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

THE ENEMY'S AERIAL SCOUTS DISCOVERED ENEMY'S WEAKNESS

The German Army Manoeuvres Between the Defending Army and a Force Theoretically Designated as Russians—85,000 Soldiers Took Part in the res-Weakness Seen by Airship Parseval Which Saw Reds Behind a Screen of Unsupported Cavalry.



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
