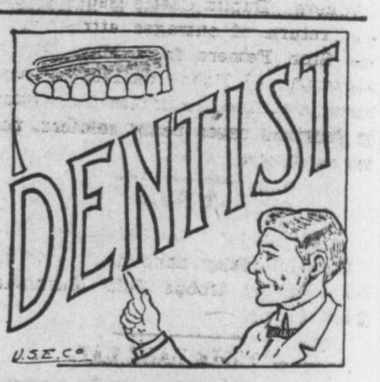

International League of Liberty.

St. John's, Nfld., October 11th, 1919. Sir,—The Government of the Republic of Cuba have forwarded me the enclosed copy of an Act passed by the Congress of Cuba, relative to the creation of an International League for caring for War Orphans, and I should feel obliged if you would publish it for general information. I have the honor to be, Sir, Your obedient servant, R. J. DEVEREUX, Consul for the Republic of Cuba. To The Editor, Evening Telegram, City.

Article I.—The Executive Power is hereby authorized to propose, in the name of the Republic of Cuba, to all the Powers allied in the war against the Central Powers of Europe and to those that severed their diplomatic relations with them, that on occasion of the peace conference about to be held in Paris, they appointed plenipotentiaries to meet in that city, if the government of the French Republic

accept the idea, who shall agree upon the formation of an international association for the protection, care and education of those needy children, whose fathers have died fighting in the ranks of the Allies for the liberty of the world, until they reach an age at which they can take care of themselves, and for this purpose to create a fund to which all the contracting States shall contribute in the proportion and amount corresponding to their respective populations and public wealth, which sums they shall deliver in the form and times agreed upon; and which may be increased by the voluntary contributions which associations and individuals in any part of the world may be willing to make to said fund.

Article II.—The Executive Power shall instruct the Plenipotentiaries of the Republic of Cuba to propose that the association about to be created be called "International League of Liberty," as a tribute to the memory of those who died struggling for the liberty of the world, inasmuch as it is an obligation of the beneficiaries of the same to care for the children of those who heroically sacrificed their lives for them.

Article III.—The Executive Power is likewise empowered to take all necessary measures conducive to the ends of this Law and for this purpose to dispose of such amounts as may be necessary from the funds existing in the Treasury, reporting the same to Congress, nevertheless submitting at the proper time to the Senate the Convention agreed upon, as required by paragraph six of Article forty-seven of the Constitution of the Republic.

Bennett and Colleagues

Will Roll Up a Majority Vote at St. Philips on Polling Day.

