





A Telegraphic Myster

What is known as the "secret m India has for more than a gention perplexed the British mind, and is still a profound mystery, although numberless attempts have been made to explain it. Everyone who has lived long in Asiatic countries is aware that accurate knowledge of important happenings at a distance is often possessed by the natives a considerble time before it is obtained by the Government, even though special facilities had been provided for the ransmission of the news.

This was frequently and con ously illustrated throughout the Seoy rebellion. Happenings occurring mown in the bazaars hours, and ometimes days, before the news rmation obtained was regarded as o trustworthy that the natives speculated upon it, even to the full extent of their fortunes. Indeed, upon one ccasion the "secret mail" beat the lovernment courier by fully twelve ours, although every endeavour had een made to secure the swiftest de-

The Hindoos themselves say, when hey consent to talk about it at all. that they depend neither upon horses or men, and have no secret code of signals; but that they possess a sysem of thought transmission which is as familiar to them as is the telegraph to the Western world. Anyone may

ccept this explanation that will. But though most people, with les ondness for the mysteries, and a better knowledge of the weakness of the Hindoos for making riddles of the simplest facts, will look for a more prosaic explanation, it remains to be said that none has been forthcoming. The "secret mail" is an indubitable reality, and no European has ever succeeded in solving its mystery. If news is transmitted by signals, no one has ever seen the signallers; nor if there is a vast system of stages in operation, covering hundreds and come across any of its machinery! And, indeed, it would seem that some means of communication must be at the command of the natives more rapid than horses or runners.
