IN DRUG TRAFFIC Extra Charts May Be Obtained Contrest Office.

Distribution is Lessened Under Government Control.

Ottaws. Oct. 17.—Department of trade and commerce records show a big reduction in the narcotic drug traffic since that department assumed control of imports last May. For the three months ended September 30, 1.100 pounds of opium were licensed for importation into Canada, compared with an average import of 8.500 pounds for each quarter last year. Similar comparison shows morphine reduced 65 per cent and cocaine 50 per cent. The department traced distribution of the heavy imports of last year, which brought to light the principal dealers who had been selling narcotics too freely.

## KRONSTADT FORTRESS FALLS AFTER HEAVY BOMBARDMENT FROM BRITISH WARSHIPS

British Fleet Enters Harbor After Capitulation of Fort Held by Bolsheviki - General Yudenitch's Army Captures Place Sixteen Miles From Petrograd — Petrograd Is Doomed To Fall.

ADMIRALTY DOUBTS CAPTURE. London, Oct. 17.—Confirmation of reports that their naval forces have taken the fortress of Kronstadt, on the Gulf of Finland, west of Petrograd, has not been received at the admiralty offices here. Dispatches telling of the capitulation of Kronstadt are not credited, it being said the British have only light cruisers in the vicinity which are incapable of successfully challenging the fortress. Admiralty officials state there was no reason for a British attack on the place.

REPORT CREDITED IN SWEDEN. Washington, Oct. 17.-Reports of the capture of Petrograd and Kronstadt by northwestern Russian forces under Gen. Yudenitch were received at the state department today from an American consular officer in Sweden, on the Finnish border. Confirmation of the reports had not been received when the dispatch was sent, but it was said that

Soviet troops are reported to be leaving Petrograd, a mutiny among the men having broken out. In any event, advices indicate that the Yudenitch forces are encountering feeble resistance.



Have Provided Bed and Meals for Thousands.

Although the K. of C.'s army hut which was located in St. Peter's Parish Hall is closed, distribution of comforts will still be continued throughout the five military hospitals in this city through the office in that building. Further work is to be carried on among the returned men of this city by the Knights of Columbus after a decision is reached and a plan drawn up by the committee appointed by the up by the committee appointed by the Governmen\* to report on the question of civil re-establishment and further gratuity to returned soldiers.

E. V. Hession, secretary of the organization, summed up the work accomplished by the hut while in existence. He said that the purpose of it was to aid in the re-establishment of soldiers into civil life.

Every troop train coming into the city was met by a representative. Some nights as high as 300 men were given beds, baths and breakfast next given beds, baths and breakfast next morning free of charge. No charge was made for anything the first day, but after the first day, 25 cents was the charge for a bed and each meal. Shower-baths, billiard tables, check-

## **PURCHASE PLAN** LIKELY TO LEAD TO SPECULATION

Known in London Before House Advised of Govt. Intention.

MUST HAVE HAD A TIP

Hon. W. S. Fielding Says Someone Will Profit At People's Expense.

by Hon. Sir George P. Graham, former minister of railways, in an interview here tonight.

The purchase of the Grand Trunk Railway system is being used by this group of capitalists, Mr. Graham contends, as a stock gamble. He is of the opinion that the seizure of the Grand Trunk Pacific by the Government was dictated in London and from London, that when the stocks of the Grand Trunk were low in consequence they were purchased by the group of capitalists, and that this same group will make immense fortunes if the Government takes over the system at this time. Further, Mr. Graham declares that he believes the same group of manipulating capitalists hope to gain control of the complete government-owned system when the people become disgusted with public ownership.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—"The government action has already constituted the foundation for the gigantic stock speculation on the London market, and has stock which prior to this action had very little value indeed. It is apparent that certain persons over there had not have." The above opinion of the new Grand Trunk legislation which the government in the dying days of the session has brought down for the ratification of Parliament was expressed by them. W. S. Fielding this afternoon.

"We are agreed on the proposal of having an arbitration on the value of certain stock, but the country should have a chance," continued the exminister of finance. "It is the same thing that happened in connection with the Canadian Northern. Stock was thing that happened in connection with the Canadian Northern. Stock was arbitrated and the arbitration board declared that the people must pay from ten to twelve million dollars for it. And the present minister of finance, Sir Henry Drayton, had declared that that stock had no value whatever. It did not represent a single penny placed in the treasury of the Canadian Northern. It was simply a basket of waste paper for which the Canadian people paid ten

to twelve million dollars.

A Pretty Penny.

"Under these conditions if common stock which had no value could be converted into ten or twelve million doilars, there is a grave danger that stock of the Grand Trunk, which paid small dividends, will cost the Canadian people a pretty penny indeed. people a pretty penny indeed.

"The guaranteed stock of the Grand
Trunk—sixty million dollars in amount
—for which the Government had guaranteed to pay four per cent, with nothing behind it but the Grand Trunk,"
continued Mr. Fielding, "stood at 45



Then, working with the farmers' and fruit growers, it laid before the commission such information as to bring about a re-adjustment of the freight rates, which saved the farmers and fruit growers thousands of dollars a year. In the same year, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association began to agitate for a tariff. This was opposed so strongly by the Farmers' Association and "The Grange" that the manufacturers changed their tactics and sought to lower the tariff instead of raise it. Later, the latter unions united, forming one body and soon a wider movement than ever was started in the United Farmers'.



He asked the ladies of Tillsonburg to keep the politics clean and vote for Liberalism and Mr. Rose. (Loud applause.)

"Little Mr. Lucas sits in Toronto with the machinery necessary to break up 310 per cent profits and never raises a hand, while widows and orphans of soldiers have hard work to earn a living." he asserted. Away back in February, when the officers of the Ontario W. C. T. U. were meeting in Toronto, we were told that late in the Referendum campaign the liquor interests would spring this lie. in the hope that it would prove a red herring across the Prohibition trail. Recent liquor advertising proves the accuracy of this forecast.

The W. C. T. U. was instrumental in securing a Dominion law prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to minors under 16 years

They have no apologies to offer for this. They believe that the fathers and mothers of Ontario approve that legislation.

The W. C. T. U. did not make any attempt to prevent the soldiers from receiving cigarettes. They did say to their own membership, "Send candy instead," and in response to this suggestion, tons upon tons of chocolates went into the trenches.

The W. C. T. U. also provided, through the Y. M. C. A., more than half of the money expended by that organization for free drinks in 1918.

The Anti-Cigarette League is an American institution which has no branches in Canada, as far as we know.
