The English Baptist Missionary Society reports for the English Baptist Missionary Society reports for the last year larger receipts than ever before, amount-ing to \$196,697 (allowing \$5 to the pound); of which, over \$50,000, a very large proportion, came from legacies. To avoid the irregularity in legacies, the society will in future carry all legacies over into a separate Legacy Reserve Fund, from which to draw in such a way as to make the annual average about the same. A new and convenient mission house has the same. A new and convenient mission house has been built in London. In India there have been 100 additions to the churches, and 71 in Ceylon, raising the number there to 600. Other missions are in Che-fuh and Hang-kau, in China, South Africa, and the West Indies. Great efforts are making to put the mission churches on a self-supporting basis.

PERSECUTION IN JAPAN.

We have not heard that the persecution of the Catholic Christians in Japan has to any great extent affected the Protestant missions. Their converts, as yet, are very few; and but one of them, so far as we know, a late Buddhist priest, has been arrested—and he not on the direct charge of his change of religion, but for breaking certain social rules. The missionaries of the Reformed and Presbyterian Boards are still teaching in government employ. Mr. Cornes, of the latter board, has just accepted a position as teacher for a year in a government school in Yedo. According to the rule of the board in such cases, his salary, so far as it is in advance of expenses, will be paid into the treasury of the society. It is of great importance that the missionaries should not be compromised in the sight of the Japanese as giving up their mission work for money. We have not heard that the persecution of the

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

THE BATTLE OF TOULOUSE

When all was ready, we crossed the bridge and marched about a mile along the bank of the river Ers, while the enemy poured their shot through our ranks. A man just before me had to themselves, as they had blown up the other two bridges to prevent our passing in force. CAMP-MKETING.

The Camp-meeting on the Cookstown Circuit will. to themselves, as they had blown up the other hilfs seemed inclined to make a dash at us; but easy. the rocket brigade joining us at the time they were about to charge, stopped them. Our Light Division, always ready, then formed, advanced, and settled the matter in a few minutes. Having reached our post on the extreme left of the line, we faced to the right and advanced up the slope towards the batteries, with bold front, and bugles sounding. The troops that were the nearest to the French batteries now closed upon the masses that came pouring over the hill, and the struggle became tremendous; but, as usual, the red jackets prevailed, and in a quarter of an hour we stood triumphant on the hill. Here we were ordered to lay down in order to avoid as much as possible a flanking, galling fire that was kept up by the enemy. A poor fellow that I had been talking to at the bridge was now borne along, his leg hanging by a bit of flesh. His wife was killed at Salamanca while giving drink to a wounded man. While lying on the ground, a round shot came bounding, and struck my mess tin, which was strapped on the top of my knapsack, and made a disagreeable ting. A sergeant lying close by exclaimed, "Jack! very near that time!" So I thought; and moved a little. This was closely followed by a musket ball whizzing past my head. Having had several of my accoutrements stolen, I went among the dead to select such as I wanted. One of the 42nd, or Highland Watch, had a belt that suited me. Though he was not quite dead I stripped him of it. I also wanted a bayonet, therefore I went in search of one nearer the enemy's skirmishers, who were concealed under the brow of the hill; but the balls came too thickly to invite my stay there. Having got what I sought, I looked behind me, and saw Lord Wellington and his staff riding along the ridge. I knew then the game the enemy aimed at. He took no notice of the whis whis, but rode on. Before I p.m. the enemy were beaten at all points, notwithstanding their superiority in artillery, cavalry, and fortified position; and it must have been extremely mortifying to them to be thus routed in the vicinity of one of their chief cities. After resting awhile we advanced over the hill, and had a full view of the city into which the enemy were retreating. Halting on the slope in a column at quarter distance, the sound of approaching cavalry was heard on our "Form square!" was the word. 'Twas done in an instant. The enemy saw this, wheeled about and cantered down the hill. So ended the sanguinary battle of Toulouse, and our Easter-Sunday service.

HOW STATUARY IS MADE.

But little is known of the art of sculpture by the masses in this, or, indeed, any other country. The first thing the sculptor does is to model or tashion the figure in clay. He first builds a skeleton of iron, and then puts the clay upon it, and adds or takes off until the work is completed. He then transfers the model, or reproduces it in plaster of Paris. This is done by covering the clay with liquid plaster to the depth of about one and a half inches, more or less, according to the size of the model—a life-sized figure would require the plaster to be laid on at least three

inches in depth. The plaster is then allowed to become perfeetly hard, or to set, as it is called. An additional quantity of plaster is then mixed with water and poured into the new-made mold in thirty or forty minutes it will become set and hard.
