualities will cause his loss to be deeply regretted. His funeral on Sunday afternoon was the largest ever seen in Kings County.

Rev. St. T. Rand, Missionary of Hantsport, N. S., contributes to the Kentville Chronicle a graphic account of the hanging of a colored man named Laban Powell, for the murder of William Holby. The execution took place at Kentville six years ago last month, and was witnessed by about four thousand people, including Mr. Rand, who was then a lad of sixteen. The venerable missionary gives a vivid description of the incidents of the execution, including the terrible thunder storm which raged at the time, but he is in error in stating that there has never been but one case of public execution in Kings County, for it is an historical fact that a man named Manning was hanged at Horton many years before Powell was executed for killing a man named Keegan, with whom he had quarrelled concerning the hire of a cow.

PROTECTION TO THE MARINER.

We have to congratulate the neighboring county of Albert on having possessed representatives in Parliament who have admirably discharged their duties in respect to securing the most ample and complete protection shipping, in the way of buoys, beacons, and fog whistles. The mariner is warned from every reef and shoal by buoys, while no less than three lights and three fog whistles, at night or in foggy weather, aid to the security of navigation. At one point near Grindstone Island, no less than six buoys are in sight, so completely has this work been done, and it is almost impossible for the coaster to get beyond the ken of one steam whistle or lighthouse, before he is within that of another.

How is it with Westernland with that arm of the sea known as Cumberland Basin, that absorbs the major part of the shipping coming to the head of the Bay. Unfortunately we have a different tale to tell. Cobblers children go worse shod, 'tis said; we have been represented by a Minister of Marine; our representative may be Minister himself; hence, we must need go unprovided with those means of security to our shipping, that small and less influential counties deem of the first importance. If casualties at the head of this bay are remarkably few, it is rather to be attributed to the experience and watchfulness of our local navigators than to the absence of danger or any efforts on the part of the department to reduce these dangers to a minimum. No matter how deep or broad a strait may be, the presence of sudden reefs or of shoals involve risks and dangers, that invest the navigation of Cumberland Basin with risk, especially to foreigners and those to whom our shores are strange.

The entrance to Sackville river at Annapolis is marked by a sand bank that has become a favorite grounding place for vessels. Barnes Reef, off Wood Point, extends quite a distance into the bay. Boss Point Reef, off the South Joggins Shore, makes a side in the danger path of the vessels bound up, while on the opposite side is a shoal off the Joggins Cape, equally in the way. Around the Cape are the Grand Ance Ledges, these are the most dangerous ledges in the Bay of Fundy. They extend out three quarters of a mile, or more than one third the width of the bay. These impediments extend over a coast line of over 30 miles in length. How many buoys and lighthouses do our readers suppose have been placed in this Bay to guide and warn ships, masters of whose shipwreck would engulf them? We have made enquiries and from the best information we learn that neither light nor whistle exists and only one buoy has been provided for this whole coast!

Purple we have ascertained that even that one buoy has not been anchored in its place, but is lying on Dorchester wharf, where no doubt it affords excellent security to navigation. Wm. Lloyd Garrison.

Century for August contains a biography and portrait of the great abolitionist, who on the 21st Aug., 1835, was dragged through the streets of Boston with a rope around his neck, and was saved only by his mitering himself to jail. His family lived for three generations on the St. John River, his grandfather, Joseph Garrison, was an Englishman and the first name on the Mather-ville Grant of 1767. His mother was a grand-daughter of one John Lawrence, a sergeant under Wolfe at Quebec, and in the ship coming over to Nova Scotia, 1771, his daughter became attached to a ship's apprentice, Andrew Lloyd—and they were married on arrival. Andrew Lloyd became a commissioned pilot at Quoddy. She was the first white woman buried at Deer Island. His father Abijah, born in 1773, was a shipmaster and voyaged to the West Indies.

By some chance of coast navigation, Abijah found himself on Deer Island, N. B., in Passamaquoddy Bay waters (called Quoddy, for short), at a religious evening meeting. Here his eyes fell upon a strikingly beautiful young woman dressed in a blue habit. At the close of the services he followed her to the door and boldly asked leave to accompany her home, according her for want of her real name, "Miss Bluebeetle." His reply was a refusal. Nevertheless, Abijah had no time in sending her a letter, which it is safe to say, surpassed in literary graces any she had ever received; and her reply confirmed a correspondence which ended infidelity in matrimony.

Joseph's father-in-law was Daniel Palmer, of Rowley, Mass., born 1712. He is yet remembered by close tradition as "a powerful man, of great muscular strength. Before he left for the east the Indians were troublesome, and there were three or four in a house in Old Town, and no one dared pursue them. But he was fearless, and entered the house, where he opened a chamber window, and one by one he threw them out, regardless of life or limb, as though they were so many straws." Six children survived to him, and the two oldest girls were married, when removal to the St. John was determined. Leaving these behind, he took with him his third daughter, Mary, and his three sons, and joined the company of townsfolk and kindred men who were to plant a Puritan settlement on the banks of the St. John.

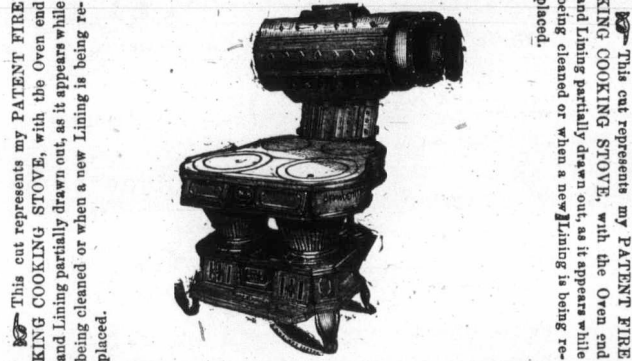

Mr. Knapp replied insisting his view of the matter was right and the court was wrong, when the court stated that Mr. Knapp's impudence would not be tolerated, and he would either have to accept the decision without a word or leave the case. Mr. Knapp therefore took of his gown and left the court house. Mr. Chas. Ward, the defendant, was equal to the emergency. Although he has hitherto only practiced as a barrister in a justice's court, he stepped forward to counsel's place and took up the thread of the cross-examination. When the lawyers smilingly returned to their seats, Mr. Ward in charge of the case followed the cross-examination with considerable vigor, the Attorney General concurring.

SHAD FISHING OFF MINORDE MARSH.—A correspondent writes us that fishing has been very successful this season in this district. Minute Point is the extremity of "King" Seaman's marsh and is 2 1/2 miles from the upland. Reaching the dykes enclosing this vast body of marsh one sees at low water a vast tract stretching out towards Wood Point, N. B., a distance of about three miles. This flat has no boundaries; its firmly packed, coarse sand affords good footing and Mininde fishermen drive their stakes in and set their nets two miles out. The fishermen instead of going home at night and between tides, live on the dyke the whole fishing season. Your correspondent while there last week counted a small village of some 13 habitations. The residences—like those of the ancient Swiss Lake dwellers—were erected on posts driven in the ground, and are elevated some feet in the air. Here the fishermen reside after their day's work and enjoy their *otium* *in dip*. They regale themselves with the royal dainties of fish and their season of enjoyment is only broken when a stray newspaper correspondent or constable visits the scene. They complain very strongly that the "low dust" coming down from River Hebert settles on the flats and collecting there year after year operates very prejudicially to the catch—the fish are surely disappearing from this cause. The leading fisherman is Mr. W. Downey, who is a large speculator in fish.
