



Brazil will support Great Britain, the United States and other leading powers, in all matters brought before the Peace Conference, declared Dr. Epitacio Peshoa, head of the Brazilian Delegation to the Peace Conference, to the Associated Press. This applies to the League of Nations and other questions of general interest, which Brazil has in common with other nations. Dr. Peshoa said his assurance applied particularly to the disposition of requisitioned German ships, of which Brazil holds forty three, and also to the questions of indemnities for which Brazil will make a claim. 



Some of the little nations, which bore a far greater brunt of the war than Japan, resent their exclusion and object to the principle of having to fall in line with, and agree to all the rulings of the inner council, composed of the "Five's" representatives. Their real complaint is therefore based on this point, as they will actually be outside the range of the discussions of vital moment, at which the real decisions will be reached. Agginst this com argument is put forward that to let the five powers dominate will make for expediency. This is the way a French advocate of the system and a member of the Supreme Council, expressed his views to the special correspondent of

"If all the nations delegated were given an opportunity to discuss, we should never get through. There would be no peace signed at all. Furthermore there would be too much opportunity of intrigue, trading and corruption. To put it brutally if every small State had a voice, there would be too much temptation in some quarters to sell out or dicker. As it is the world is much safer with all the responsibility fixed in the five chief powers. The views of the representatives of these five powers are sufficiently divergent on the great fundamental questions, to assure us that there can be no collusion, no sacrificing or exploiting of small countries. There is no sense in all this talk about a repetition of the crimes of the Vienna congress. No such repetition is contemplated, nor would it be possible. There is no small nation in the world that will not have one or more sponsers at the meetings of the "big five," to guard her interests. For example, President Wilson is there. Although Mr. Wilson, himself, has said so much in favor of publicity, thereby causing the present discontent, he has since admitted privately, that there must be limitations if any practical results are to be reached in the life of the present generation. We are not making this peace in Heaven, but on earth, where everybody is human."

Cardinal Gibbons Favors

Strict Regulation of Manufacture and Sale of Liquor.

Baltimere, Jan. 21.—Cardinal Gibs bons, in a statement issued last night, says: "I have always been in favor of strict regularion of the manufacture and sale of liquer instead of absolute prohibition, because by a strict regulation the liberation of individuals is preserved, whereas by Prohibition we face legislation which in the long run cannot be carried out, and an early result of Prohibition will be the secret and illicit manufacture and sale of bad liquor, whereby the Government will be deprived of a large revenue, besides being put to enormous expense in the employment of agents to enforce the law. Moreover, in the carrying out of the law, I see also an invasion of the home, which up to new all men have agreed is a sacred and holy place. These agents may enter our homes with the violence of burglars and the impunity of officers of the law."

Modern Perils in Ancient Seas.

(From the Boston Herald.) In the old mythologies mariners dreaded the passage of the straits guared upon the one side by the rock of Seylia and upon the other by the whirlpoel of Charbydis. But if the old perils have lost their terrors for modern navigators, dangers far greater and more difficult to avoid now threaten them. The other day a French ship was sunk within the strait of evil fame with a loss of 500 passengers. A floating mine caused her end. Recklessly, and in the face of such scraps of paper as the rules formulated at The Hague, mines were sown in the war and the ocean currents have distributed them all over the world. Eternal vigilance must be the price of safety, for mines have been found thousands of miles away from the place where they were re-leased. Such accidents as be'ell the French ship have followed all modern wars, but so many mines were loosed in the world war that the danger is correspondingly increased. Man's inventions are mere to be dreaded than the storied perils of antiquity.

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
