The Pacific Railway Bill.

In the British House of Commons on Tuesday, the Bill granting the Imperial guarantee of the loan in aid of the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway, was passed through its second reading by a vote of 117 to 15. On the motion being brought up, Sir Charles Dilke denounced the vicious system of guaranteeing enterprises and works for which the colonies were not yet fit. He insisted that the guarantee was in the nature of a bribe for concessions Canada had made in regard to the fisheries, so that the provisions of the treaty of Washington might be executed. He pronounced the Pacific Railway a gigantic Parliamentary job, and concluded by moving that the second reading of the Bill be postponed six months. Mr. Gladstone said the guarantee had no connection whatever with the Treaty of Washington. Action on the Bill had been purposely delayed until that Treaty was settled. The object of the measure was not to give Canada so much hush-money, but to recognize the just demand she had on England. In the Fenian raids on her territory, Canada had suffered on England's account, and Canada had elected to cancel the debt we owed her in this way.
The *Daily News* says that the Canada Pacific enterprise is of a very mixed and doubtful character.

MIND AND MATTER.—Prof. Agassiz has propounded a new theory of life. He has lately been delivering a course of lectures on the germs of life, and in the closing one, which he gave last week, he advances what is certainly an original, and will be considered an extraordinary theory. He declares that the relationship of animals is an intellectual unity, not a material connection. He denies that these relations, coincidences, similarities, are the result of evidence of law. He regards all organic life as bearing only the characteristics of the work of conscious mind, as distinguished from the product of unconscious forces. The assertion will, no doubt, strike many a savant from his studies, and put Darwin on his mettle. The statement of the American public opinion is totally opposed to that of this celebrated English writer on the development theory, and we may expect ere long to see a vigorous battle waged between the two as to the truth of their respective systems.

The fall of E. B. Edly, M.P.P., for something over a million of dollars, causes profound sensation in commercial circles about Ottawa. Over three hundred men have been discharged from his mills and manufacturing, causing much trouble among the poor people of Hull. It is to be hoped, however, that this business will be resumed before a great length of time.

An attempt is being made to call a general meeting of the Press of the Dominion, at Ottawa, on the approaching meeting of Parliament, for the purpose of organizing a Canadian Associated Press Dispatch Association. The scheme receives public favor there, and circulars are being printed and sent out to the newspapers all over the Dominion.

Writs for the election of a local member for Beauharnois, in room of the late Mr. Cartier, have been issued. The nomination takes place on the 4th of July, and polling on the 11th and 12th.

Hon. A. G. Archibald, ex-Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, has been appointed Judge in Equity in the Province of Nova Scotia, in the place of Judge Johnston, lately appointed Lieutenant Governor of that Province.

The official report of the United States Agricultural Bureau on the wheat crops show a large increase of average over last year, with good prospects for more than an average yield per acre.

The Spanish Government has introduced a Bill to abolish the legation at Valencien.

The Toronto *Leader* advocates the appointment of Chief Justice Hagarty as Lieutenant Governor of Ontario.

It is now said that Lieut. Governor Howland will continue in office until the first of November.

A NEW CHURCH IN PAISLEY.—The foundation stone of the new Presbyterian Church in Paisley was laid on Tuesday afternoon in the presence of a large assembly. The preliminary services in the old building were conducted by the pastor of the congregation and the Rev. Mr. Tolmie of Southamptom, after which the services adjourned to the site of the new building, where, in due form, Mr. Straith laid the stone, enclosing a glass vase, which contained the coins of the realm, the history of the congregation, papers of the day and other documents. The Rev. Mr. Cochrane, of Bradford, then gave an address, commending the enterprise and praying for the success of the project, and for the increase of the denomination in the country, and for the greater effort.

A grand review of 7,000 troops was held by Queen Victoria at Windsor Park, on Tuesday afternoon in honor of the Shah of Persia.
