

Hemestead Regulations

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person, the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age to the extent of one quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry or in-

spection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

An application for entry or inspec tion made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant forfelt all priority of claim. celled, or voluntarily abandoned, sub-sequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right; of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particulars the homesteader is in derault, and if subsequently the statement is round to be incorrect material particulars, the applicant will lose any pilor right of re-entry, should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may Le summarily cai-




