When he was young, he said, he thought that he was used with severity, but since then had come to understand that it was merely good judgment that his parents exercised.

Committee of U. S. Veterans' Organization Unanimous in ander Anderson-Participation of New York Soldier in Recent "Horror On Rhine" Meeting Pronounced As Detrimental to Relations Between Allied Nations and United States.

New York, March 23 .- Alexander E. Anderson, formerly lieutenantcolonel of the 165th Infantry, was notified today by the New York county legislative committee of the American Legion that he had been expelled from the United States Veterans' Association because of his utterances at the recent "orror on the Rhine" meeting here. This meeting was called as a protest against the alleged use by the French of negro troops in the occupied zone of Germany, and later was condemned by legionaires as "propaganda to destroy the cordial relations existing between the United States and her war allies." Committee Unanimous.

An immense meeting was held at Madison Square Garden last Friday night under the auspices of the legion to protest against the previous pro-German meeting. General Pershing in a strong speech scored khose who were attempting to spread propaganda in the United States for the purpose of creating ill-will against Great Britain and France. The legion committee voted unani mously for the expulsion of the former officer last midnight after a trial that had lasted more than six hours. His participation in the meeting was declared to be prejudicial to the best interests of the legion. Anderson did not attend the trial, but had sent a letter claiming the committee lacked jurisdiction, in that the 69th Regiment Post, of which he was the former commander, ceased to exist last December.

Reply to Recent Ultimatum of Reparations Commission Is Received by Allied Representatives—Germans Request That Joint Commission of Experts Be Named To Fix Value of German Deliveries to Date-Claim Is Made That It Would Be Impossible in Any Event To Pay Twelve Billion Gold Marks by First of May.

Paris, March 23 .- Germany, in reply to the recent ultimatum of the Allied reparations commission refuses to pay the one billion marks gold due on this date, and disputes the commission's figure showing a balance of 12,000,000,000 marks due May 1.

It is maintained in the German note that the twenty billio marks which the peace treaty provided should be handed over by May 1 has been more than paid. The note asks that a join commission of experts fix the value of the German deliveries of reparation account, but it declares that in any event it would t impossible for Germany to pay twelve billion marks by May 1.





Dominions Have Great Part To Play, Says Hon. N. W. Rowell.

TELLS LEAGUE PURPOSES

Large Audience in Masonic Temple Hears Geneva Conference Report.

"Canada and the League of Nations" vas the theme of an eloquent address delivered last night by Hon. Newton W. Rowell to a splendid attendance of the men's and women's Canadian Clubs of London, in the Masonic Temple.

The speaker was introduced by Rob-ert Greene, president of the men's Canadian Club, who occupied the chair. In doing so Mr. Greene said: "We have not only one of the great est men in our country to speak to us, but one of the men who has done the greatest things for our country, and who has participated in one of the

greatest conferences ever held in the world."

Mr. Greene also reminded the audience that the speaker of the evening was a London boy, one of whom they

were all proud. Mr. Rowell at the outset said:
"Your president has referred to the fact that I am a London boy, and in this connection I am reminded of an incident of my early political career by seeing in this audience my old friend, T. H. Purdom

A policy laid down by a world-wide organization must be world-wide in its application. The league is not a super-state, and The league is not a super-state, and one of its dangers is that it might

"The people of the new world are
determined to manage their own internal affairs, and not to permit them to te managed by those outside. "Nothing," continued Mr. Rowell,

"created greater surprise among the foreign representatives of the league than the independent stand made by the representatives of the British do-minions. Those nations had not learn-ed that if the British Empire had been built on the same foundation as other empires of the past it would have gone the same way. It is founded, however on the principle that every country within its bounds does it own thinking.