The popular candidates for the Liberal Progressive Party in St. John's West, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Messrs. J. J. Mullaly and J. T. Martin, visited St. Philips and vicinity yesterday afternoon and held two most enthusiastic and successful meetings. The first in the schoolroom on the east side, was attended by practically all the residents of the section, and Mr. Solomon King, who occupied the chair, in an appropriate address, introduced the candidates. The latter ably outlined the Liberal-Progressive policy, and in convincing manner showed the gathering that their best interests would be conserved by supporting the party under the leadership of Sir Michael Cashin. This meeting, though held in the afternoon when everyone is ordinarily busy, was attended by the great majority of the voters, who with joy sang and the flying of flags, gave the candidates a most enthusiastic reception. After visiting other parts of this section, the greatest meeting in the history of the place was held in the schoolroom at St. Philips. The veteran champion orator, Mr. Richard Squires, who 43 years ago upheld the traditions of Newfoundland against the Nova Scotian, Ferguson, occupied the chair in a most dignified and pleasing manner. A few introductory remarks he called on Hon. J. R. Bennett, who intimated he would first introduce his colleagues, Messrs. Mullaly and Martin, as they were new in the district, and ask them first to address the gathering. Mr. Mullaly then stepped forward and received a most wholehearted reception, and amid deafening applause proceeded to state he was proud to be associated with such a man as Mr. Bennett in the campaign. After reviewing the manifesto of Sir Michael Cashin in clear-cut, logical manner, he assured his audience of his determination to uphold the traditions of the district when elected on Nov. 3rd, and promised his utmost endeavors, and those of his colleagues, would at all times be directed to the interests of the people of the whole district, and particularly that section he was then speaking to. Following Mr. Mullaly, Mr. Martin took the platform and delivered a brief but convincing and practical speech. He assured those present he made no claim to be an orator, but when elected would at all times devote his untiring efforts to the interests of those who honored him by their support. He recognized the district had been ably represented in the years past, and felt sure that under the leadership of Sir Michael Cashin and in conjunction with his colleagues, the further welfare of the district and St. Philips was in safe hands. The rounds of applause which was given at the conclusion of Mr. Martin's speech was such as to prove beyond shadow of doubt that St. Philips to a man will vote the straight ticket on polling day for Bennett, Mullaly and Martin. Hon. J. R. Bennett on coming forward received an ovation that clearly demonstrated his increasing popularity amongst his constituents. Never in the history of the settlement was such an ovation given a public man, showing conclusively that the people of St. Philips have made up their minds to stand by him against all odds and at all costs. When the applause had subsided, Hon. Mr. Bennett in a speech extending more than an hour and a half, reviewed the whole political situation from his last election in 1913 to the present moment. In a manly exposition of the part played by him in the extraordinary period since that time, he convinced his hearers that a more faithful and worthy representative is not to be found. The audience went simply wild with enthusiasm when Mr. Bennett scored point after point against his traducers who during the last twelve months or more have carried on a low down propaganda to discredit and injure him in the esteem of his true and trusted constituents. If any doubt prevailed or any person imagined for a moment that Hon. J. R. Bennett has lost caste with the people of St. Philips his effort last night and the reception received leaves no other conclusion than that he is more popular than ever, and the people are more determined to send him and his colleagues back as their representatives on polling day. His touching reference to his late colleague, Mr. M. J. Kennedy, and expression of regret at the departure of Lord Morris from Newfoundland, won for

him the approbation of the entire audience. His reference to the venerable chairman, who had acted as such for 30 years with Lord Morris, himself and the other representatives of the district, wherein he said Champion R. Squires was always in his place and never lost a race, evoked great applause. To-night, said Mr. Bennett, he is again in the coxswain's seat, I am at the stroke oar, and with the crew behind me will reach the winning post on polling day with our opponents far in the rear. Space only permits a mere sketch of Hon. Mr. Bennett's speech, which was the ablest ever delivered in the important settlement of St. Philips. Mr. Mullaly and Mr. Martin, his colleagues, he said, were men of sterling character, men of works, who were not seeking anything beyond an honest vote, men of independence and who for sure were not looking for money from any outside interests. His colleagues, he said, were not of the type of office-seekers but men who would stand by the people of St. John's West, first and last. They had no axe to grind, were well and able to look after the interests of St. Philips, and could always be found in their homes and on Water Street, while others seeking their suffrages would be conspicuous by their absence many miles away. Hon. Mr. Bennett, who has more support in St. Philips than even Sir Edward Morris, told the voters that as Sir Edward Morris had always advocated Bennett first on the ticket, he would also ask St. Philips to vote Mullaly and Martin first and Bennett when you are considering later. The statement of Hon. Mr. Bennett so much appealed to the voters of St. Philips that they pledged themselves united to a man to vote the straight ticket, Bennett, Mullaly and Martin. Such an honest appeal by Hon. Mr. Bennett proved to the large gathering that he was sincere, he was a man of principle, and not for the "straw" cry of vote for "me". St. Philips' electors "warmed" up when Mr. Bennett called upon the voters to vote for Bennett, Mullaly and Martin, and not to split in his favor. I am prepared, said Hon. Mr. Bennett, to win with Mullaly and Martin, and you must stand by them with me. Hon. Mr. Bennett also dealt in his remarks with Sir Michael Cashin's manifesto, and how it affected St. John's West. Mr. Bennett, whose address covered more than an hour, told St. Philips what the Cashin Government would do for the settlement, and of his personal efforts to keep it well in advance of any settlement in the country. Mr. Bennett appealed as usual as he had represented St. John's West for fifteen years, and on behalf of his colleagues. It was up to him to go back to the Assembly with his colleagues and with at least a majority that St. John's West had given himself, Sir Edward Morris and the late M. J. Kennedy. Hon. Mr. Bennett asked the gathering that there be no split vote. Vote, said Mr. Bennett, for Bennett, Mullaly and Martin, and then you are voting against Conker and serving the best interests of St. John's West and St. Philips.

