### Things and Thoughts in New York.

With your permission, Mr. Editor, I will give you some items that may be interesting to the readers of the Herald, and some thoughts as they occur to my mind.

In the first place I would like to say a few words about Carleton Place. I think that you folks over there less considerably by the name of your town. You will find Carleton Place occurring very seldom on maps, unless it may be a local one, while Franktown with probably half the inhabitants, and certainly with less advantages, is often mentioned. I think that those parties who got up the maps do not realize what an important position your little town occupies, from the name it bears.

**THE BARNORFEST.**

This is a delegation of German singers who arrived here last Monday, from many cities and towns in the North. The delegation from Philadelphia numbered about eight hundred, and from other places in large force. On Tuesday evening there was an immense gathering at the Academy of Music, for the purpose of seeing the concert for several valuable prizes. One of the prizes was a grand piano, and long by four wide, and made of silk fringed with heavy gold bullion, embroidered in gold with figures emblematic of music and poetry. It is valued at \$600. A silver goblet is the next prize, and is valued at \$350. Wednesday was the greatest day of the whole. In the morning they were in the city, and then took steamers at the foot of eighth street for Jones' Woods where they had a grand picnic. Some idea of the arrangements will be conveyed by the supply of eatables and drinkables furnished; 4,000 quart bottles of wine, 500 barrels and 2,000 kegs of lager beer, 600 barrels of flour, 1,000 chickens and 1,000 large turkeys, 2 bullocks, a dozen calves, 1,000 pounds of butter and 1,000 pounds of cheese, 5,000 loaves of bread, 1,000 pines, 1,000 quarts of ice cream, 50 barrels of potatoes, 50 barrels of cabbage and cauliflowers, with all sorts of other vegetables, and confectionery.

**MUSEUM'S MUSEUM.**

Mr. Barum notices that they have instructed their captains to collect every curious and useful article, at their expense, and bring them home for the Museum.

The great showman was absent from the city at the time of the fire. He was in Connecticut attending to the session of the Legislature. When the news of the fire was telegraphed to him he took it coolly and said he would immediately build an iron building on the site of the former. Mr. Barum has been over a quarter of a century catering to the tastes of the public, and his energy and perseverance are duly appreciated.

**HONOR TO THE BRAVE.**

On Monday last the 79th Regiment (Highlanders) returned to this city, after an absence of about four years. They participated in a great many battles, and took with them some 3,000 men. They now return with about 400 men, who have seen hard service. They had a grand parade and reception on Tuesday, by the Mayor. At twelve o'clock they partook of a dinner at Centre Market, and in the evening proceeded to Hart's Island to be mustered out of service.

The Caravan Legion arrived in this city on Tuesday, about one o'clock, amidst the greatest rejoicing by their friends. Out of over 5,000 men furnished at the beginning of the war, only 400 returned. As the men descended from the cars, the band which was in attendance struck up "The Sweet Home," which fell very pleasantly on the ears of those who never expected to see home again.

And now came the most interesting part of the occasion. Friend shaking hand with friend, in the warmest manner, wife being taken in the arms of her husband, and little ones running about the feet of their returned fathers. The scene was truly affecting. Here a friend recognized a soldier and immediately raised a short welcome. "Yonder a clear silver voice is heard crying out, 'Kate, here's Richard!' Quick as lightning a beautiful young girl, who had hitherto every countenance with a critical eye, rushed forward and was clasped in the arms of her own Richard. 'My darling, my own darling,' came up in deep tones from the heart of the soldier, 'still true to your own Dick?' 'Yes, and why not?' was the reply, you know to our country? 'Yes, young man, with a child in his arms, whom he was fondly kissing, was accented by a friend who said, 'Well Billy, you reason, how are you? Oh, murder, Pat, you infernal villain, are you alive? Here, Mary, take the child till I speak to my friend. (She took the baby.) 'Pat, you devil, take that, you rascal.' And in his joy he put 'well,' as he called it, that made his carrying again; but instead of being offended, he nearly wrung the hand off his rough friend, in return.

On Friday a formal reception was given to the Legion. They were escorted by several regiments of soldiers, and about 10,000 of the Fenian Brotherhood. This body were handsome green rosettes, with the letters 'F. B.' in the centre. On Saturday the regiment will be mustered out of service.

Now that the war is over everything is being put on a peace footing. A great many vessels have been sold here, to be converted into merchant vessels again. Provisions have come down considerably since the war ceased, but they are still very high, and great reluctance is evinced by the interested parties in bringing them down.

Just now there is a great deal of agitation about the electric franchise. The question is, Has the right to light? It is contested by the friends of the gas, that as a matter of policy, as well as a matter of justice, he has. Others contend that he is not capable of voting. If he has the right accorded to him it will act as a check to any further extension and will throw considerable influence in favor of the North. The subject is being pretty thoroughly ventilated by both parties.

On Thursday last the District Attorney received information of a somewhat reliable character, that a vessel was being fitted out at the Atlantic dock, Brooklyn, for the purpose of engaging in the slave trade. She was immediately seized and is now in the possession of the authorities.

### Admaston Council.

Admaston, 12th June, 1868.

The municipal council of the Township of Admaston met in the Town Hall, this 12th day of June, 1868, at a call from the Mayor, for the purpose of receiving the report of the Road Surveyor relative to the warning of parties having fences encroaching on the Opeongo line of road, and for the transaction of general business.

