A NAPOLEON MANIFESTO. Paris, Dec. 4.—The police have seized at the Gare du Nord large packages of the manifesto by Prince Victor Napoleon bearing the historical date of Dec. 2 and informing his adherents that the time is approching when France will have to decide between a monarchy pure and simple and that democratic appeal to the people which gave eighteen years of national prosperity.

THE DOCKERS' TROUBLE. The forts along the Hellespont, will be dismantled and the powers will assume the protection of the Hellespont and Constantinople. The paper adds that the project provides for the Sultan retiring from the rulership of Turkey.

He said there was over 45 per cent and 50 per cent tax on material that goes into their en-gines and boilers. He wanted a reconstruction, as there was but a proection of from 27 1-2 to 30 per cent on he manufactured articles, and they had to pay 40 to 45 per cent on the raw material. He thought they should not lower the duty on raw material, as it would antagonize the iron industry. He referred to the reduction in price of iron in the past ten or fifteen years, and said the specific duty of \$10 a ton translated into ad valorem duty was double now what it was then. In reply to a question, Ald Armstrong said that those who bought brass goods as part of their raw material. would buy as readily from the United States as from Canada. Mr. Stevens said the Canadian brass works men could easily supply all Canadian demands. There were too many in the business. There was a quarter of a million worth of brass goods imported. If the Canadian brass men had all that extra trade, they would be happy. It was mostly plumbers' and steamfitters' supplies that they dealt in. At present the total brass work output manufactured in Canada might be about \$200,000-so that more is imported than manufactured. THE BRUSH INDUSTRY. Mr. Thomas Bryan represented the brush interests. He said there was only one brush factory in London. Mr. Forrestal said that barrels made by convict labor came from the States, containing mess pork. A lot of second-hand ale casks were brought in empty from the West Indies. They were made in England, sent to the West Indies, and then reshipped to Canada. They were sold in Halifax for \$1 50 each, and were worth \$3 or \$4. These casks were used by brewers again. 

Warlike Utterances of a Spanish Newspaper.

Protest Against Uncle Sam's Attitude Toward Spain.

"Only the Army and Navy Will Avail to Settle the Question."

Havana, Dec. 4.—The Daily Comercio has the following editorial on the out-look for Cuban affairs and the attitude of foreign powers toward the ques-"'La force prime le droit' (force over-

powers right) said Bismarck to Europe, which was heard with astonishment and to the scandal of the German Empire. Spain, during two years, has treated the rebels and their accomplices like gentlemen. We have made sincere protests full of dignity to the United States against their jingoes calumniating Spain and calling us bloody tigers, in spite of the noble conduct of the army toward the Cu-bans. These proceedings and the

language of the press are reflections upon the Yankees."

The Commercio protests against the insulting anti-Spanish attitude of the American press and its favorable atti-tude towards the insurgents, and says: "Spain has gained no consideration through diplomacy, and must in future depend upon material force to command respect for its rights. Time has shown this, and teaches us to sharpen our nails for a fray."

The paper criticises the inconsistency and vacillating policy of the New York newspapers and of the London Times, and says: "Americans are totally in-capable of good faith and it is time the Spanish were convinced that only the army and navy will avail to settle the question. We suggest that a re-stored Spanish fleet and 300,000 men will be able to go anywhere." Jacksonville. Fla., Dec. 4.—News has





History of Middlesex to be Published by the City and County Councils.

Cordial Greetings Exchanged at a Special Meeting of the City Council.

At the conclusion of the meeting of the Board of Works last night, the committee room was crowded by members of the City and County Councils. It was a special meeting, called on such short notice that the council chamber had not been heated.

Mayor Little stated that the meeting had been called at the request of the educational committee of the County Council to lay before the aldermen the plan that committee had been considering to get out a history of the county of Middlesex. He believed it to be a very desirable object that they have in view.

Reeve Armitage, of Lucan, representing the deputation, read the report that the educational committee had presented to the County Council, which contained an estimate of the cost of publishing at \$175 for 500 copies of 100 pages, and the same for each additional 100 pages. The cost of coffecting the necessary information was estimated at from \$500 to \$1,000, according to the class of work done. The speaker urged the co-operation of the city in the matter, and stated that the revenue derived would be shared by each corporation. A rough estimate of the total cost would be about \$3,000.
