GOVERNMENT'S ILLEGAL TRAFFIC IN OUR CROWN LANDS

Another scandal looms before the disorganized Murray Government. Following close on the heels of the charges made in the House of Assembly that the government, through the Provincial farm at Truro, sold tuteular cattle knowing it to be diseased, thus working what might have been irreparable harm to the live stock of this province, comes another charge that the government illegally trafficked in crown lands for the personal gain of friends of the administration. Premier Murray had to bear the brunt of this charge, for it was friends of his who were the beneficiaries of these transactions. These grave charges were laid at the door of the government by J. C. Douglas, one of the members for Cape Breton.

AMERICANS GOT THE LANDS

Mr. Douglas recently showed that the government gave a lease for 99 years of 600,000 acres of Crown lands in Inverness and Victoria Counties to a set of Americans, who thought so highly of the Premier that they made the name of the post office at their camp "Murray," but that was only a little matter.

This grant was made ostensibly on condition that the people who got the lands should erect two pulp mills of 90 tons daily capacity each, within four years after the making of the grant, which was away back in 1899 and that they manufacture their wood products in Nova Scotia. There are no pulp mills there yet.

THE CONDITIONS CANCELLED

The American friends of the government having got the lands the next thing was to have the conditions wind up. They got the five orders in Council one condition after another cancelled by the government and soon the Americans had the 600,000 acres unconditionally. They could do with them as they liked, one thing being the shipment of wood unmanufactured. The pulp mills would be in the United States.

THE VITAL CLAUSE OVER-RIDDEN

The only clause under which the lease of the Crown lands could be legally made was section 34, subsection 2 of the Crown Lands Act, which reads as follows:

"Lands upon which hard wood is the principle growth, may also be leased under terms and conditions to be prescribed, provided the person proposing to lease the same, undertakes to expend money in the erection of mills and machinery for the manufacture of wood products or pulp."

The government made the grant to its friends, Mr. Douglas pointed out, and then as already stated, deliberately turned round and eliminated the condition regarding the erection of mills for manufacture.

ANOTHER WAY TO HELP THEIR FRIENDS

The government sought and found another way of helping their friends. Section 29 of the Crown Lands Act is as follows: "The Commissioner may grant, sell or lease small lots of land which are altogether or nearly surrounded by lands not held by the Crown and may also make grants of such lots held under lease from the Crown to the lessee or lessees thereof."

In the year 1910 the Attorney General put an amendment through the legislature in which the clause was repeated but WITHOUT the word SMALL, thus enabling the government to grant any further lands that the land grabbers might desire, and to which the government wished to be in a position to help them. So they struck out the limitation of the word SMALL. The amendment was smuggled through the House, the bill not being printed as is the usual custom.

THE BEST TRACT IN NOVA SCOTIA

The great stretch of Crown land,

covering 600,000 acres, is what is called "The Cape Breton Tract" and is easily the best in Nova Scotia. Professor Fernow, one of the greatest forestry authorities in the country, says the vast area given to those Americans includes twelve million cords of wood worth an average of \$2. per cord. The grant, therefore, in this respect alone, has a potential value of \$24,000,000.

A most suspicious thing about this deal, for it can be known by no other name, is that the lease was not registered in 1899 when it was made, but was kept unrecorded and secret for ten years.

GOVERNMENT'S FALSE RETURNS

Mr. Douglas also brought home to the government the charge that returns asked from the government in this matter were false and jumbled. This was in connection with a return asked for regarding the ungranted and unleased crown lands in Inverness and Victoria Counties. The returns laid down on the table have evident marks of change and mutilation. Mr. Douglas did not mince words, but plainly called it "false."

THE THIEVES DISAGREE ON DIVISION OF SPOIL

The exposures came to light partly because of the litigation in the United States over these lands, which was shown in the following clipping from a Boston paper, and which Mr. Douglas read to the House:

"An injunction today was granted by Judge Crosby in the equity motion, at the session of the Suffolk Superior Court, on a bill filed by Alfred L. Sweeney against Nathaniel Jones and others. This injunction is binding upon R E Paine, of Brookline, and Clarence Hale, of Portland, who are trustees of large paper and pulp tract of land in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia."

