DEATH OF SIR A. T. GALT.

A veteran Canadian statesman is dead Sir Alexander Tulloch Galt, who has been ailing tor a considerable time of cancer in the tongue, and had been in an enfeebled condition. died yesterday at his residence in Montreal. Deceased was a son of John Galt, the author and Canadia pioneer, and was born at Chelsea, England, Sept. 6, 1817. His father brought him to Canada while he was a mere lad. A Few of the Things that Have Troubled People There-Drownings and Dysentery. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19.—Advices from apan say that a flood in the River Isuho

San Francisco, Sept. 19.—Advices from Japan say that a flood in the River Isuho carried away 25-houses. The result of inquiry and the report of damage done by the flood is as follows:

Embankments burst in 60 places; over 300 houses were carried away; over 1,000 persons were drowned. At Jarvatka, in Gungo-Gun, a side of a mountain fell away on Aug. 22, crushing over 50 persons to death. At Nara the To-Su-Gara burst its banks and caused the greatest flood since 1889. One hundred and fifty four persons were drowned in the Gife-Ken flood and nearly 30,000 persons are recoiving relief.

Advices from Saga state that dysentery is prevailing in that prefecture more fercely than ever, the total number of cases being 3,258, and number of deaths 477.

At Wakayama dysentery also prevails, there having been 2,468 cases and 416 deaths.