This is a mere sketch of Hon. Mr. Bennett's speech, which was the ablest and most satisfactory in the opinion of all present, ever delivered in the settlement of St. Philips. That section will roll up at least a seven-eighths straight ticket vote for Bennett, Mullaly and Martin, and the people there have fully decided that no USURPER, no matter whoever he may be, will turn them from their allegiance to the old traditions of that important portion of St. John's West. At the termination of Mr. Bennett's speech, the cheers were deafening for himself and colleagues, indicating an unanimous verdict that there will be no split in the vote in St. Philips, but a straight ticket vote for Bennett, Mullaly and Martin, with the National Anthem.

The reception yesterday was the most enthusiastic ever tendered candidates visiting St. Philips and the support of the electors there is assured Bennett, Mullaly and Martin. Flags were flying in all directions and from the time of the candidates' arrival till late at night the hills resounded with volleys of musketry. The attempt is to rob Bennett and his colleagues of their seats in St. John's West. But St. Philips' voters say "NO!"

MORINE AND HIS MEN WILL WIN IN A WALK.

Outport men arriving in the city from various parts of Bonavista Bay bring splendid tidings of the success of Mr. Morine and his colleagues in their canvass of the district. They say that the heartiest welcome has been extended to the Government candidates in each place at which they have called so far, and held meetings and that they are literally sweeping everything before them. They have invaded Coaker's strongholds and have been pleasantly surprised to find that the influence of the "wordy" President is practically a myth, as the people have grown sick and tired of Coakerism and all that it represents. 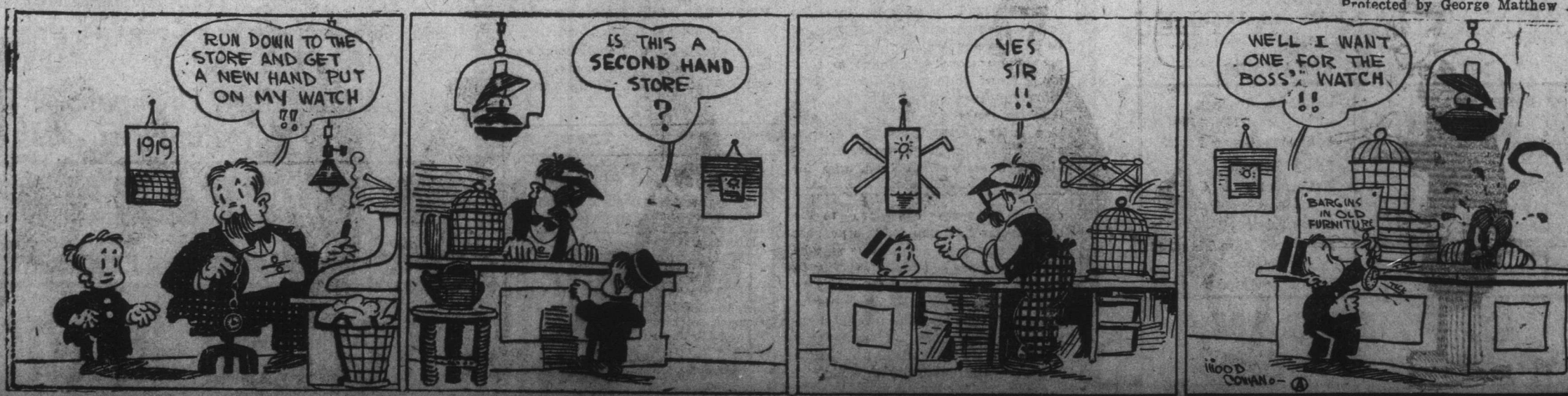

