If Germany changes its avowed policy there can be only one meaning to it and Britain must reply in kind. Germany has built its new Navy on borrowed money. Britain has so far built on current income, and has not yet begun to borrow for naval expansion. Britain must retain her primacy on the seas for the existence of the Empire depends on it. This is not the case with Germany. She can exist without a formidable navy. Great Britain cannot. Sir E. Conditions are that the institute shall teach poultry-keeping, train expert instructors, and make re-

Indeed, a full scheme has been al ready devised for establishing a poultry university, with biological, chemical, and marketing departments, and with special equipment for various orms of practical research, even in such side branches of the subject s the use of poultry in reclaiming

Ponations in Kind.

The offer of the Development Com nissioners is previsional on an equal sum being raised by private generosity. A very powerful committee has been formed, which includes, among many others, Sir Thomas Acland, Lord Blythe, the Marchioness of Salisbury, the Duchess of Somerset, Mr. Waldorf Astor, Captain Morrison, and several other members of Parliament Sir Thomas Elliott, on behalf of the Board of Agriculture, is taking much personal interest in the scheme.

It is hoped that some donors may ive, as it were, in kind. 

Rev. James Bell gave a most interesting history of the Church of England Orphange at the meeting of the C. M. B. C., in the Synod Hall, yesterlay afternoon. The Institution founded in 1855, on Ash Wednesday by Bishop Field, as a nome for the orphans whose parents had died in the cholera epidemic and the feve that followed. There were only eigh inmates at the opening of the build-ing which was near the Cathedral Rectory; and was only a temporary place. Two year later it was replaced by a more substantial building for boys and girls. In 1872 a separate orphange for boys was deemed ad visable and the old workshop of the Engineers' was fitted up for the pur-pose. It was difficult to conduct two separate establishments and it was finally decided to erect the present Orphange on Military Road for boys and girls. It was finished in 1893 Since then about 600 children have been reared and educated there are given a chance to fight the battle o life. There are now 72 children in the Orphanage. The past five years 115 have been admitted. The benefactors as well as the founders had done a meritorious work and would get their reward. The offerings of the C. M. B. C. amounted to \$30. The meeting closed with Benediction.