It appears that Messrs Paine and Hale have consolidated many interests in timber limits in counties in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, and that they are about disposing to them of Messrs. Jones Schofield and other associates, for "several million dollars." Jones, Schofield and associates owe a large sum of money to petitioner Alfred Sweeney, a citizen of Massachusetts, and also Messrs Paine and Hale from conveying these valuable timber and pulp resources to other capitalists. From information received we are reliably informed that the property involved in the option and which the injunction is to bind, has been variously estimated at from \$24,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

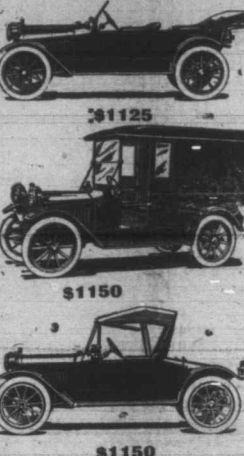

The appointment of three of their members, may under this bill, appoint by two councillors, and select a woman as the third of these appointees. The Local Government, which has the appointment of two members, may appoint these two women. While the act is entirely of a permissive nature, it will be clearly seen that any board might be made up of three women and two men.

Unanimous for Closure

Canada's Minister of Militia

Colonel Sam Hughes has done what no former Minister of Militia in Canada ever dared to do. But the Colonel also spoke clearly and strongly. He said, "So long as I am Minister of Militia there will never be allowed in the militia camps any wet messes, 'mild' or 'light' beer canteens. You will kindly not waste any time discussing this question further. It is settled." The Colonel has studied the matter thoroughly and he has the "facts." This is one of them. "We allowed the permanent force in one camp to have its canteen because it had canteens at its barracks and these men wanted to be able to drink 'be-ah' (beer) like gentlemen. On one night there were fourteen of these men drunk. I have a l the facts about that case and am watching these men. There will be no more beer for them." But the Colonel went further than that, and did a thing so awful it almost sends the cold shivers down one's spine. He gave a banquet to the military magnates of the Dominion, when his Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught was present—and the banquet was "dry." And he has even dared to call women, even members of the W. C. T. U., to his militia conference. Surely the Colonel is 'doing things.' We do not find ourselves in agreement with all the plans of the Minister of Militia, but we certainly cannot help but commend him for his stand in these matters.—CGuardian.

THE REVEREND POLITICIAN

The Reverend Dr. McDonald, at one time a preacher from the pulpit, later, Editor of the Toronto Globe, and now a camp follower of the worst gang of political brigands ever known in any nation on earth, is writing articles for the press gallery, Ottawa, to the Toronto Globe, for use in any political newspaper, vile enough to reprint them.

This Reverend Doctor of Divinity, the Morning Chronicle says, is "a great Canadian, honored from end to end of Canada, in the United States and the Motherland." We remember to have heard of another cloven footed gentelman who enjoys wide popularity in all those countries named.

Premier Borden, is this man MacDonald's latest text. He says "Mr. Borden in power, as in opposition, effects kid glove methods, but countenances the methods of a brigand."

As a clergyman, he knows his words have a prestige the ordinary newspaper writer might not enjoy. It is a popular idea to say the least, that a clergyman should stand apart, from that kind of party politics that requires absolute, intentional lying.

Dr. MacDonald was in the gallery when the incident he refers to took place, and he knows that Sir Wilfrid was not howled down. This, of course, was a cruel stack upon Mr. Borden, and a man who lies thus leaves his self respect at the prayer meeting.

His political prominence had its birth in a wholesale defence of all the proven, graft and political corruption of the Ross Government, and later, the Laurier Government. Fortunately, his influence is dead. He went to Washington, and prepared the whole program by which W. S. Fielding, and William Patterson, sought, with the help of Taft, to make Canada "an adjunct of the United States," at least, so Mr. Taft says. His scheme floundered, and he, Fielding, Patterson and several others, went down, and are still there. Neither Sir Wilfrid nor any of his followers in the House, have claimed that he was "howled down" in parliament, neither will they

claim it. But it remains for an empty headed, soulless, lying clergyman, to lead a band of camp followers in the falsification of the facts.

