WILL GO OUT OF BUSINESS.

Farmers' Loan and Savings Company Will Go Into Voluntary Liquidation—Depositors and Bondholders, It is Claimed, Will Be Certainly Paid in Full—What the Trouble Is.

Editor World: Owing to the depression in real estate existing in Toronto, and to the fact that considerable unproductive property has come into the hands of the company and the margin of profits has been greatly reduced, the directors of the Farmers' Loan and Savings Company have decided to recommend to the shareholders the gradual winding up of the company by means of a voluntary liquidation.

Full statement of the position of the company is now being prepared and will as soon as possible be submitted to the shareholders.

Interest on debentures and deposits for the half year will be paid forthwith.

The amount of the assets is largely in excess of the liabilities.

The total sum in Canada are about as follows: Deposits \$200,000, debentures \$200,000, and the total liability to banks is about \$60,000.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Farmers' Loan and Savings Company, organized in 1871 and doing business on Toronto-street, next the gas office, has decided to go into liquidation. This action on the part of the directors had taken out on Saturday, but full information was available.

Friends of the liquidating company assured The World last night that the depositors would all be certainly paid. On Saturday, a number of the depositors are farmers from the neighborhood of Ellesmere, in the Township of Scarborough.

The company, when asked for the repayment of deposits on Saturday claimed the thirty days' notice. So that it will be thirty days at least before the depositors will begin to get their money. The depositors have the first claim, and the debenture holders, then the shareholders.

About two-thirds of the subscribed stock is paid up, so the subscribers are liable for about \$400,000 more.
