THE HARVEST IS SAFE.

The little grain of wheat is a mighty factor in the business of the Canadian West, and especially so at this season of the year.

From now on during the coming weeks and months the threshers will be busy. Long strings of heavily loaded wagons will be waiting their turn at the elevators, where the clerks will be kept busy writing out the grain cheques for the farmers.

The amount of these cheques will depend on two things. First, the quantity of grain the farmer has to sell, and secondly, on the market price of the grain.

Merchants, bankers, implement dealers and all people doing business with the farmers are vitally interested in the size of the farmer's grain cheque, for it will determine largely the ability of the farmer to pay his debts and to buy the necessities and also the luxuries of modern life.

When the crops fall there is an increase of debts of farmers to merchants and merchants to wholesalers. But when crops are good and prices right prospects are bright.

The harvest is safe. What will the price be? Supply and demand rule the price. Modern transportation also plays an important part in relating the current price of grain in the various market centres of the world.