Of course The Morning Chronicle, in its baby faced fashion will still keep repeating falsehood after falsehood. No man living can find a single honest, truthful article, of a political nature, treating of Canadian federal, parliamentary doings, in any issue of the Chronicle; since the 5th, of December, 1912, we might add,—or for the past 2 years,—why is this; everyone knows our statement is true. Only a few hide-bound partisans pretend to read its political words. Newsboys complain that they can't sell that "thing". If the people of the Morning Chronicle, would drop its infamous articles by Reverend MacDonald, and start on a campaign of truth, Liberals might regain confidence in the old organ of their party. Alfred Henry Lewis, in his latest book, describes how a reflective and resourceful farmer lied a bear to death. The bear chased him into a tree "and then he hurled down untruth after untruth on him, until he was crushed dead." This occurred in the region of Arizona, but we have no faith that the president would, or will work on Canadian soil. It is however, one of the glorious privileges enjoyed exclusively in Canada by the Morning Chronicle and the Reverend MacDonald. We will watch the results.

Co-operative Marketing Bureaus

One of the new plans of the United States Department of Agriculture is that for organizing within itself a division of markets. The purposes of the division will chiefly be to assist farming communities to form associations for direct marketing, and to conduct a large educational campaign on the utility of co-operation in the sale of products, as well as in the organization of agricultural credits. It is rather significant of the strength of the new "producer-consumer-direct" movement that several of the States, among them Wisconsin, are proposing the creation of State commissions or bureaus to encourage direct marketing. As in the case of the parcels post it is the increase in the cost of living that has infused new life into the co-operative movement. In Canada we have somewhat of a counterpart to the American developments in the effort of the fruit division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture to form a central selling association for Ontario apples such as the United Fruit Growers Association of Nova Scotia, The Niagara Fruit Grower's Association and the Ontario Vegetable Growers have already taken some steps towards organizing for direct distribution of fruit and vegetables in Toronto. But in Canada, as in the United States there has been lacking a well-balanced "organizing organization"-a bureau or division that would be set at the specific task of encouraging the farming communities to co-operate. Literature alone will not accomplish large practical results. The educational and creative force must go more directly among the people, stimulating and stirring and helping in a practical manner.

The telegraph system is operated by the Western Union Telegraph Co., under a lease for 99 years from Jan. 1st, 1912. The property taken over consists of 317.5 miles of line in P. E. I., about 9 miles of cable between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, and about 35 miles of land lies between Cape Tormentine and Sackville, N. B., and there are 28 telegraph offices. Government To Develop Live Stock

Hon. Martin Burrell's Department Will Undertake to Distribute Well Bred Stock to Canadian Farmers.

Ottawa, April 18-Hon. Martin Burrell, with help of John Bright, the new livestock commissioner has worked out a plan for the development of the livestock industry. The department will undertake the distribution of well bred stallions, bulls, rams, and boars. This will solve one of the great livestock problems, particularly in the newly settled districts of Canada. The original cost of the animals will be borne by the department and they will be placed in the hands of such local organizations as agree to certain conditions which will be sent forth. In other words, these sires will remain the property of the department but local associations will be responsible for their proper maintenance and management under the general supervision of officers of the livestock branch. All animals distributed will be bought if possible from home breeders, and will be Canadian bred. As far as possible they will be purchased in the province in which they are to be placed. It is not the intention to place the animals in districts where suitable animals of the same class are already owned by private individuals. The aim is rather to aid sections where pure bred sires are lacking and as well to encourage new communities in following a proper and intelligent system in breeding. All bulls distributed will be purchased subject to the tuberculin test and only stallions which have passed a rigid veterinary inspection for unsoundness will be introduced.

Enormous Increase in Immigration Ottawa, April 19.-During the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1913, 402,432 immigrants arrived in Canada. This total is made up of 150,542 British, 139,009 from the United States, and 112,881 from all other countries combined. Immigration to Canada for the preceding fiscal year, the 12 months ended March 31st, 1912, was British 138,121, from the United States 133,710, and from all other countries combined 82,406-total, 354,237.

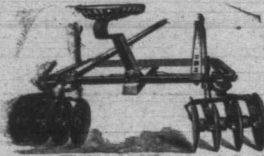

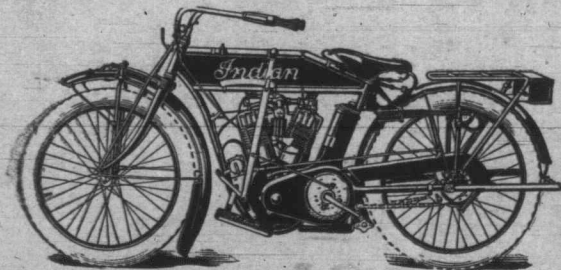