Small European Dependents. "The smaller states of Europe are so dependent on the great powers that they do not enjoy the freedom and in-dependence of the British dominions. "We have been accustomed to discuss our affairs on a basis of perfect equality with the statesmen of Great Brit-ain," continued the speaker, "and there

is no reason why we should not discuss them in the same way with other powers; but for Canada and the other dominions there is in the future a more real independence, a greater incluence in the world's affairs by their remaining for all time a part of the British Empire than as nations standing outside. With the experience and knowledge that we have gained we are aware that in a world reeling from the shock of an awful war the greatest power for peace, for freedom, for order and for stability today is the British Em-

Mr. Rowell's brilliant and statesmanlike speech held the close attention of his hearers throughout, and at its close he was, on the motion of the chairman, orded their enthusiastic thanks by a standing vote, the chairman remarking that they were all proud of Canada's representative at Geneva.

After spending all the winter in vain search, the writer had a visit from two on March 1, a springlike day, when the first premptings from within stirred the body to look at the garden, and perhaps do a little cleaning up. No sooner was the garden reached than a strange call came from a bird overheard, and two crossbills were seen flying southeast, and their height suggested that perhaps they had been in the large blue spruce in the garden. It was impossible to say whether they were red or white wing crossbills; so they are not entered in the roster of the club, but they still form the only record of northern birds for the winter.



Draw one continuous chain of circles across the face of the chart, observing the following rules: Begin at any number you wish in the first column on the left, drawing one section either up or down in that column. Then proceed to the right, then up or down, then to the right or left, then up or down, then to the right or left, then up or down, and so on until you reach the last column on the right, where your chain must end with a section running either up or down in that column. The only difference between drawing the chain of circles in this puzzle and the first is that you are permitted to revert to the left as well as to the right and up or down.

Each section of the chain must consist of either three, four or five circles. By section is meant three, four or five circles in a straight line.

The problem consists of drawing your chain so as to obtain the greatest difference you can between the sum totals of the odd and even numbers within the circles. Those submitting the greatest differences, irrespective of what the greatest possible difference is, will be awarded the prizes in accordance with their respective differences. 

Wherever a section of the chain is drawn to the left, or in any case where two sections, or parts of sections, run parallel, there must be at least one row of figures between them, so as to preserve clearly the course of the chain. By parallel is meant where two sections run alongside of each other. Note that between the first and third sections in the illustration there is one row of figures. It is permissible for two corner circles, to touch obliquely, as the circle around 73, the corner circle of sections 6 and 7, and the circle around 33, the corner circle of sections 16 and 17 in the illustration. In determining the number of circles in each section, count the last circle in one section as the first in the next, but in totaling the figures encircled the numbers in the corner circles are to be counted but once.

Contestants must inclose with their charts a list of the numbers encircled, showing the even numbers in one column and the odd numbers in another. This memorandum will expedite checking up the totals.

Any error in stating the sum totals of the numbers or the difference obtained will disqualify the chart. Peking, March 23.—Funds allotted in the past to the Southern Chinese Government, but withheld since the collarse of that regime, were released by the consent of legations interested for the use of the Peking Government today.

These funds were a portion of the national revenue and surplus and have been in the hands of the financial commissioner. The legation stipulated that the money must be used for several specific purposes—the reorganization of domestic issues, payment of Chinese lomestic issues, payment of Chinese prevention and conservation work of the Canton and Pearl Rivers. The amount of money released was some amount of money released was some 13 per cent of the surplus or 2,400,000 taels in gold.

"As we approached the nearby vil-lages we found only women and children, and some white-haired men. The women, with young babies on their backs, were walking up and down wall-

buildings, among which were old men tearing their hair and crying, while mothers and daughters were recovering bodies or unburned treasures from the burning ruins. So many women were crying, and I was so angry at what I had seen that I could not hold my camera steady enough to take a time

"We have names and accurate reports of 32 villages where murder and fire have been used. One village has had as many as 145 inhabitants killed. Houses have been burned with women and children in them. At Sonuntung fourteen were stood up in front of a large grave, then shot and their bodies destroyed with burning wood and oil. This is typical."




