All trousers suffer in this way sooner or later, no matter how carefully they are hitched up when sitting down, or how frequently they are put in the press; the fact remains that they will and do bag. 



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COLLEGE ATHLETICS

Why Agricultural Co lege Students Need Physical Culture.

Together - Students Help to Direct In Sports-Building Up the Body for Later Usefulness.

(Contributed by Ontarto Department of THLETICS at our College are being revolutionized and placed on a more stable basis than in the past.

Progressive colleges are coming to realize the supreme importance of bringing physical training to the educational work. College authorities are realizing that they are responsible for the ignorance among the alumni of the colleges, regarding the care of the body, as it is a well known fact that eighty per cent of graduates die from ten to thirty years before the age at which they should. They are also realizing that under the old method less than fifty per cent. of the students are engaged in any form of systematic or organized exercise. This is due to the organized exercise. This is due to the fact that our colleges were, and some are as yet, fostering two classes—one class attends for social and athletic advantages, and the other attends largel for intellectual opportunities. The first class is inclined to neglect mental work and carry athletics to excess, while the second class is inclined to neglect physical training and carry mental efforts to excess. Neither class lives strictly hygienic lives.

Now our colleges are adopting new

Now our colleges are acopting new methods to eliminate such conditions and are awakening to the fact that physical education has a legitimate place in the college curriculum, Some of these methods are as follows: (1) Intra-collegiate sport and recreation in addition to our intercollegiate sports, with the constant purpose in view of usefulness in after life. This draws in the spectators on the side lines and promotes interest by friendly rivalry. (2) Organization of activities on the basis of athletic sports, rather than on gymnatic basis, giving games to the student if normal physically; if not, remedial gymnatics until fit. It is necessary to have a wide range of sports, games, and physical activities, and a plan to encourage more general parplan to encourage more general par-ticipation in them. (3) Exercise taken systematically and at regular in-

The chief advantages of she tractor as a power machine would appear to be listed in order of importance as follows; Speed, belt work, work done at the proper time (especially ploughing), labor saving, hot weather worker, economy, improved work. The quickness with which work can be accomplished with the aid of a tractor has possibly been given the premier place of importance on the above list, due to the necessity of speeding up production during the past five years. This condition is likely to obtain for some years to come until the returning sanity of the nations of the world results in a re-

likely to obtain for some years to come until the returning sanity of the nations of the world results in a returning to the principle of seeking happiness from producing and living rather than gaining and existing.

The saving of hauling costs and the "convenience" of the tractor as a source of power for grinding and silo filling seems to have appealed strongly to a large number.


