

A certain small pro-portion of all insurance, in all companies, lapses during each year from indivi-dual negligence, inability to par, &c. In companies which are well-conducted, and whose policy-holders vaue their privileges, very few will surrender their policies until death or maturity ends the contract. . In the following table, compiled from the Government Returnis, the per-centage of insurance which was surrendered to the companies, or which lapsed from non-payment of premiums, is shown.
