Canadian Delegation to Second Commonwealth Education Conference

The Secretary of State for External Affairs, the
Honourable Howard Green, announced today that the Honourable
George A. Drew, High Commissioner for Canada in London, will
lead the Conadian Delegation to the Second Commonwealth Education
Conference to be held in New Delhi from January 11 - 25, 1962.
Mr. Drew was also head of the Canadian Delegation at the first
Commonwealth Education Conference held at Oxford in July 1959,
and since that time has served as Canadian representative on the
Commonwealth Education Liaison Committee in London. This Committee
which is composed of representatives of Commonwealth governments
and one number representing British Colonial territories, was
established to enable governments of the Commonwealth to consider
together the development of the schemes of educational co-operation
agreed upon by the Oxford Conference.

The Second Commonwealth Education Conference is being held to examine in retrospect the progress made in the Commonwealth Education Programme since its inception at Oxford in 1959. In the light of experience gained in the first few years of the operation of the Programme, the Conference will also consider in what manner existing arrangements for educational co-operation among Commonwealth countries might be improved.

Invitations to the Conference have been issued by the Government of India and it is expected that about 200 delegates from 13 Commonwealth countries and territories will attend.
