Was Apparently Afraid of Charges of Corruption Lodged Against Him by the Socialists.

Naples, Nov. 10 .- Minister of Finance Rosano committed suicide by shooting during the night. He was found dead yesterday in his room, a revolver at his side.

Signor Rosano was given the position of Minister of Finance in the new Italian Cabinet, the formation of which was announced only last Wednesday. Since the formation of the new Cabinet the Socialists had attacked Signor Rosano, charging him with corruption during his political career, challenging him to disprove the charges and adding that otherwise they would bring the matter up at the opening of the Chamber of Deputies.

A LAWYER'S LIABILITY.

Canadian Express Co. Paid Money to Wrong Party.
Toronto, Nov. 10.—Judge Mor-

yesterday reserved judg-ment in the interesting action ment in the interesting action of the Canadian Express Company against Frank W. McLean, barrister. In January last a money order on the company last a money order on the company for \$48.93 was mailed to John W. Carter of the Sons of England. The order was presented at the company's office by a man representing himself as the payee. The company demanded his identification, and he sought the defendant's assistance. Mr. McLean suggested that, if he were the proper party, he should make a statutory declaration to that effect. Mr. McLean telephoned the company's manager, who consented to accept this identification. The declaration was made by the claimant and the money was paid over to Mr. McLean's stenographer, who took the document to the company's office. After deducting legal charges the balance: was paid the claimant, who then disappeared.

Mr. John W. Carter, the person properly entitled, later traced the payment to the company, and on making application for the money learned that it had been paid out. The company now sued Mr. McLean on the ground that he had guaranteed that the man who received the money was the party entitled.

He said that while general taxation for that purpose could not be undertaken without representation, yet we might undertake the defence of our own shores without demanding Imperial representation. The toast of "Our Own Special Birthday" was happily responded to by Mr. J. F. Ellis and Mr. J. S. Willison, whose natal anniversaries also fell yesterday. The toast of "Ourselves" was responded to by Mr. Frank Arnoldi, Mr. J. F. Ellis and Mr. G. T. Irving, while Dr. Paton, a Canadian, now of Cologne, Germany, spoke in reply to an impromptu toast. > Both Spirit and Letter of the Law Violatad by Defaulter Ross

Official Record of the North Renfrew Vacancy—Text of the statutes

Chapter 12 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario is explicit in providing for the election of a member to the legislative assembly to fill the vacancy saused by the death of a member. J. W. Munro, who was elected for the riding of North Renfrew by a majority of nearly 500 on May 29, 1902, died on May 30, causing a vacancy in the constituency. The legislature met on March 10 of this year, and the constituency is still vacant. Here is what Sections 36 and 37 of the act

ACT COVERING VACANCIES. Section 36.-(1) If a vacancy hap-

pens in the legislative assembly by the death of a member, or by his accepting any office, commission or employment, or by his becoming party to a contract, as mentioned in Section 9 of this act, the Speaker, ON BEING INFORMED OF THE VACANCY by a member of the said assembly in his place, or by notice in writing under the hands and seals of two members of the said assembly, shall FORTHWITH address the warrant to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery for the issue of a new writ for the election of a member to fill the vacancy, AND A NEW WRIT SHALL ISSUE ACCORDINGLY.

Section 37 - (1) A warrant may ssue under the hands and seals of two members elect of the legislative assembly to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, for the issue of a new writ, for the election of a member of the legislative assembly to fill of the legislative assembly to filitary vacancy arlsing, subsequently to a general election, and before the first meeting of said assembly therestre by reason of the death or other of the causes aforesaid, and the writ may issue at any time after such vacancy.

April 24.—Col. Matheson asked: Has the writ been issued to fill the vacancy in North Renfrew? If not, what was the cause of delay, and on what day did the Speaker issue his warrant? The Premier replied: The Speaker's warrant for the issue of the writ in North Renfrew is dated March 23, 1903. The Government has directed the Clerk not to issue the writ, pending the present investigation in re charges by the member for Manitoulin. On motion of Col. Matheson it was ordered that there be laid before the House a return of copies of all correspondence between any member of the Government and any other person or persons since the death of J. W. Munro, M. L. A., with reference to the issue of the writ for the election to fill the vacancy in North Renfrew. Not brought down.

Sir,—By section 550 of the Criminal Code it is provided that "the trials of young persons apparently under the age of 16 shall take place without publicity and separately and apart from the trials of other accused persons." arom the trials of other accused persons." As you will understand, this provision is intended as far as possible to profeet groung persons who presumably are not as yet hardened from unnecessary exposure before the public. There is reason to believe that the above enactment has not been obeyed in all cases, and I am to impress on your that the desire am to impress on you that the desire of the Attorney General is that the enactment should be scrupulously carried out. The object we must all thave in view is, where possible, to save and reclaim young persons, and it has been considered by those most competent to ever an opinion that competent to give an opinion that this is one effective means.

