AMBASSADOR DURAND TO QUIT PUBLIC LIFE

Britain's Representative at Washington to Retire on March I.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 8.-According to a dispatch from Washington, Sir Henry Mortimer Durand, ambassador of Great Britain to the United States, will retire from his mission in Washington next spring. His successor, not yet chosen, will come to Washington to take charge of the embassy about March 1. The ambassador yesterday told Secretary Root of his coming retirement. As far as can be learned Sir Mortimer is not leaving his post here for any other position, and after his return to England he will probably retire from public life entirely. He entered the British diplomatic service in 1876, when he was sent to Persia. During the entire period between then and now the ambassador has been on foreign service for his Government with



SNAP-SHOTS AT VARIOUS SPORTS

The all-absorbing topic among devotees of the gridiron at present is the first prospective struggles for the championship of Canada, which will come off on the 17th, when the Blufftown Tigers meet the Montreal rugby artists at Hamilton. The Canadian Rugby Union has fixed upon Saturday, Nov. 17, as the provisional date for the first match for the senior championship. The game will be played at Hamilton between the Tigers, champions of Ontario, and Montreal, champions of Quebec.

The winner of this match will play the intercollegiate champions on the later's grounds. As the prospects are now that McGill will vin in the Colege Union, the final match for the championship will be played in Montreal on Nov. 24. The Hamilton game will be run by the Canadian Union. The Montreal team will get expenses and after the charges for the grounds are leducted, the receipts will be divided into three parts, one for each team, and the third for the Union, but in any case, the Union's share must not ex-

The game will be played under Canadian rugby rules.

Frank Erne, lightweight champion of the world for nearly four years, was started on the road to prize ring fame by winning out in the light-weight class in a tournament held in the old Olympic Athletic Club on North Division street, in Buffalo. Jimmy Britt was the best amateur lightweight on the Coast, while Kaufmann and Berger also began their squared arena careers as amateurs.

While Harrison, the Cubs' wonderuful little half-back undoubtedly is the greatest punter among the intermediate pack, Pierre Thomson, London's old reliable full-back, has got him beaten forty ways as a pinch kicker. In the Cubs-London games the Hamilton line always held long enough to allow "Nibs" to kick as he pleased, while a Hamilton player generally managed to get through the local line almost as soon as Thomson had the ball in his hands. Oftentimes the local back would kick just as he was knocked over by the opposing interference. Had Thompson had the same chance as the Cub punter for free kicking in the games played he would undoubtedly have shown up much better than he did. As it was, Thomson was practically a whole team in himself and the bulk of London's points must pe accredited to his clever right foot.

A dispatch says: "Davy" Johnson is the premier plunger of the year. Not that he has been the most successful, for he is a loser, but this wonderful money prodigal of the sporting world has bet three or four times as much as any other individual operator in the betting rings during the annual campaign just waning to a close.

Incidentally Johnson and his tremendous operations constituted the main theme in the gossip of the professional fraternity while reviewing the ups and downs of the year in the betting market returning home on the race trains. "Johnson is the real successor of the 'Pittsburg Phil,'" averred Bookmaker "Al" Hanff. "In only one thing," came the rejoinder, from a nearby car seat. "How do you figure it?" exclaimed a chorus of voices, and then "Maxey" Blumenthal undertook to explain that Johnson had quite as much nerve as "Phil" and would bet as much as the deceased plunger, but that where "Pittsburg Phil" would win three bets out of four, "Davy" could not make one stick up. In other words, "Pittsburg Phil" was a shrewd, calculating operator, who reduced the matter of playing race horses to an exact science. Johnson, on the other hand, is a slap-dash sort of a fellow, who will come into the betting ring intending to bet \$190 on a 4 to 1 chance to wind up wagering thousands on a 4 to 5 favorite. However, there can be but little question of "Pittsburg Phil" and "Davy" Johnson having bet more money in their respective heydays than any two other individuals of which turf chroniclers recount.

It is a matter of baseball history that "Buck" Ewing probably made the longest hit ever recorded. It was in the season of 1889, when Cleveland was a prominent factor in the National League. The Giants were fighting desperately for the championship. There were men on bases when Ewing came to bat. Cleveland's left field fence was so far away from the home plate that no one had ever batted the ball over it, and no one ever expected that a hit would go over it. "Darby" O'Brien, long since dead, was pitching for Cleveland. He tried to fool Ewing with a low curve on the outside corner

"Buck" swung with all his weight on the ball, and when it cleared the top board of that far-away left field fence by so many feet that there was enough daylight to have prolonged the afternoon for another hour or the crowd, in spite of its partisanship, stood up and roared.

Hugh S. Fullerton, in "Tales of Baseball Players on the Road," in the Chicago Tribune, says:

The clubs of the big leagues travel approximately 300,000 miles a year during the training and playing seasons, and the wonder is that one seldom hears of a baseball club even in the minor league being mixed up in a railway accident. Yet they have adventures and narrow escapes every

The only really serious accident to a major league club befell the Chicogo team under Anson during World's Fair year in Chicago. The team was coming home to play and was jumping from Cleveland into Chicago.

A special sleeper had been reserved for the players, but on account of the crush of travel the railway men had sold some of the berths, and when Anson and his men got ready to retire they discovered that three of their tickets had been sold to outsiders. There was a squabble, and, to settle it, the conductor requested Anson to send three of his men to berths in a for-

Jimmy Ryan, Malachi Kittridge and a newspaper man volunteered to go. The train was rushing along at 50 miles an hour, while Ryan, Kit, and the reporter were sitting comfortably in one of the berths, when, without warning, the car crushed into kindling wood, the floor went to pieces, and in a second everything was darkness. Smoke and steam hid the awful sight. Over 25 lives had been sacrificed.

The hunt for the players was exciting. The other men came running forward from their uninjured coach, and started the search. Kit was found first. A negro porter had picked him up and was dragging him away. As the players came upon them the negro dropped Kit and fell dead, a splinter having passed through his body. R yan was found on top of a coal car on a siding. His scalp had been torn off and dragged over his face, his body and legs were filled with splinters until he looked like he had been shot full of arrows. The newspaper man was sitting against a car wheel with an unbroken bottle of beer in one hand. He was unconscious. Ryan was identified by his rings.

To this day Ryan wears rubber bandages all over himself, but the other two members of th eparty recov ered immediately.


