War Shipping Organization Demobilizes

The British Ministry of Shipping (Canada) which during its five and one half years of existence practically controlled the export trade of Canada, inland and overseas, clearing over 3.006 transports and liners from Canadian Ports and Portland, will, according to an announcement by Sir Arthur Harris, its Director General, be demobilized on March 31st, next. All correspondence relating to the affairs of the Ministry in Canada after that date is to be addressed to Mr. E. M. Raeburn, Director General, British Ministry of Shipping, No. 165 Broadway, New

The activities of the Ministry in Canada, including the Overseas Department which it succeeded, date from August 1914, at which time the Dominion Government, appreciating the importance of securing the service of an expert Overseas Officer, conferred with the heads of the large Canadian Transportation Companies with the result that the then President of the Canadian Pacific placed at the service of the Government Mr., now "Sir" Arthur Harris, who acted as Director Overseas Transport up to the 5th September 1918, at which date the Department was absorbed into the British Ministry of Shipping, Sir

Arthur Harris continding in charge as Director General in Canada.

During the period 1914-18 the Director General practically controlled the export trade of Canada, inland and overseas, and that the work was well and impartially performed was evidenced from the fact that the Railway and Steamship Interests were satisfied, and the general business of the Country con-The development of the Department may be realized by the number of vessels cleared from Canadian

During the above mentioned period in excess of sixteen million gross tons of munitions, war material, and supplies, were moved inland and overseas. The Director General was supported by an efficient staff drawn from the service of the Canadian Pacific. 

SIX MILLION JEWS ARE FACING DEATH

Starvation and Disease Cause Indescribable Suffering in Eastern Europe.

The hardships of this winter will mean death to thousands of Jews in Poland, unless outside aid intervenes t once according to Lieutenant Shel-Cross Commission to Poland, recent-ly returned to the United States after onths of relief work in eastern

He painted a vivid picture of this alf-starved people, clad in rags, who are now creeping back toward their devastated homes after months of refugee wandering, and dying of starvation and typhus along the roads, as they go.

"Outside starvation, numerous dis-

eases, attributed to malnutrition and typhus have killed men and women and children like flies," he said. emember a family trying to live under an over-turned waggon by the oadside. The mother was dead under a tree a few yards away—she had been dead for days. The father was stretched upon the ground dying of typhus. He died that day. Under the aggon were two little children, both nder five, sick with typhus. An old-

Many of the people are driven to making "bread" out of leaves and bark, and "soup" out of grass and water, Lieutenant Wright reported. them when the American ships, loaded with relief supplies purchased with the funds raised by the American Jewish Relief Committee and other American Jewish agencies, and American and Canadian Red Cross supplies were unloaded at Dansig and other ports. In spite of the fact that the American Jewish Relief agencies are spending almost \$2,000,000 a month now on their relief work in Poland, and that the Red Cross is undreds of thousands of Jews and Poles will die during the winter un-

"Every box-car full of refugees re-turning to their homes has in it those who die along the way, and those who have contracted typhus," Lieutenant Wright said. "The people try to avoid disease by keeping clean, but it is impossible to do so, under exist-ing conditions. Even our nurses and doctors fall ill of typhus, a disease caused by filth and lice."

The Red Cross and the American Tewish Relief agencies are doing their itmost to keep both the Jews and the Sentiles in these stricken lands alive. Six million Jews in eastern Europe face death unless immediate ship-ments of food, clothing, and bedding from Canada and the United States reach them before the cold weather

Gaze Into Bakeshop Windows for Hours at a Time, Hoping for Something to Eat.

"The saddest thing in all Eastern

worse than all the other instances of starvation and even of death and disease on every hand-are the childmobs one sees outside of the few bakeries that are able to keep going in Warsaw," Sholom Asch, the famous Yiddish playwright and poet reported to the American Jewish Relief Committee upon his return from Eastern Europe, where he went as a commissioner of the Joint Distribution Committee of American Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War. "In the bakery windows are a few loaves of bread, and sometimes cakes, that are sold at a simply prohibitive price." he explained, "and even if these were as cheap as in Canada and the United States, their taste would still be unknown to the hungry Jewish children, who live on the cup of soup a day they get from American Jewish relief agencies. Reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee say that both boys and girls are wrappe in burlap, or dressed in clothing made from the sacks in which the relief supplies have come, or in the rags which they have worn during the five years of the war, their gaunt ittle bodies showing through the tatters. They do not walk as children isually do, without effort or restraint but drag themselves along wearily and hopelessly, like tired little ghosts condemned to move in hungry rocessions throughout eternity.

Arrived at the relief station, the children are so tired and so weak that they sit down upon the pavements to await their turn in line. Up on the faces of every one of them there is an expression of unchildlike anxiety. It has to do with the only really vital question in the world to them—whether or not the soup or milk will hold out, until their turn comes. Every day some of them have to be turned away without food, since funds at present on hand are not al-ways sufficient to care for them all.



Party-Line Consideration

two-party line is a single circuit. shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line, it is possible for both users to try to talk out on the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incoming calls.

Therefore, there are special considerations which we urge a party-liner user to keep in mind:

- 1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber: therefore partyline talks should be as brief as possible.
- 2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should be prompt the first user temporarily to give up the use of the line
- 3. Whenever a party line subscriber takes the receiver from the hook and finds the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner.
- 4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately, otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office.



5. Be sure always to give the operator the lefters W or J in calling a party-line subscriber