Circulars from the Department of that the butter act of 1903 prohibiting the manufacture, importation or sale o oleomargarine, butterine, adulterated butter or process butter, prohibiting-the improper marking of butter and a greater percentage of water than 16 per cent., is now in force. The penalties for violations of the act range from ten dollars to four hundred, according

ten dollars to four hundred, according to the gravity of the offence.

The department points out the following pressing needs of the Canadian creamery buttermaking industry:—

(1) Better constructed and more sanitary creamery buildings.

(2) Improved refrigerators at the creameries where the temperature can be kept at least below 36 degrees Fahr.

(3) Delivery of the cream in a fresher and sweeter condition where the

(3) Delivery of the cream m, a tresher and sweeter condition where the cream gathering system has been adopted.

(4) Stronger and neater finished packages for export butter.

(5) Heavier and purer vegetable parchment paper for lining packages.

(6) Frequent and regular shipment of butter from the creamery to a cold-storage warehouse where lower temperature can be secured.

(7) Greater precaution in transfer-ring butter from the creamery to the cars to prevent it from becoming un-necessarily heated.

Cream That Will Keep.

I will give our method of making a fancy cream, which will keep for weeks without souring, in a very few words, as the whole secret of our success lies in absolute purity and cleanliness in everything, from beginning to end. It requires much more care to produce clean milk than any other food

produce clean milk man any other love product, and were the consumers aware of the impurities in the larger part of the dairy products on the market, there would be a small sale for the same. The consumer is much to blame for this condition of things. If the propole would demand a better article. people would demand a better article, and will be willing to pay for the ex-tra cost, there are many dairymen who would be willing to take the pains re-quired to furnish clean milk and cream. quired to furnish clean milk and cream.
Our first aim is to keep the stables and cows as clean as possible. The cows are brushed and the udders washed before milking. No hay is fed at this time, as the dust in falling will carry into the milk the germs which are found floating in all cow-stables. The bacteria thus introduced will give the the milk the same disagreeable. The bacteria thus introduced will give to the milk the same disagreeable flavor as the filth from the cow. To keep the dust and dirt from the milk we use a pail covered with two thicknesses of cheesecloth, between the folds of which is placed a layer of absorbent cotton. In this way the milk comes to the dairy house nearly free from all impurities. The greatest care

is taken to have every utensil in the dairy thoroughly cleansed and scalded every time it is used. No half-way work will answer here. No sour germ can lurk in the can or strainer without affecting the cream. In fact, no odor or germ must be allowed in or around

or germ must be allowed in or around the dairy house.

After separating, the cream is cooled quickly and kept in a tank of ice water until bottled for shipment. You will see from my description of our methods that it is simply keeping the milk absolutely clean, and cooling as soon as possible after milking, that give our cream its fine flavor and keeping qualities. Choice cream and butter cannot be made from filthy milk, and our dairy inspector will have filled an important part of his mission, and rendered to the public a mest commendable service when he shall have awakened the dairy farmer to the importance of producing a pure, clean milk.—C. S. Pope, Manchester Me., in American Cultivator.

Storing Root Crops.

Every farmer knows the difficulty of so storing roots as to facilitate the handling of them in winter. Some handling of them in winter. Some have no pits or cellars convenient in the barns, and consequently store the roots in pits outside. Of course, the outdoor method is not always the best, for the roots will sometimes keep in as sound condition when stored i in as sound condition when stored in that manner as by any other process, but when the season is well advanced and the ground is hard and frozen it becomes a very difficult matter to get at the crop when wanted for use. If a large crop is stored inside the barn, unless the location is so situated as to be under the influence of an even a large crop is stored inside the barn, unless the location is so situated as to be under the influence of an even temperature, the handling of the roots endangers them when the weather is extremely cold, and causes them to sprout as the temperature becomes high. Here, then, are two difficulties to be avoided, which are heat and cold. What the farmer wishes is to store the roots in such manner as to keep them at an even temperature, preserve them in a good condition, and to be easily handled when he wishes to use them for feeding. Of course, it is well known that the time for storing the crops is in the fall, but it is never too late to repack them, which can be done when the weather is only moderately cold. The best plan for so doing is to get some dry dirt, coal ashes or dry sawdust. In a bin, barrel or box lay two inches of the packing, material, and upon this make a layer of roots and do not let them quite touch one another. Fill the packing, material, and upon this make a layer of roots and do not let them quite touch one another. Fill the spaces with packing material, and so continue until the receptacle is full. By this method they can be taken out for use in any quantity desired, and they will keep much better than if stored in heaps, will not freeze nor heat, and will keep until the next crop comes in. Even potatoes, both sweet and white, may be thus preserved. Be careful that the packing material is dry. Moisture should be avoided as much as possible. At the present time the difficulty is to procure dry dirt, which is the best material to use, while wood ashes are not plentiful. Fine sawdust is the next best substance, but not equal to dry dirt. Plaster is excellent, but somewhat expensive. Wheat chaff is good, and so is straw when cut in half-inch lengths. It is best to do such work, however, at the time of harvesting the crop.—Philadelphia Record.

Our Prison Systems.

