Preserving agents are also largely used in butter, margarine, potted meats and fish, in beer, ginger beer and cordials, and in some jams.

They are also used by butchers, who apply them in the form of a wash over the surface of the meat.

Dried fruits, such as apricots peaches and prunes often contain a presenvative. Californian apricots, for instance, are treated with the fumes of burning sulphur both before and after being dried in the sun. Many food reforms are on the way,

if the recommendations contained in the Final Report of the Committee on the use of Presenvatives and Colouring Matters in Food, are carried out. Preservatives will then he prohibited in all the food and drink we buy with a very few temporary exceptions and so on, which will be allowed a very small percentage of preservatives until ways and means are found of doing without it. And where preservatives are allowed they will have to be declared as cream is to-day.

Restrictions will also be made in the number of colouring matters that may be used in food. At present much





Pensions We Pay Politicians

During the recent election campaign the irrepressible "voice" was frequently raised about political pensions. Many people are under the impression that a Cabinet Minister, on relinquishing office, automatically becomes entitled to a pension for life, just as if he were an ex-Lord Chan-

An ex-Cabinet Minister is not eligible for a pension unless he has given at least four years, service or its equivalent in an office of the first class, six years' service in an office of the third class, and unless he declares that his private income is insufficient to maintain his station in life There are, moreover, only twelve political pensions in all, divided into three classes, the maximum rates of which are £2,000, £1,200, and £800

Pitt's Amazing Appetite.

Soon an ex-Minister may or may not draw a pension. It was so in the old days. The Duke of Newcastle refused one, notwithstanding that he had reduced his estate from £25,000 to £6,000 in trying to induce people to support the Government while he held

On the other hand, the elder Pitt, his colleague, accepted a pension. He could hardly have done otherwise, hecause money melted in his hands. His appetite was so capricious that there were always three dinners in course of preparation for him, so that food should be in readiness whenever he felt inclined to eat.

When travelling, too,, he did things on the grand scale. During a journey from Bath to London he shut himself up in an inn at Marlborough for some weeks, and very soon he seemed to have an army of attendants, his livery Curious appearing everywhere. travellers discovered that he had insisted that during his stay in the inn -one of the largest in England-his livery should be worn by all the waiters and stable boys.

Back to the Bar.

Disraeli, too, drew a pension (£2,-000) for years, though he was not a poor man. Like both the Pitts, he received much financial assistance from friends. He bought Hughenden out of money given to him by Lord George Bentinck and his brothers.

In recent times there has been simifar lack of uniformity. Generally ex-Cabinet Ministers have not taken a pension, and., if not wealthy, have solved the problem of getting a livelihood in their own way. This movement was strengthened by Mr. Asquith's action after he had been Home Secretary in Mr. Gladsone's last Administration. He returned to his work at the Bar, thereby causing much comment.

But some ex-Ministers have drawn pensions for long periods. The most tenacious was Mr. C. P. Villiers, who died a few years ago at the age of ninety-three. He represented Wolverhampton for about forty years without once, it is said, either setting foot in that town or speaking in the House of Commons. A statue of him was electer in Wolverhampton during his lifetime.

Poor Through Public Opinion.

As an ex-Cabinet Minister he drew a political pension for some forty years on the ground of his small means, and vet left £90,000

Of late years, however, there has been a change of opinion on political pensions. Formerly it was considered quite right and proper that a politican who had served a certain numher of years should take one; but now the propriety of such a thing is questioned.

Public hostility to the system is so great, in fact, that not long ago an ex-Cabinet Minister gave up the pension of £2,000 that he had drawn for many years. It is known, too, that when another ex-Minister surrendered his pension he was really in need of

And the husband didn't get the worst of everything, either. One of the provisions for the punishment of women, under certain conditions, was that if she had not been a careful mistress, had gabbed about, had neglected her home, and had belittled her husband she should be thrown into the water.



Nightmare Rides

on Trains

thrilling experience the other day when their engine ran away while they were working underneath it in a siding. They clung to the bogies, as the runaway was making such speed that to drop off would be fatal. After travelling seven miles in this nanner they managed to work the brakes with their feet, and brought the engine to a standstill. 



A similar fraud consisted in advertising for the next-of-kin of a certain person-somebody, of course, with a common name—and then demanding 7s. 6d. from each applicant for inquiries. Sometimes a single advertisement drew hundreds of replies. Still more heartless was an impudent scheme by which the film struck were robbed. Large numbers of poor girls were cajoled into paying certain individuals 5s. for telling them whether they had a "film face."

Recently there has been a revival of the old "ramp" of extracting fees from people on the pretext of finding their missing relatives. A sufficient indication of the character of those who work this fraud is that generally they write from accommodation addresses and are better-known in common lodging-houses than anywhere
