Land agents are being opened in Great Britain at Drogheda.

The evictions on the estates of Lord Barry at Castletown, have proceeded quietly. The tenants were given two years' notice.

Most of them offered to pay a year's rent, which in some instances was accepted on account.

Killen, barrister, has been arrested under the coercion act for inducing the people of the county to refuse to pay rent.

Michael Boyton has been released from Kilmahoney jail on account of ill-health. He has been conveyed to the hospital.

Cork, Nov. 30.—The trustees of the tenants on Lord Kenmore's estate in Milstreet, were asked last evening to sign a petition for the revocation of the evictions.

The petition was signed by 100 tenants. It was presented to the land court.