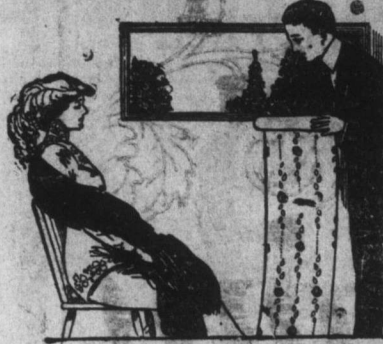

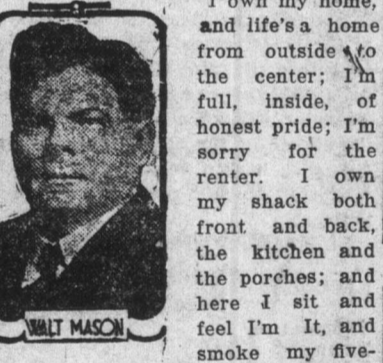

SELLING THE COUNTRY

Coaker's Story of His Canadian Trip

Printed in "Mail and Advocate" of February 26, 1916, Tells of His Visit to Ottawa, His Conference on Confederation and How He Invited Sir Wilfred Laurier to Come to Newfoundland.

The best answer to the outcry of the Squire's squealers regarding Confederation, and the charges that the members of the then Government (February, 1916) of the day plotted to bring Sir Wilfred Laurier to this country, it is to reprint from Mr. Coaker's Diary of his trip to Canada and the United States, published in the "Mail and Advocate" of February 26th, 1916, and subsequent dates, and which formed the subject of his Criminal Libel against Sir William Reid, the following extracts, describing his visit to Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto:—

HE VISITS REID'S HOME.
 Feb. 10.—Visited many places of interest, including the Bank of Montreal, St. James, Notre Dame Cathedral, Chateau de Ramesay and McGill University. Interviewed Electric Co. and other business firms. Out party lunched at Windsor Hotel by invitation. Visited the home of one of the most prominent citizens by invitation in the evening.

(This "prominent citizen" is Sir William Reid, and the house in question is his residence, 275 Drummond Street. Mr. Coaker hesitated to reveal to his glib supporters the fact that he was going around Montreal with Sir William Reid, whom he had denounced so vehemently.)

HE ARRIVES IN OTTAWA.
 Feb. 11.—Arrived in Ottawa at 1 p.m. At 3.30 was introduced to Speaker Severyn at his room at the Museum Building, now used for Parliamentary work. . . . Mr. E. M. McDonald, of Cape Breton, introduced me to the Speaker. The Speaker escorted me to a seat in the Assembly Room amongst the Ministers and introduced me to several of them. Sir Robert Borden left his seat and introduced himself to me and in turn introduced me to all the Ministers, except Sir Geo. Foster and one or two others, who were absent.

HE MEETS PREMIER BORDEN.
 Sir Robert invited me to his private office in the building, and for an hour the President of the F. P. U. and the Premier of Canada conversed on many matters. Sir Robert referred to Confederation and said the Canadian Government would make no move to round off the Dominion by the inclusion of the ancient Colony, and nothing would be done at any time except at the request of the people of Newfoundland. If ever

Confederation became an issue it must be decided by the free will of the electors of Newfoundland. He thought the Canadian people looked upon the matter as one of sentiment. The problems of the war were discussed freely. Sir Robert invited me to meet him next day at the close of a meeting of the Cabinet when he would introduce me to the whole Cabinet and extended an invitation to lunch with him and Lady Borden at his home.

HAS INTERVIEW WITH WILFRED LAURIER.
 Another hour was spent conversing with Sir William Laurier at his private room in the pro-Parliament Building. Sir Wilfred is indeed a charming old gentleman. He is 74 years old and his health is excellent. Sir Wilfred, as well as Sir Robert Borden, are intimately acquainted with Newfoundland affairs and closely questioned me regarding matters affecting the Colony.

HE INVITES LAURIER HERE.
 He has never visited Newfoundland although he has long desired to do so, but being in office he felt a visit would be looked upon as an intrusion, but he may be able to visit the old Colony during the coming summer. I assured Sir Wilfred that in the event of his visiting Newfoundland, that a royal welcome would be accorded him by the people as his name and services rendered Canada and the Empire were familiar to Newfoundlanders. He is indeed a splendid man, and spoke fully of his long public career going back to 1871 when he entered public life, the year I was born. Sir Wilfred regretted the short-sightedness of the Canadian Government in 1895 who allowed the opportunity of rounding off the Dominion to pass, because of a difference of \$100,000 or so in the annual subsidy.