The savagery of our prison systems, as they existed previously to the time of John Howard, says The Literary Digest. appears to have been so far mitigated that that great prison reformer might be considerably astonished if he could visit some of our American penal institutions of the present day. We learn from the some of our American penal institutions of the present day. We learn from the Mississippi papers that it is no uncommon thing for convicts who escape from the Mississippi Penitentiary to the inhospitable outside world to come back and ask to be admitted again; and the Pennsylvania papers are filled with accounts of the discovery of a counterfeiting plant that has been running for months in the Eastern Penitentiary, in Philadelphia, and which had escaped the notice of the prison attendants. It had escaped their notice so completely, indeed, so the papers say, that they unsuspectingly received from the prisoners large numbers of the dimes, quarters and half-dollars turned out by this rival Philadelphia mint, and spent them in the city until Philadelphia was "flooded with them. The counterfeiting business was carried on by the convicts mainly "to pass away the time," so The Philadelphia Inquirer thinks, as they had nothing else to do. In a prison there is a great deal of time to pass, and the recollection of the old saying about time and money might easily suggest the passing of the latter. Most of the prisoners engaged in the counterfeiting are said departed to the counterfeiting was carried on at night, when only the night watchman, who was supposed to be on duty. The newspapers comment very severely on the prison management, and the critics of the Republican State administration profess to see a connection between the alleged misgovernment of the State and the dereliction of the prison officials. 

PREMIER BALFOUR'S VIEWS ON ALASKA DECISION.

Lord Alverstone Still Declines to Enter Upon Any Defence-Standard Says His Word Should Suffice-Times Thinks Our Soreness Will be Assuaged.

London, oNv. 10 .- Premier Balfour, to the decision of the majority of the Alaska Tribunal at the banquet given in the historic Guild Hall by the new Lord Mayor, Sir James Ritchie, last In his opening remarks Premier Bal-In ms opening remarks Premier Balfour, referring to the far eastern situation, said there was every reason to
feel sanguine that it would not have
a serious outcome. He based this assurance on the passionate desire of the
Czar to promote general peace, and the
fact that Japan, as the ally of Great
Britain, would be certain to display
moderation, discretion and judgment in
its demands, as well as firmness in enforcing them.

Premier Balfour said: I read only a few hours ago a telegraphic summary of Mr. Aylesworth's speech. I cannot pretend to judge a speech from a telegraphic summary, but I can guess that it was expressed in terms as eloquent as the sentiments dealt with seemed to me to be just. Ambassador Choate said he admired the spirit in which Mr. Balfour referred to the Alaska decision. That ample justice had been done by the tribunal was due to the sense of justice and the manly courage and devotion to duty of Lord

to the sense of justice and the manly courage and devotion to duty of Lord Alverstone. I read, too, he said, Mr. Aylesworth's very magnanimous and handsome speech in Toronto, and if I rightly understand the generous-minded people of Canada the termination of this long-standing controversy has made both Canada and the United States better friends. Lord Alverstone, replying for the Bench, said he was not there to justify his judicial conduct in any public speech. If the Judges of Britain thought it necessary to justify their public utterances it would be a death blow to public confidence. "Discussions will arise between nations, but if you do not want a judicial decision don't ask British Judges, to be members of the court."

The Standard, this morning, referring to the Guildhall speeches, says it is absurd to sulk about the Alaska award. There is no doubt whatever that the failure of the Canadian contention was due to the inability of their advocates to prove their case before the eminent jurist presiding over the tribunal. Lord Alverstone's speech was the only vindication of his judgment that was needed. Mr. Ballour is assured by the military advisers of the Government that the two small islands given to the United States have lost their real strategic value. Canadians for the moment seem to think they would fare better in negotiations without the aptential influence, experience and authority which the Imperial Government can bassador Choate's conciliatory words may do something to assuage the mortification of the Dominion, and when they look at the peak named Mount Herbert they will not think unkindly of the statesmanship that closed the dispute.

Bishop of the first Methodist Church Sunday morning spoke emphatically against the efforts being made by a part of the Methodist Church in Canada to reach young men by other than Gospel means. He characterized the Gospel means. He characterized the young man problem as the most perplexing with which the Church had to deal, and said that all the efforts so far of church societies in this respect had been signal failures. The Epworth League and the Young Men's Christian Association, so far as the reaching of young men and converting them was concerned, he stated, had proved a failure. Furthermore, he objected to the movement for Methodist young men's clubs on the ground that they were dishonorable to God. Mr. Bishop took as his text the reference in the 19th chapter of St. Matthew to the query of the young man, "What good thing shall I do that I may have eternal life?" Mr. Bishop referred to the resolution passed at the last Conference, that steps should be taken to beget a large interest, advocating as a remedy the formation of young men's brotherhoods. Following out this, seventeen associations had been formed in Toronto, and he referred to what the President of those associations stated in The Guardian, namely, that these societies do not hold religious meetings, but deviled their way into the church organizations. Upon this plan. Mr. Bishop said that at the Conference he had ventured to raise his voice against the tendency of the times to depart from the Gospel methods. He did not find in the Gospel any such plan. "I only find one way to salvation," he said, "and I only find one way of reaching all." young man problem as the most per-
