GERMANO-BOLSHEVIK PEACE NEGOTIATIONS AGAIN BROKEN

Teutons Resume Advance Into Into Russian Territory, and Russ Peace Emissaries Seek Protection; German Aggression Not Yet Satiated, But Will Continue--- Bolsheviki Prepare For Lengthy Campaign of Spirited Resistance to Invading Forces

Peace negotiations between Germany and the Bolsheviki Government apparently have been broken off again. Resumption of the German forward movement and the fact that the Russian peace emissaries have asked that a train under military guard be sent to meet them near Pskov indicates that Teutonic aggression has not been satiated.

The Bolsheviki are making strenuous preparations to meet the German advance and Premier Lenine is sending forth proclamations urging all Russians to save the revolution. Moscow and the interior of Russia have declared against a separate peace and the local councils in the interior are making ready to resist the

Belated despatches from Petrograd say the Bolsheviki are destroying strategic railways, bridges and roads and are sending large forces to the fighting front. The Germans are said to be within 80 miles of Petrograd on the southwest and are approaching Orsha, on the same Meridian of longitude as Petrograd and three hundred miles west of Moscow. Vitebsk, 75 miles north of Orsha, also is threatened. In the Uk-

me the advance of the Germans and Austrians, who have joined their ally in driving the Bolsheviki from the new republic goes on rapidly. Kiev, the capital, which has been in Bolsheviki control is in danger. Vienna reports the surrender of 10,000 Russians and the capture of much war material and railway rolling stock.

The French in Champagne have been hotly engaged with the Germans. London, March 2-A message received by the Bolsheviki government in Petrograd from Brest-Litovsk, dated Friday, ordering a train under military guard to meet the Russian dele-gates at Horoshaets, was con-sidered by the government as probably significant of peace ne-gotiations being broken off, ac-cording to a whyless communi-cation received here from Pe-trograd last night.

The wireless communication collows:

follows:

"To all the Councils: The following message was received Friday from Brest-Litovsk!

"To the Council of Commissiaries, Petrograd: Send us a train to Toroshaets, near Pskov, escorted by sufficiently large forces. Communicate with Krylenko concerning the bodyguard. (Signed) Karahan."

"This message most probably signifies that the peace negotiations have been broken off by the Germans. We must be ready for an immediate German advance on Petrograd and on all fronts. It is necessary that all the people rise and strengthen the measures for defence. (Signed Lenine."

The Russian peace delegates at Brest-Littivsk were informed that hostilities would cease only when the peace treaty was signed, says a Russian official statemen received here today. Three days were allowed for negotiations, beginning today.