(After his conversation with Sir W. Laurier at Ottawa, he wired Sir Edward Horne, asking that the Government invite Sir Wilfred here during the summer, which the Government declined to do because they could not invite him without inviting Sir R. Borden.)

HE VISITS RUINS.
 We were shown through the remains of the Parliament Building by Mr. McDonald and realized why the Canadian people so deeply regretted the deplorable loss of such a grand and imposing structure. Mr. Collishaw and party were admitted to the Visitors' Gallery in the pro-Parliament building and were eye-witnesses of the meeting of Sir Robert Borden and myself.

HE LUNCHEONS WITH PREMIER BORDEN.
 Feb. 12.—Lunched with Premier Borden at Rideau Club. We were joined by Mr. Jennison and Mr. McNab, editor of the "Daily Mail" of Montreal. The Premier wished to introduce me to the Cabinet and at 12.45 p.m. when the whole Cabinet, which had been sitting to consider the Budget, was about to adjourn, Sir Robert invited me to the Council Room and introduced me to the members I had not already met. It was a scene that I will long remember. Eighteen of Canada's ablest men sat around an oblong table in the historic Privy Council Room, which is situated in a block a few yards distant from the Parliament Building and therefore had not been injured by the fire. We had a free and easy chat, all taking part. The Premier jokingly asked what they should do with Coaker. Would it be as well to add him to the Cabinet. They all replied, "Yes!" I sat next to Sir Geo. Foster.

HE MEETS DUKE OF CONNAUGHT.
 After a few minutes' chat, Sir Robert retired, asking me to come to his private office and from there we went to the office of the Governor-General and Sir Robert introduced me to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, who is a splendid type of man. He warmly shook hands and welcomed me to Ottawa. He knew much about the F.P.U. and its President, judging from his conversation. . . . I took dinner with the Minister of Public Works, Mr. Robert

HE LUNCHEONS WITH LAURIER.
 Feb. 14.—We drove through Ottawa in the morning to see the important residences. . . . Mr. Collishaw was invited with me to lunch at the Rideau Club with the leading Liberal members of Parliament. I entered the Banquet Room with Sir Wilfred Laurier, who sat at my right, E. M. McDonald of Sydney, sitting at my left. E. M. McDonald proposed a toast in my honour. Sir Wilfred Laurier seconded the toast. I responded in a 15 minutes speech, being the first time I ever replied to a toast at a banquet.

HE MEETS E. A. MCNAB.
 Another brilliant chap I met is Mr. McNab, Editor of the Montreal Daily Mail—his own paper—who for years edited the Montreal Daily Star. (Mr. McNab is well known to scores in this country as having been for years a close associate of Sir William Reid, who provided most of the funds for the starting and carrying on of this paper, brought into existence with the object of furthering Sir Wm. Reid's scheme to put this country into Confederation. After Sir William had sunk \$350,000 in this venture, it collapsed and some time after McNab sued him for \$20,000 for services rendered Sir Wm. Reid during a number of years previously in connection with this same Confederation scheme, and Sir William, rather than have the case come into Court and have an exposure of what he had been doing in relation to this matter, paid McNab \$10,000 to settle the suit.)

HE THANKS McDONALD.
 We are greatly indebted to E. M. McDonald of Sydney, who is one of the senior Liberal members. Mr. McDonald did all in his power to make our visit enjoyable and afforded us every facility to meet members of the House. Mr. McDonald is one of those naturally popular men, big hearted, obliging and attentive to his duties. He is a leading Sydney lawyer.

AT TORONTO HE MEETS MR. CROWE.
 Feb. 16.—At Toronto. Spent the morning in seeing the city. Called at the Local Parliament Building, City Hall and Eaton's. Mr. Crowe met us soon after arrival; lunched with him. Toured the residential sections of the suburbs in the afternoon in Mr. Crowe's car. We took dinner with Mr. and Mrs. Crowe. Just before we left Toronto for Niagara, I received the following message from Premier Dorden, sent from Ottawa:—


