The announcement of the assignm Rodger, Maclay & Co., soap manufacturer of this city, has created more than ordin ary interest in business circles from the fact that in the suspension of one of the three factories in Toronto devoted to that

industry, the state of the trade was thought by some to be indicated by their forced position. An investigation into the causes leading to the suspension the causes leading to the suspension proves that such is not the case; as they have found a ready market for their goods, and it is generally believed the soap business is not overdone, although a sharp competition has latterly been kept up between the Toronto factories and those of Hamilton, Windsor and Mont-real. It appears that from the start nearly two years ago, the firm have been

real. It appears that from the start nearly two years ago, the firm have been handicapped for means to carry on a busi-ness in which the competition is so keen, and in consequence they have paid a high rate of interest upon their business capital, and heavy discounts on paper endorsed by rate of interest upon their business capital, and heavy discounts on paper endorsed by them. At times sales have been forced and prices broken to meet payments, and this in opposition to other firms, which this in opposition to other firms, which were selling at a very small margin. It is also alleged that heavy drafts have been made upon earnings, and that a short time since several thousand dollars were drawn out by a silent member of the firm. From the first small sales were effected on credit in places where the collection in-volved an expenditure large enough to more than consume any profit arising from the sales, and a continual shrinkage has been the result.

Professor Samuel Kneeland, A.M., M.D., of Boston, says in a locture on earthquakes: The old theory of the causes of volcances have gradually lost the confidence of geolo-gists. Mallet's theory is now generally admitted as the best explanation, to wit, that in cooling from a highly heated nebu-lous matter, the crust of the earth has shrunk upon the centre, more readily ac-cording to its thinness, and the most so, therefore, in former geological ages.
