

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

Scotch Haggis.

The windpipe should hang out of the pot, in order that any impuri-ties generated may have means of egress. The pluck is boiled for two hours. It is a good thing to ask the butcher to clean the stomach bag, but, in addition to that, it is necessary to further clean it by bringing it to the boil. This has the effect of contracting the bag. The next thing to do is to pu the bag on with cold water, and after it has again been brought to the boil, the water is poured off, the bag is scraped thoroughly, and it is then left

In cold water until required.

The next process is to mince the best part of the heart and lungs, leaving out fatty and gristly pieces. The liver is next grated, and all these are put into a large hasin. Next toast ½lb. of catmeal, and chop finely ½lb. of good beef suet, also a large onion. Add these ingredients to the contents in the basin, also a dessertspoonful of salt and a tablespoonful of pepper. Moisten all with a breakfastcupful of liquid in which the pluck has been

At this stage the stomach bag is should be made for the contents swelling, otherwise the haggis will burst. The opening is then sewed up, and the haggis is put in a potful of boiling water, and boiled gently for three hours. To prevent its bursting, the haggis should be pricked several times during boiling with a darning needle. In order that the haggis may not stick to the bottom of the pot, it is necessary to put a plate or old saucer underneath it.—Glassow Papet.

OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE MATCH IN SWITZERLAND.



he is forced to buy the bulk of his goods in the U.S.A. for cash or short terms (which is practically cash) it is going to be more difficult to finance business, and less business can be done and consequently more people unemployed. Most business men may be unaware that Paragraph Seven of the Customs Act gives the Governorin-Council power to make an order fixing the value for duty where any currency has become impaired. This paragraph is herewith published in full for public information, as an Act like this is capable of different read-CUSTOMS ACT.

Consolidated Statutes Chapter 22. (Third Series)

"SECTION 7. "All invoices of goods shall be

made out in the currency of the country whence the goods are imported, and shall contain a true statement of the value of such goods; and in computing the value for duty of such currency, the rate thereof shall be such as has been ordered and proclaimed from time to time, by the Governor-in-Council, who is hereby empowered to make such order, and the rate ordered shall be based upon the actual value of the standard coins or currency of such country as compared with the standard dollar of the Colony, in so far as comparative values are known; and whenever the value of a currency has not been pro-claimed, or whenever there is no fixe standard value, or whenever from any cause the value of such currency has become depreciated, there shall be attached to the in-voice of the goods imported a certificate of some Consul resident in such place or country, showing the extent of such depreciation, or the true value of the currency in which such invoice is made out, then and there, as compared with the standard dollar of this Colony: Provided however, that whenever the value of a de preciated currency is dependent upon the rate of Exchange on ondon, it shall be optional with the Importer, with the consent of the Collector, or other proper officer to compute the value for duty at the rate of exchange certified by the Bank through which the Exchange is drawn, as current at the time and place when and whence the goods were exported to this Colony: Provided also, that when the currency value is so deeither by a Consul's certificate or by the certificate of the Bank as or value shall be final and not open

Sir David Gill, K.C.B., who died on

deen in 1843, and educated there. The work was completed under his direction, and he then turned his attention to the geodetic survey of Rhodesia in 1898, when Mr. Frank M'Lean presented the large telescope which is now in use at the Cape Observatory. Sir Dvaid went there specially to superintend its erection. Besides his work in many parts of the world. Sir. David found time to write many works on astronomical and scientific matters. His accomplishments received world-wide recognition. Britain honoured him with a knighthood. and presented him with the medal o the Royal Society. France bestowed on him the coveted honour of a Commander of the Legion of Honneur Germany gave him the Knighthood of the Prussian Order for Merit. Concrete Ship Sale.

Sydney, N.S., Jan. 20.-Fears which have been held during the past few days for the safety of the Sydney concrete steamer Permanencia, have been relieved by word which was received to-day by W. N. McDonald owner, that she had arrived in Newfoundland in a damaged condition. A wire from Capt. Leblanc states that the five-hundred-ton ship has put into Rose Blanche on the south coast. Particulars as to the damage caused her have not vet been received but it is thought that her deck houses were wrecked.

The gale into which the Permanencia sailed when she left Sydney on Friday last was one of the worst ever encountered on this coast in late years. The Reid boats, tried and proven by many a bad storm during the years they have operated in the Gulf, met the same storm, and had to put up one of the hardest hattles for safety in their whole career. The Seal, an icebreaker and sealing steamer, which for years has battled with the icefloes of the wind-swept north, on her voyage to North Sydney, went directly into the teeth of a "rip snorting" gale, and was given such a lively time that when she finally arrived in port the coal in her bunkers had become so nearly depleted that had she been another hour at sea she would have been adrift without fuel.

The Sagona, on her run to North Sydney in the same storm, took six hours over her regular time, and it takes more than an ordinary gale of wind to hold this steamer back.

When the Permanencia failed to arrive at Fortune Bay within the time that her mine-knot speed would allow, it was rumored in local shipping circles that she had met with disaster. Naturally, as she was a new ship, and yet unproven by a long sea voyage, mariners here thought that she had failed to weather the heavy week-end gale.

Cape Breton's latest venture in the art of shipbuilding completed her maiden voyage, however, through one of the worst storms and one of the worst stretches of sea in the North


