The supplementary estimates were submitted to the House of Commons at Ottawa on Tuesday. The total amount asked for is \$23,470,316.

Fishing Abuses on the Gaspeau River.

Mr. Ward Fisher, Inspector of Fisheries, has been investigating the conditions on the Gaspeau river during the past week. He reports that the fishing privileges of the river have been abused to a much greater extent than on any river in western Nova Scotia. He finds that salmon pools are swept, fykes and other unlawful contrivances are used, dynamiting is indulged in, and that fish are taken from fish passes by dip nets and other methods. Hereafter the heaviest penalties will be inflicted upon any persons engaged in these illegal and destructive methods. Much of the blame for its present condition, Mr. Fisher finds is to be placed on the residents of the vicinity for the lack of sufficient public spirit to prevent illegal fishing.

The use of square nets for gaspeau is much abused, and these nets are used after the close of the gaspeau season, for the taking of salmon. To prevent this abuse, all square nets must be removed from the river on or before June 15th. Also attention is called to the bait fishing for salmon, large numbers being caught by the use of worm bait, and any further use of this method will subject the offender to prosecution. All public spirited citizens are asked to report any fishing abuses to the officers.

Acadia's Anniversary.

The weather for the closing exercises this year has been very disappointing but otherwise the week has passed off very successfully. Our town has been thronged with visitors, and private homes in addition of hotels, taxing the accommodation to entertain them. While the days have not been very stormy the cold winds and leaden skies have interfered to a considerable extent with the pleasure of the many who look forward with pleasant anticipation to visiting Wolfville at this season of the year.

The graduating recitals of the pupils of Acadia Seminary, held last week, were of an unusually attractive nature, and the concert on Saturday evening was a most complete success.

At the Sunday morning service, College Hall was filled to its utmost seating capacity. The students of college, seminary and academy occupied the main floor of the hall, and at 11 o'clock the college graduating class marched in and took the places reserved for them. On the platform were Dr. Cutler, Rev. H. H. Saunders, Prof. Faulkner, D. D., Dr. Newcombe, Rev. Mr. Chipman, Rev. M. P. Freeman, and Rev. Burton W. Lockhart, D. D., of the First Congregational church, Manchester, N. H., preacher of the baccalaureate sermon. The music, under the direction of Miss Hall, of the Seminary teaching staff, was most beautifully rendered. The service was opened with prayer by R. V. H. H. Saunders, of the class of '93. The hymn, 'O worship the Lord,' was sung. The scripture reading (Psalm 1) was by Prof. Faulkner, D. D., of Drew Theological Seminary. The College quartette sang the Lord's Prayer and the invocation was made by Dr. Newcombe. Dr. Lockhart based his address on Psalm 103:3—'Thy youth is renewed like the eagle's,' and presented a most earnest and scholarly sermon. Against the dark background of a human life spent in earthly pleasure and passing hopelessly into death he placed the inspiring picture of the eternal youth of the soul developed through faith in Jesus Christ and His gospel. The hymn, 'Crown Him with many crowns,' was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Chipman, of the class of '55.

College Hall was again filled on Sunday evening when the meeting under the auspices of the College Y. M. C. A. was addressed by Rev. A. B. Cohoe, the clever pastor of the First Baptist church, Halifax. His text was Matt. 18: 10-14, and the subject of his address, which was a most earnest and able one, was 'The value of life as the personality of the soul.' Life, he said, is the search and service of the soul. This search and service is not easy. When visions of spiritual worth fade, power for such a purpose fails. A life spent in such a purpose depends upon the inspiration of all souls who have dared to serve the eternal, and defied time. The speaker emphasized the place of Christ—perfect life, and how in its fidelity and service it lifts us beyond all doubt. He closed by saying that his final rest is faith in the purpose of God who wills that none should perish.

The closing exercises of Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy on Monday evening were especially interesting. The professional was played by Miss Cora Kaye and Miss Gregory Dalton. Mr. Stephen J. Dick, of the graduating class gave an essay, 'The Titanic Disaster,' describing vividly the great marine tragedy with causes and effects. Mr. James H. MacNeil gave an amusing prophecy of the class of '13 members as they would become by 1931; and Mr. Miller F. Gregg gave a graceful and inspiring valedictory. The music was: vocal solo, by Miss Cecelia Downes; violin solo, by Miss Helen DeWolfe; song, 'The Night has a Thousand Eyes,' by the college quartette. Rev. R. S. Poole, of the Baptist church, Middleton, addressed the graduates, taking as his subject the class motto, 'Strive to Excel.' Inspector E. W. Ribbison also spoke briefly describing some of the benefits to be derived at the Academy. Forty three diplomas and certificates were presented to the class. Mr. Milton F. Gregg won the Bates medal. Mr. V. B. Van Wart won the prize of \$100 for the highest standing in the work.

The graduating exercises of Acadia Seminary, on Tuesday evening, were, as usual, the most popular feature of the anniversary program. The young ladies took their places to the strains of the 'Parting March' played by Miss Jennie Prescott and Miss Alice Marvin. The graduating class numbered thirty-four. Miss Kathleen Baker's essay on 'Elijah, the Prophet Reformer' gave the history of this prophet in his magnificent struggle to uphold the faith of God against worship of Baal. In 'The Growth of Self in Manhood,' Miss Helen DeWolfe traced the rise of this great Shakespearean character through his sores and hardships to his death. In 'A Glimpse of the Montessori School Method,' Miss Ora Elliott described the excellent schools for children founded by Dr. Montessori in France and Italy and showed where the American kindergarten might be improved by following that system of education. The baccalaureate sermon by Rev. Mr. Chipman and Miss Hall were greatly enjoyed. Principal DeWolfe gave the closing address to his graduating class, speaking inspiringly from the subject, 'The Character of Man.' The class motto, 'Strive to Excel,' was read, and the diplomas and certificates were presented.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 16 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his best and right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

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NADA EXPORTS ROSE FUR CATCH

he Far North Hill, Abounds in all Kinds of Valuable Wild Animals

Seven hundred and twenty five thousand dollars was the value of furs brought to Edmonton from the north country and trans-shipped in one week recently to London, Paris, New York, New Orleans, New Mexico, and Boston. The Hudson's Bay Co. head of the list, with 4575,000 worth of furs, followed by the Northern Fur Trading Company 100,000, and independent fur traders make up the balance. The skins were of the highest quality and were in the best of condition.

There were several silver fox skins, each valued at from \$1,000 to \$3,000, and others ranging in value from \$100 to \$1,000. The most of the furs were larger than in former years. The other skins were marten, mink, beaver, fox, bear, deer of various kinds and muskrat. Most of the furs were from the country north and east of Slave Lake and the Mackenzie River, and from the Peace River district and the northern portion of the Provinces of Alberta and British Columbia.

Fallows are the principal buyers at the northern ports of the great fur companies, although a number of other men are engaged in the business. This average catch for an experienced trapper is valued at from \$1,000 to \$2,000 a season, though at times the hunter some times from two to three times that amount by taking silver foxes, which are not only rare, but also difficult to lure to the baited traps. The Chippewyan Indians, who are the chief hunters for the Hudson's Bay Company, make their largest catches in the Great Slave Lake district, where the country is so wild and unpopulated as Nature left it centuries ago.
