back than A. D. 1636, and it was only in 1786 that four lighthouses were exceted on the coasts of Scotland. In 1861, however, when a commission was appointed to inquire into the matter, the returns showed that 408 lighthouses and floating lights had been provided for the shores of Great Britain and Ireland. During the past eighteen years the number of these beacons has been increased by nearly 14 per cent. If we decompose the total of 459 now reported for the British Islands, we shall have an average of one light for every 104 miles of English, for every 344 miles of Scottish, and for every 26 miles of Irish coast.

Not only has the number of British lighthouses been, in recent years, materially increased, but their location has been chosen with a keen eye to the difficulties of navigation, and with scarcely any reference to the cost involved in the undertaking. Among the remarkable achievements of British enginening is the tower creeted on Wolk Rock, a mere point of porphyry lying eleven miles west of Land's End, and exposed to the full force of the Atlantic Ocean. This lighthouse is more than 116 leet in height, and has a diameter near the top of 17 feet. The light here, first exhibited on January 1, 1870, and afnoe regularly displayed, is a revolving dioptric light of the first order, showing alternate flashes of red and white at half minute interval. Still more imposing is the work of which the foundation stone has been laid by the Prince of Wales on the Eddystone rock, at a short distance from the present tower. The new light, when completed, will have an elevation of 130 feat above high water, or nearly twice the height of the present beacon. The lighthouse now building will be provided with a fog signal st maximum intensity, and with a light of the first order, whose range will reach seventeen and a quarter nastical miles, so as 50 overless the circuit of the new electric lights of the Lizard. It is for want of better information that so many Canadians are settling in Minnesota, as much the larger portion of the land in that State is of poor or indifferent quality. Where the land is good on the Red River Valley, it is almost a dead level and difficult to drain, being also subject to fevers. I know that some Canadianshavedone very fwell by taking up land on the banks of the streams where there is more or less timber, but all that kind of land has already been taken up in the States of Minnesota and Dakota, and the new comers must content themselves with open prairie land where there is not a knoll or a bush to break the monotonous surroundings, and where the well water is nearly all bad tasted, if not injurious to the health. In most of these level prairie lands in Minnesota and Dakota, the soil is rather shallow, and will not stand long continued croppings as in the more fertile lafids further north in Manitoba. The most desirable place for such men as want an abundant supply of good wood and water, with rich soil and a healthy climate near a railway, is at Bird Tail Creek, but they will need to hurry up or the best land in that locality will be taken up. There is some very choice, well watered, wooded, and beautifully located land near Felican Lake, but it will probably be some time before there is any railway near that place. The land mer the Turtle Mounts is also well supplied with wood and water, but it is not so fertile as the other places, but out a few miles from the Turtle Mounts; on the open prairie, there is plenty of very fertile land. There will be a grist mill built at Bird Tail Creek the present season, and probablyone at the Turtle Mounts within a year.