Present, a full meeting of council, the Mayor in the chair.

Mr. Walker, Road Surveyor, having reported that he had notified the Pathmaster on the Opeongo line of road to warn parties having encroachments on said line of road, to have them removed therefrom, to the distance of 21 feet from the travelled line of the township, it was

Moved by Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Gorman, That the said Road Surveyor be now further instructed to inspect further the said line of road, and report to Mr. Harris, Government road overseer, the names of all parties, together with the description of their several lots they own or occupy, having their fences within 21 feet of the travelled line of the Opeongo Road, within this Township, with the view of having the same put down or removed forthwith, and that he report on the same immediately.—Carried.

Upon the examination of the minutes of the month of May session of 1864, it was found that a resolution was passed at that meeting granting John Campbell and Daniel Campbell their statute labour to drain the water off the 5th concession line of road, it was

Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Gorman, That the resolution of the council of the 4th May last, granting to John Campbell an order for the sum of \$24 be rescinded inasmuch as he received credit in that amount for nine days labour that was not performed, and that the clerk be instructed to deduct the sum of nine dollars from said amount and that he grant an order in favor of John Campbell for the sum of \$15 as full compensation for the labour performed, said order to be payable out of the Land Improvement Fund.—Carried.

Mr. Brown moved, seconded Mr. Gorman, That James Danne and John Stewart, Inspectors of Licenses for the years 1862 and 1863 be instructed to proceed against all parties whose notes for Licenses are in their hands, and that Samuel F. Brown and John Brown, be instructed not to proceed against parties, who have notes in their hands, until further instructions.—Carried.

Mr. Brown moved, seconded by Mr. Gorman, That the clerk notify Patrick Gorman that unless he comply with the law in respect to Tavern Licenses he will be proceeded against by the Inspector of Licenses for the infraction of the same.—Carried.

Mr. Carmady having applied for time to remove his fence off the line allowance between the 8th and 9th concessions, complaining of an error at previous meeting of council, Mr. Gorman moved, seconded by Mr. Whelan, That Mr. Carmady get till the month of November to open said concession line in consideration of his allowing Mr. Conway liberty to have free access through his place.—Carried.

Mr. Harris placed his resignation of the office of Reeve on the table, which was accepted and the Reeve called to the chair, it was

Moved by Mr. Gorman, seconded by Mr. Brown, That Mr. Harris be Reeve for the remainder of this year.—Carried.

Mr. Harris having taken the declaration of office as Reeve, took the chair.

Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Harris, That James Dennihan get three years' statute labour on the concession line, between the 4th and 5th concessions, leading from his place.—Carried.

Mr. Brown moved, seconded by Mr. Brown, That this council do now adjourn and meet again in this place on the first Monday in September next.

**Dr. Pritchard.**

The following account of this notorious criminal, who is left for execution on Friday, the 28th instant, will probably be read with some interest at the present time. Edward William Pritchard is the son of Mr. John White Pritchard, a captain in the Royal Navy, and was born in 1825 at Setaux, Hants. After going through the usual preliminary education, he was apprenticed in September, 1840, to Messrs. Edwards, James and Charles Henry, of Portsmouth, of considerable practice in Portsmouth. During his apprenticeship he is stated to have assiduously studied the elementary branches of his profession and conducted himself with great propriety. On the completion of his apprenticeship he came to London on an entree upon his home at King's College in October, 1843; these also he prosecuted with great zeal, and his friends being desirous that he should enter the naval service of his country, he memorialized the authorities at the College of Surgeons to be allowed to offer himself for examination at an earlier period than was at that time allowed; his application was granted, he appeared before the Court of Examiners on the 29th of May, 1846, and, after the usual examination, was admitted a member of the College. He then underwent an examination before the Navy Board, and was duly gazetted an assistant-surgeon in Her Majesty's Navy, and on the 1st of June, 1846, he sailed for India, on board the ship "Hector," in that commandant branch of that service. Those who know what the position of the medical officer in the Royal Navy was at that time, and which is not much improved at the present time, will not be surprised that a highly educated and accomplished surgeon should endeavor to accommodate himself from such a thralldom. He, therefore, embraced the first opportunity, and resigned all connection with the Royal Navy, and determined on seeking private practice. Finding it was necessary to possess a double qualification, he presented himself before the Society of Apothecaries, and having passed the examination, was admitted a licentiate of the hall. He had previously obtained (it is believed by purchase) the "M.D." of Erlangen. He then proceeded to Glasgow, where he practiced for a great success, until his apprehension for a crime, secondly in atrocity to that of the atrocious William Palmer. While waiting for practice he sought amusement and profit in the use of his pen, and became a laborious contributor to the advancement of general and medical science; many of his papers are distributed through the pages of the Medical Times and Gazette and the Lancet, the transactions of the Philosophical Society, and the King's College Medical Society. He was the author of a "Visit to Pitcairn Island," "Observations on Fily as a Watering Place," "The Guide to Fily and its Antiquities," "On the Drift of the Poor of Ohio," &c. Dr. Pritchard was a fellow and member of nearly 20 learned societies and institutions in the United Kingdom, and medical officer to several of the assurance offices. In personal appearance the convict is a tall, slightly built man, about five feet ten inches or eleven inches in height, with sharp pointed features, aquiline nose, and does not appear older than the age stated—viz., 41 years.

### The Confession of Dr. Pritchard.

The confession of Dr. Pritchard reveals the dark effects of a departure from rectitude.
