In That Precious Natural Gas

Now that the city council and the Standard Gas Company have mutually concluded that that precious agreement passed by the council of 1897 in its dying moments should be fovised, it is to be hoped the council will see that the monopolistic clauses in it are knocked out. The agreement, for instance, provides for no termination of the company's franchise. It is good when completed for all time to come. As a representative of the company explained to the Planet after the original agreement went through their charter would die in the ordinary course of events in fifty years, but before it died a new company could be organized good for another lifty and the franchise for Chatham turned over to them. Whatever new agreement the present council enters into, it shoult's see that the franchise definitely lapses at a certain time whether that time be 20, 30 or 40 years. But the city had one alternative in the last agreement of getting out of or rather further into the wishes of the proposed monopoly. Here is how it could be done by CLAUSE FIFTEEN.

IRELAND'S WOES.

A Correspondent Sees a Chance of Their Redress.

One of Britain's Warmest

Supports. Editor of The Planet.

Sir,-Kindly allow me a small s in your valuable journal in reference to the bill introduced by the British government, for the redress of Irish grievances. I have read an article in the Globe of the 7th inst in reference to the bill, and I must/frankly state, as every right minded man can learn from the fair criticism of the article to the bill, and I must/frankly state, as every right minded man can learn from the fair criticism of the article in question, that the bill will not only be the salvation of the country itself, but one of the principal securities for tranquility and economic progress of Jreland. The bill leads to the introduction of peasant proprietary. The great evil of Ireland is this, that the Irish people—the frish nation—are dispossessed of the soil, and I rejoice to learn that the Imperial government is providign for and aiding in the restoration of the peasant proprietary. The great statesman of England, the Hon. W. E. Gladstone, advocated the measure of home rule for Ireland. John Bright stated at a banquet tendered to him in Dublin, Nev 2, 1866, "I have thought, if I could be in all other things the same, but by birth-an Irishman, there is not a town in this island I would not visit for the purpose of discussing the great Irish question, and of rousing my countrymen to some great and united action." Peasant proprietary to-day, in France, presents an example of thrift, industry, patriotism and contentment. Also the same may be said of other states of Europe. The bill has received the approval of the Parnellites, anti-Parnellites, and of both political parties of the house of commons.

For my part, I have never affected to be either surprised or indignant at the antipathy of the Irish to us. What they had suffered from us in past times all the world knows, and now, when we profess to practice "a great and genial policy of confiliation" toward them, they are really governed by us in deference to the opinion and sentiment of the British middle class, and of the strongest part of this class—the Puritan community. The opinion and sentiment of our middle class controls the policy of our statemen toward Ireland. That policy does not represent the real mind of our leading statemen, but the mind of the British middle class controling the action of statemen. And yet it is in deference to the opinion and sentiment of such a class that we shape our policy toward Ireland. The Irish Catholics, who are in the immense majority in Ireland.





Of course, every man has a right to his own opinion as to the value and healthfulness of bogus butter. We do not believe the editor of Bradstreet's would eat the stuff himself in any event. His paper is a high-priced sheet with a specialty for trade and market reports. It has a characteristic form and appearance of its own. Suppose the Rural New Yorker were to get out a paper with cheap and stale market news, and copy Bradstreet's name and appearance as closely as possible. Within an hour, every force of the law would be operated to stop such work. For be operated to stop such work. For many years, farmers have been mak be operated to stop such work. The many years, farmers have been making butter with a characteristic yellow color. This color has distinguished butter from tallow, lard and other grease. Manufacturers undertake to color the cheaper fats in imitation of butter, and then sell them at butter prices. At first it was a clear case of counterfeiting. At last, in an effort to prevent fraud, laws for regulating the manufacture and sale of this bogus butter were passed. They have not been entirely satisfactory, and will not be so long as manufacturers can color the cheap fats in imitation of butter. We cannot object to the sale of hog or beef fat uncolored and under a name of its own. This would be the best possible thing for those who desire cheap food for the poor, for the uncolored fat would be several cents per pound cheaper, and just exactly as valuable as food. Permission to use the yellow color is an injustice to the poor, since it makes them pay more for the food.

It is a compound liberally fortified with crystallized sulphate of zinc, which enables a "round" of cheese to preserve for a long period a fresh and youthful complexion, no unsightly cracks and swellings appearing on its surface to excite the suspicious of timid buyers. The sinc preparation is known in the trade as cheese spice—a title as little warranted as it would be to call a handful of tin tacks shrimp sauce or salad dressing. It appears that in Can-ada it is the practice of unscrupulous dealers to use metallic lead for the above purpose—a fact to which atten-tion has also been directed, and which should prove especially interesting to people anxious to avoid a heavy diet.— The Dairy.


