The net prices charged here are \$1,72 per thousand feet to ordinary consumer. per thousand feet to ordinary consumers and \$1.50 to large ones, while the net prices charged in Montreal to all consumers is \$1.70, to which figure I learn it has just been reduced from \$1.90. A charge is also made there for meter rents, while no such charge is made in Toronto, and this to our consumers makes a difference of about ten cents per thousand feet. Gas is, therefore, cheaper in Toronto than in Montreal instead of being dearer. Again gas coal is considerably dearer in Toronto than in Montreal and not cheaper as you say, and Montreal has the advantage of a larger consumption of gas. W. H. 
