





Election Trial.

THE election trial of Martin vs. McKinnon opened in the Supreme Court here on Monday morning, before Judges Hodgson and Fitz gerald. Counsel for Mr. Martin are Messrs. W. S. Stewart, K. C. A. A. McLean, K. C. and H. R. McKenzie. Mr. McKinnon's counsel are Attorney-General Pugsley of New Brunswick, Hon. Arthur Peters, Attorney-General of P. E. I. and F. L. Haszard, K. C.
