# QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

Y. T. Q.—1. I was graded B and later B2. What is the difference? 2. I have leave of absence till May 31 on the farm. I am 20 years old. Could I get leave of absence till the other B men of my age are called? To whom would I apply? Or would I go back at the right time and then ask off again?

A .- 1. No difference as far as you are concerned. The numbers refer to training and its effects. 2. Write to your officer commanding, asking that you be granted an extension of leave. If you get no reply before your time is up, return to your battalion, otherwise you will be liable to a charge of being absent without leave.

J. P. Q.—My son is overseas. I have since been obliged to take my farm back from the man renting it. Can I get leave of absence for him? A.—Men are not granted leave from overseas on those grounds.







# GERMANS NOT INTELLIGENT.

RITING OF the German people, Lieut. Redier, a French soldier author, sums them up at last in one phrase, full of meaning: makes them odious in war and insupportable neighbors in peace.

Remembering all that has been said of German research, science, organization and efficiency it appears rather away from the mark to class the people as not intelligent, but perhaps the lieutenant has struck the nail on the head by his

It is an admitted fact that Germany would not have declared war, or allowed Austria to do so. in the fall of 1914 had the kaiser and his satelites believed that Britain would enter the lists against her; had they dreamed she would attach so much importance to that renowned "scrap of paper." In this miscalculation, the Germans showed lack of knowledge of the British which can be ascribed only to deficient intelligence.

Having misjudged the British, the Huns proeeded to make similar mistakes about the Belgians and French. They imagined that they could terrorize these nations by their hideous atrocities, and could frighten them into submission. # What Science Has Done to Conquer the War Diseases

By DR. LEONARD KEENE HIRSHBERG. A. B., M. A., M. D. (Johns Hopkins University.)

nephritis, gas gangrene and shell shock, are

trench nephritis, gas gangrene and shell shock, are among the more common forms of the new diseases.

Typhoid fever does not figure among the other unwelcome products of war. Of the 79,462 instances of typhoid during the civil war, 29,336 deaths occurred. The soldier is now well protected against this allment by the anti-typhoid vaccine that is injected into his blood. This method of cure is the product of many years of bacteriological research and its success has been proved time and again.

Similarly, many of the new forms of disease brought about by the war are on their way to being conquered by means of science. There has been much success with one of them in particular, namely, tetanus or lockjaw. This disease causes terrible suffering from its very beginning. The pain is accute, because there is consciousness throughout the period of illness. There is at no time during the disease a complete deadening sensation, as is true of other diseases. The cramps which characterize tockjaw are not limited to the jaw muscles alone, but the muscles of practically every single part of the human structures may be affected.

The spasmodic cramps are not as mild as those of the arms or legs, denoided when and stay in bed a week or two.

It takes one billionth as many tetanus bacilli to kill a patient, as it takes ordinary pusproducing germs to overpower an individual.

The anti-toxin serum against lockjaw was very scarce at the beginning of the war, and hence very precious. Many soldiers were left for hours and even days out in "No Man's Land," and when finally rescued were often in a too wretched condition to recover from the already contracted disease of lock-jaw.

Gas Gangrene Avoided. Since the serum in most instances had be applied every few minutes there while a prevalent product of the ravages of war. 




