Woman Suffrage.

It is the sign of a thoughtful, intelligent, unprejudiced mind when a man or woman realizes that a new order of things has become necessary to cope with existing conditions, both civic and political, the world over. In the last century men undertook to manage, or muddle, all the problems of that generation, but since woman has, in a measure, come into her own, and various avenues for her activity and usefulness have been opened up, she has realized her power and is naturally demanding greater recognition of her rights as a citizen in the land of her birth or adoption. The woman whose activities are circumscribed by the walls of her house or her church can never be a good citizen in a broad sense of that term. She performs her duties in attending to the needs of her household or her devotions faithfully, but beyond that rarely troubles herself to wonder whether she can lend a helping hand for the betterment of conditions in her own home town. She may work very hard for foreign missions, while almost at her door is poverty, ignorance and sin of which she knows nothing. Yet who can blame her, for man in 'a" the ages past have done his best to prevent voman from invading his domain. Universities were rigorously closed against her and every attempt at scholarship was frownel at by professors from whom one would have expected a greater bread i of mind. When Susan B. Anthony first began to agitate for "woman's rights" in the U.S., newspaper men and others wrote of her and of those associated with her as "crowing hens" and used other insulting epithets. To-day the name of Susan B. Anthony is honored from one end of America to the other, but the names of the wits who ridiculed her are as dead as the proverbial door nail.

To-day the question of the suffrage for women is an acute one. They feel that they are capable of using the vote wisely and intelligently and they are going to have it. The sooner politicians realize this, the better, for just as sure as day follows night, it Popular has to come.

The petition which will be presented to the members of the House in a few days asks that the suffrage be granted to the women of Newfoundland, and we bespeak for it a patient and favorable hearing. It will be largely signed by women with large stakes in the country, women employers of labor and women who have suffered and spent themselves in helping our boys at the front during the long, sad years of the war, We have borne the burden and now we ask for our reward. Is it possible that any body of men could be unmanly enough to refuse us? The names of the men who carry through this great and just measure will be remembered with gratitude by the Come Back to Erin. women of Newfoundland. 





Madman Makes Himself Shipmaster.

On Wednesday, May 16, 1900, adman went on board one of the river steamers of Stockholm, the capital of Sweden, armed with two revolvers, a dagger, and a knife, and with these he obtained mastery over the vessel. With the weapons killed seven and wounded five others of the people who were on board. He then jumped into the lifeboat and rowed away, but was captured on the following day. Next month he was tried for murder, and was sentenced to death on June 30. Such forms of madness are far more dangerous to other people than ordinary outbreaks, For example—in one of the lunatic asylums in Nottinghamshire, some years ago, a patient was very proud of his bodily strength, as this Swedish man seemed to be, but he used it by getting on to the roof. The keeper went after him to prevent him com-mitting suicide, and the lunatic threatened to throw the other down from it. The eper, however, possessed sufficient presence of mind to say, "It would show much more strength if you threw me up on to the roof." The madman, pleased at such a suggested, walked downstairs to do so, thereby saving the pair from the difficulty and danger, and bringing about his own capture.

Killing Bolshevism.

Bolshevism is slowly but surely dyng in England. Free speech is killing it. Amongst other references to the Opposition leader, who is justly recognized as one of the greatest living authorities on all social questions of the day, the lecturer said that Mr. Mackenzie King, when he was Deputy Minister of Labor for Canada, drafted the most notable piece of labor legislation that had ever been put on the Statute Books, namely, the Industrial Disputes Act.

This served as the model on which recent labor legislation had been enacted in the United States. He said that Mr. King's book was also the most notable contribution in literature in the present day upon industry and labor, and he proceeded to advocate its main suggestions which were that the four parties to industry, namely, capital, management, labor and a community should be represented upon councils to whose hands should be entrusted the work of making industrial peace, and of promoting industry in its proper light, namely, that of service.—Acadian Recorder.

Origin of Courts-Martial

The custom of holding Courtsmartial in the British Navy after every case of shipwreck; has a curious origin. In 1741 the 'Weger,' one of Commodore Anson's vessels, was wrecked off the coast of Chili, most of the crew being saved. The men and some of the junior officers held that they were no longer amenable to discipline, because their pay ceased with the wreck; but the captain, whose name was Davey Cheap, differed, treated them as mutin ers, and shot one of his midshipmen. He was then deposed, and most of the crew made off in three of the boats. Later, when it was proposed to proseed against the so-called mutineers, the law officers of the Crown decided that the men had been correct in heir view. This discovery led to the framing of section 91 of the Articles of War, which provides that in case of shipwreck, destruction or capture by the enemy a ship has to be deemd to remain in commission pending quiry into the circumstances by a ourt-martial.

The Insect Peril.

According to Mr. P. L. Simmonds. great authority on the subject, there re 350,000 different sorts of insects n Europe, of which 3,500 kinds are other noxious to mankind or active-

y destructive. The papers are always full of instructions to "swat that fly," but while the house-fly and blue-bottle certainly do spread typhoid and similar diseases, there are other insects who bleed our pockets to the tune of millions of pounds yearly.

The common codlin moth costs English apple-growers at least £100,-000 a year, and the damage done by

the green fly is greater. The flea beetle destroys whole fields of turnips, rape and cabbage every summer, while as for the wireworm, this pest alone eats up every year the roots of enough wheat and other food plants to feed half a million people. There are only two plants the roots of which the wireworm will not attack. These are wood and mustard.

There is only one way of clearing The Mystery of land of wireworm, that is by using bisulphide of carbon; but the poison is too expensive for ordinary field

Wood borers are everywhere. The worst is the goat moth, which tunnels into the solid wood of pear, apple, walnut and other trees, There only one remedy-namely to cut wn an infested tree and burn it. The pine beetle is only one-fifth of an inch in length, yet is responsible


