CHURCH UNION IN CANADA.

THE LORD'S DAY BILL NOW BEFORE COMMONS

Text of the Measure Which Has Been Introduced in Parliament.

SOME VERY CURIOUS PROVISIONS

Drastic Reform Proposed by the Good People of the East.

The following is the full text of the Lord's Day Observance Bill as presented to the House of Commons... (Reprinted as amended by the Select Committee to which it was referred)

1.—It shall not be lawful for any person to engage in any trade, business, or profession on any day which is a day of public rest or observance... (a) "The Lord's Day" means the period of time which begins at twelve o'clock on Saturday afternoon and ends at twelve o'clock on the following afternoon...

(b) "Vessel" includes any kind of vessel or boat used for conveying passengers or freight by water... (c) "Performance" includes any game, match, sport, contest, exhibition or entertainment...

(d) "Employer" includes every person to whose orders or directions any other person is by his employment bound to conform... 2.—It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's Day, except as otherwise provided in this Act, to sell or offer for sale or purchase any goods, chattels, or personal property, or any real estate, or to carry on or transact any business of his ordinary calling, or in connection with such calling, or for any other purpose...
