SIR,—The Advertiser a few days ago vas what Baille Nicol Jarvie would call m "the north side of friendly" to us poor Yolunteers—in fact he grossly insuited is. Speaking of the proposed billeting he men among the families in town, he

said:
"It is very properly felt that the intrusion of soldiers upon private citizens is a mest obnoxious measure, and one that ought not to be enforced without the utmost necessity, and the greatest delicacy on the part of the distributors. The reception of total strangers into families, especially where timid wives or daughters are liable to be left much alone, is an exceedingly distastsful measure, and

Now, sir, this comes pretty hard from a paper the editor of which knows that nine-tenths of the volunteers are drawn from families as respectable as his own, and are every whit as good as he is, as well brought up, if not better, and can conduct themselves in a house with as much propriety as he can. Besides, sir, the base insinuations in the second sentence above quoted is a weak attempt to cast a slur on their good name and their morality. Were we to measure the standing, the breeding, and the conduct of the volunteers by the above estimate of the Advertiser's, the men would be sunk as low as were ever the soldiers of the armies in Europe before attempts were made to elevate them in the seedla scale; or they would be as bad as the most row-day regiments which, during the late war, disgraced the American army. But the insinuation and the inference the Advertiser seeks to draw are both untrue, and most unjust to a respectable, well behaved and well brought up class of men, who in everyday life mix with all classes.—Why should the putting on of the uniform degrade them to blackguards, as the Advertiser would fain make the public believe? On behalf of my companions in arms, now assembled in Guelph, I protest against this foul slander cast on us by the Advertiser, for no paper which appreciates the value and standing of the volunteers in this county, and throughout Canada, would diagrace its pages by using such language. But, sir, this is not all. Further on in the same article, the editor of the Advertiser says:
